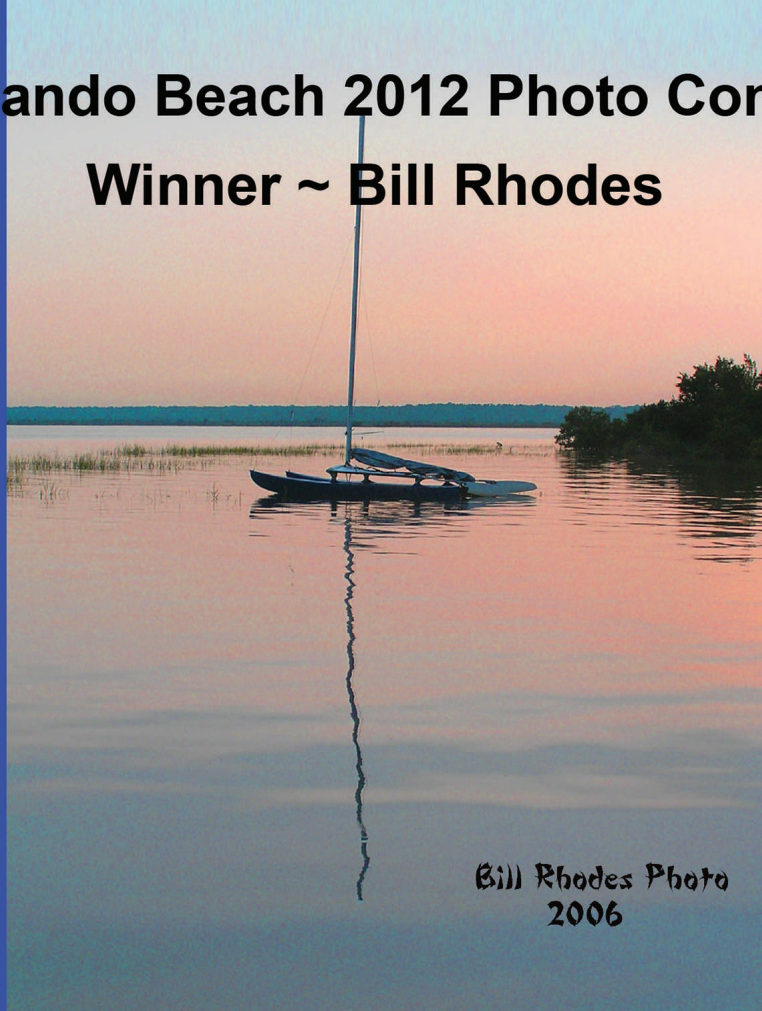

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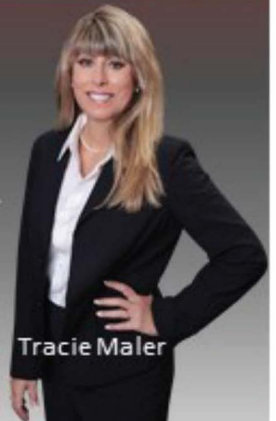

finishing up on the project. Some residents are for the new store and some are against this type of store in Hernando Beach, however it will be nice to be able to go there for a loaf of bread or other things rather than drive all the way to Walmart or Publix on US Highway 19.

As all of you know our Hernando Beach Fire Department was dissolved by Hernando County and we now have a county fire/rescue station in Hernando Beach. They have certainly been put to the test as soon as they arrived in the Beach. First there was a house fire on Minnow Creek Drive, then a motorcycle accident on Shoal Line, and now a huge wild fire in the preserve immediately east of Shoal Line Blvd adjacent to the east side of Hernando Beach.

This past Saturday, April 8th, a brush fire was found in our Weeki Wachee preserve in an area just east of Shoal Line Blvd in Hernando Beach. It is still burning 3 days later with fire fighters from neighboring counties responding to assist our Hernando Beach and County fire departments. Helicopters have also been doing water drops. Despite all their efforts the fire grew from 300 acres to over 1100 acres affected. At one time, it threatened the Hernando Beach First Baptist church but fire fighters fought it back and it is safe. Ash and smoke have been thick over Hernando Beach. It clears up when the wind shifts and carries it east or north. However, it then affects Spring Hill residents as well as the Weeki Wachee neighborhood. Hopefully they will contain it soon and have it totally put out. Hernando Beach residents and businesses responded with supplies, water and food for the fire fighters.

We have an awesome community, we may have our differences over some issues but we pull together in an emergency. Kudos to all of you for helping where you could in this fire disaster, and for taking photos and videos.

I will soon be adding a page/tab to our HBPOA website, [www.hernandobeachpoa.com](http://www.hernandobeachpoa.com) devoted to our new Fire Department. Steve Krou and his helpers are also starting the mural project for the doors of the Hernando Beach Fire Department. It is being delayed due to the fire but will be started soon. We are excited about this project and thank Steve for this great idea and then spearheading it.

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## HERNANDO COUNTY ARTIFICIAL REEF PROGRAM

The Hernando County Port Authority is working with Hernando County to spearhead the development of artificial reefs along the Hernando County Coast. In the 1990's, Hernando County was active in artificial reef development and State grant money was obtained for developing offshore reefs. In 2008, Port Authority members Jim McFarlane and Captain Chuck Morton led the way in requesting the County to re-permit the Hernando Reefball and Bendickson Tank reef sites to continue to develop these areas.

The Hernando County Port Authority Board is unanimously in support of continuing to develop artificial reefs that will improve the fishery and water quality in the Gulf of Mexico, as well as adding to the recreational value of our coast. Please support this project and make a donation to the designated funds account to help this ongoing project.

The five year plan is:

- Re-permit the Hernando Reef Ball Reef.

- ◇ We hope to get grant money to work with the community, schools and various groups to enhance and monitor the reef.

- ◇ We believe that school involvement can be educational as well as giving the future leaders of the County an ownership interest in the reef projects.
- ◇ We also hope to show community support, to rank us higher in the competitive process to obtain artificial reef development grants.
- ◇ We would like to identify a corner of the Reef Ball Reef for an eternal reef. Eternal reefs [www.eternalreefs.com](http://www.eternalreefs.com) are a great way for a person to be remembered and memorialized as well as improve the existing reef.
- ◇ Information on Reef Balls is available at [www.reefball.org](http://www.reefball.org)

- Re-permit Bendickson Tank Reef.

- ◇ In the 90's the permit included a plan to connect the 10 tanks with approved reef materials. This would improve the migration of fish and make an exciting trail for offshore divers.
- ◇ We currently have several new transfer boxes that would provide great habitat for grouper. We plan to deploy them in a pattern to expand the reef utilizing the full permitted area.
- ◇ Over the 10 year span of the permit we wish to complete the trail of reef material between each of the tanks.
- Locate a site for a snorkeling reef in approximately 6 feet of water within the next two years.

- Promote the development of under the dock reefs in the Hernando Beach canals to aid in the improvement of water quality and protect the shoreline from erosion.
- Enhance the inshore oyster reefs.

Funding for these ambitious projects depends on local support. Any business, association, group or resident is encouraged to help by contributing money and/or time, as well as learning about the values of artificial reefs.

## BRIEFING FROM HERNANDO COUNTY FIRE/RESCUE

This afternoon, Monday 4/10, an invite was sent from Virginia Singer, Hernando County Public Information Manager, to the Presidents and Board Members of the HBSPOA and HBPOA - "Deputy Fire Chief Kevin Carroll would like to invite you and the other HOA/POA presidents and board members to join him at 3 p.m. at the Coast Guard Auxiliary Building for him to brief you on the Water Tour Wildfire and answer any questions you may have. Please let me know if you are able to attend."

Gladys Moore - HBPOA President, Kathy Frase - HBPOA Vice President, Diane Overbeek - HBSPOA President, along with Bud Frase, Denise Prior and Virginia Singer met with Deputy Fire Chief Kevin Carroll in conjunction with the Hernando County Fire. Deputy Chief Carroll gave an overview of the fire starting with first call on 7 PM Saturday up to present time. Pictures which are posted on the Hernando County Fire Rescue Face Book taken showing the immensity of the fire were shown to the group. These can be viewed on this site should anyone wish to do so.

At approximately 7 PM on Saturday evening two of our Crime Watch volunteers while on patrol noticed a brush fire behind the First Baptist Church on Shoal Line and called it in. The fire was only 80 ft from the church and moving rapidly. 15 Fire Units from Hernando County were summoned, along with the Forestry and the Sheriff's department. The fire grew rapidly from 300 acres to 1100 acres. A bulldozer was used to enlarge the road behind the perimeter from 25 feet to 40 feet. This allowed the fire fighters to start back fires so that these fires would move forward towards the already burning area and meet in the middle containing the brush fire.

The Chinook helicopter from the Ocala US Federal Forest Service was brought in to assist with containment, passing over the fire sight constantly. Men and women fighting the fire were working long shifts, some straight through a 24 hour period. The Hernando Beach community came through with flying colors providing food, water, Gatorade, candy, cookies and much more. Area restaurants brought pizza and sandwiches not only to those fighting the fires but to those that were left in the fire stations to handle situations from that end. One person stated "there really are some good people in the world". Many offered prayers and thanks to those who were putting their lives in danger to save our community.

As of today the Command Center that was set up at the Coast Guard Building on Caliente has been disas-

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sembled. The Fire Station on Shoal Line will be a Modified Command Center and fire fighters will continuously drive the fire lines in one to three hour shifts, to make sure no hot spots cause the fire to rekindle.

Deputy Chief Carroll told us that even before the fire he had sent a memo to Len Sossamon and the BOCC in regards to the drought conditions of Hernando County, requesting a burn ban be put into place. At this time the KBDI (Keetch-Gyram Drought Index) measure for Hernando is 550 from a scale of 1 to 800. This is over half or 66% of land drought. The ban needs to be approved immediately to include any outdoor burning not regulated by the Florida Division of Forestry and will be voted upon at tomorrow's BOCC meeting. Once the index goes down into the 400's it can be lifted, but as this fire has shown, brush fires can erupt at any time in any place.

Lastly Deputy Chief Carroll gave a few tips and guidelines:

- ◇ Be aware that smoke can show up for weeks. This doesn't mean the fire is starting up again.
- ◇ You may see some sparks or the inside of tree stumps looking like a lit candle. As long as it is on the East side of Shoal line it is ok, but should anyone notice it on the West side call 911 immediately

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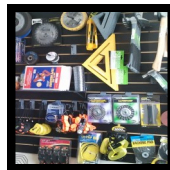
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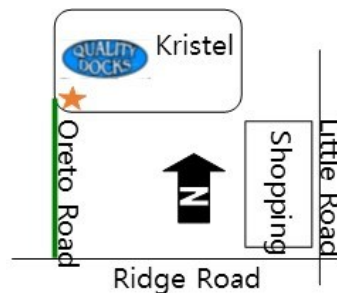

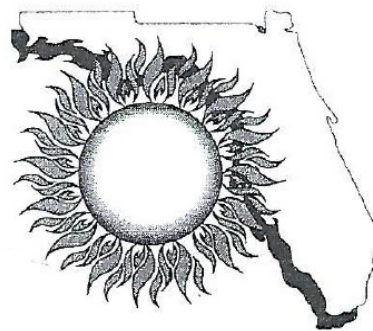

- ◇ Also if you do see something that concerns you don't hesitate to dial 911, better to be cautious than not
- ◇ Take extra caution driving, since fire fighters will be routinely checking the area they may be walking along the road so be alert, especially in the evening hours
- ◇ Roads may have to be shut down should something flair up – be aware and pay attention, listen to any emergency calls you receive from Hernando County Emergency Alert
- ◇ All 3 lead inspectors were pulled and were directed to knock on Hernando Beach business doors, introducing themselves and responding to any questions. They realize that this is something that could have been done better, informing business owners of what the situation was.
- ◇ If you have a respiratory condition you may want to think about staying with family or friends that are more inland until all this clears up.

Without these brave men and women doing the best job they could this situation could have erupted into a much worse situation with people losing their homes, businesses and even their lives. We all a great debt of gratitude to everyone involved.

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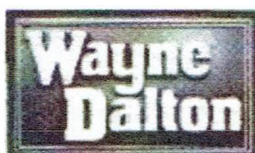
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## HERNANDO BEACH CRIME WATCH 2015 REPORT

brought here to the county without overtaxing our infrastructure and services like law enforcement and fire departments and schools. He stated that he is always happy to hear from residents and appreciates the input that he receives and wants to continue that kind of open dialogue which he finds invaluable.

He addressed the concerns from a lot of people about the Comprehensive 20/40 plan by assuring us that it is far from finished and is very much a work in progress. His philosophy is that government should play as small a role in our lives as possible while still providing the services that we need. He doesn't want to see a plan that becomes so restrictive that no one wants to live here. He encouraged private citizens to be involved in this process by coming to meetings and expressing concerns. He really stressed the need for transparency in the process and wants to be informed and understand the elements before he makes any decisions.

John then opened the floor for any questions from residents and addressed many concerns that were expressed, such as what we as residents can do to ensure that Shoal Line does not become like Highway 19. His advice was for us to be organized as a community since we are unincorporated and used our meeting tonight as an example of that needed organization so that our concerns are represented at the county level. The question about his opinion of the pros and cons of the super majority vote was asked. His opinion as to whether a change in land use can pass with just three commissioners voting for it as opposed to the current requirement of four of the five commissioners was that the vote should be on the merit of the proposal and it would be hoped that the public can expect the commissioners they elected to be doing their jobs honestly and thoughtfully. There were a number of questions all of which John did his best to answer as completely as possible. All in all he was a most informative and interesting speaker and our gratitude was expressed in our applause.

John closed his remarks by making a pitch for our Hernando Beach Fire Department and the progress they're making towards a real community feel to our HBFD. The firemen are trying really hard to be a part of our community and want us residents to stop by and see what they're doing. There is also a pathway being provided for volunteer firemen to be trained to hopefully be permanent, paid firemen. Here again many questions were fielded and answered.

The business meeting was reconvened at 7:45 PM with a motion by Fran Baird to accept the March minutes as posted in the April Beachcomber, seconded by Benny Martinez and carried.

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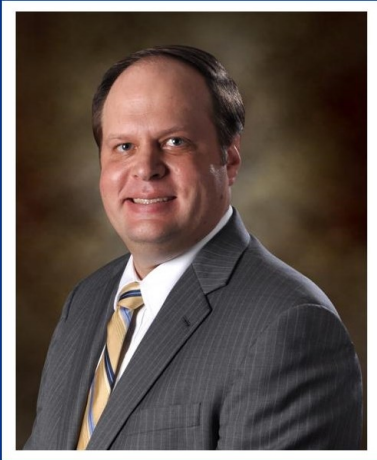
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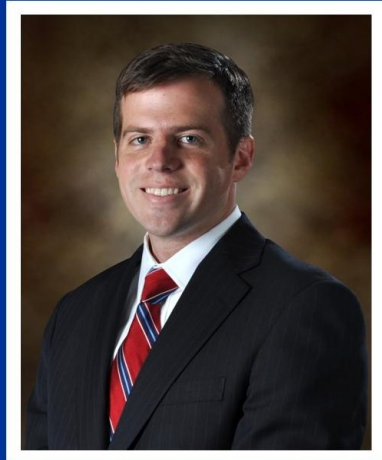

She then referenced the success of our Meet and Greet meeting last month and said that we will do something similar in June. The June meeting will have the title of "Fun in the Sun at the Gulf" and will feature speakers who will share all manner of information

about just that! More details to come next month. Lastly Kathy shared that our holiday party will be at the Coast Guard station on 12/9/17; so mark your calendars and await many more details for this fun event!

Publicity...Gladys Moore in Jen Browns' absence reminded us that the deadline for articles in the Beachcomber remains the 10<sup>th</sup> of each month. If you submit an article, please be sure and supply your information.

GAC...Chuck Greenwell began his report by stating that he is so pleased thus far with our newest commissioners, John Allocco, John Mitten and Steve Champion. He emphasized two points that John had made in his remarks: Transparency of our commissioners and willingness to work with and be responsive to the communities they represent and then Organization so that communities have a voice in the process. He emphasized the importance of people showing up at BOCC meetings and workshops for just that reason. Chuck stated that he is more than willing to give up all the volunteer work that both he and Diane do on our behalf to a better leader with better ideas and more time to devote to our representation provided there is someone willing to step up to the plate and take the responsibility that we all owe to

our community. He had several areas of concern. First, as taxpayers we should become familiar with the process of budget development by attending workshops and meetings on this subject. Margo further elaborated that while the GAC specifically has a set number of members who meet to discuss ideas and research issues, there are multiple opportunities throughout the year for public meetings where any member/resident is welcome and en-

couraged to come. Of course, all committees report their activities at our POA meetings. She recognized that we each have the interest of our community at heart and though we can't always agree on every issue, we can still work together toward that common goal.

Port Authority...Gladys reminded us that their monthly meeting is the third Wed of each month at 7 PM at the Linda Peterson Park rec center. The members are all volunteers and strictly have the interest of our waterways as a focus. Our speaker next month will be very knowledgeable about all things to do with this subject. Gladys also stated that the report from this committee can be found each month in the Beachcomber since their monthly meeting follows ours.

Crime Watch...Meetings remain the first Wed of the month at the VFW. Nancy Emrich made a motion that we make a donation from our treasury for Crime Watch in the sum of \$500.00. The motion was seconded by John Paul Reeve. After some discussion, the motion passed.

## HERNANDO BEACH LIFE

For this month's article I would like to expand on lure selection. cover, and conservation. As I had mentioned in previous articles, we live in an area that is classified as shallow water. In most situations people use live bait or cut bait. Pin fish, pilchards, creek chubs and crab are the usual choices. However, lures can be effective in catching our inshore species.

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It doesn't matter what time or place, conservation needs to be practiced and respected. Fishing pressure alone takes its toll on our fisheries. Running boats during shallow water tides through and across weed beds hurt our environment. Remember to obey the laws and if you have any doubts about our environment in Hernando Beach and surrounding areas, please notify the F.W.C. and local authorities. You will receive all pertinent information regarding what you would like to know from the authorities on the subjects.

One option would be the gold Johnson spoon. There are many ways to rig a spoon that make it effective for both salt water and fresh water species. Rigging is very important for the success of the spoon. The line of choice is 15 pound test line. Monofilament or braid will suffice. The spoon is used to glide over cover and can be retrieved in several ways. I always use a barrel swivel with a snap to decrease line twist. I choose a white skirt and a trouble hook trailer on the spoon. A soft plastic can be used as a trailer as well. The spoon is one of the oldest baits and fares well in most situations.

The cover in our area consists of turtle grass, eel grass, kelp, and oyster bars. The spoon works well over each of these types of cover. Trout and redfish will attack a spoon around any type of cover. Windy conditions make the spoon action better.

Several years ago on a fishing show called "Fishing Country" with Jerry Adams, we worked spoons specifically in the Hernando Beach area and to the north into Chaz. We targeted the spoon as the lure of the day. We caught several reds on the lure. We had a good day and all of the fish were released. Catch and release was started in the early 1980's and was practiced in both salt and fresh water scenarios.





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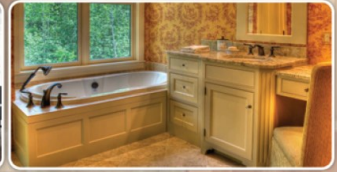
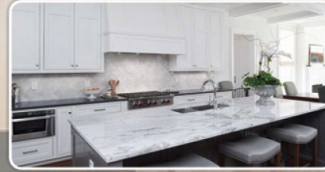
