This (silent) flag folding ceremony took place at the Detachment Christmas party honoring the memory of Frank Kowaleski who served 1967- 69 as a Fire Director Controlman with Sharpshooter Rifle Qualifications. Pictured is his son Jason, whose fiancé previously had requested this observance unbeknownst to him.

Allegedly there is no official flag folding ceremony or official meaning to each of the folds but there are several suggestions as for each fold, such as:

FLAG-FOLDING SCRIPT #1

As the flag is folded, these words are recited at each fold.

Fold 1: The 13 stripes represent the original 13 states: Delaware, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Georgia, Connecticut, Massachusetts, Maryland, South Carolina, New Hampshire, Virginia, New York, North Carolina, and Rhode Island

Fold 2: The 50 stars represent our 50 United States of America

Fold 3: "I know not what course others may take; but as for me, give me liberty or give me death", Patrick Henry

Fold 4: "These are the times that try men's souls. The summer soldier and the sunshine patriot will, in this crisis, shrink from the service of their country; but he that stands it now, deserves the love and thanks of man and woman", Thomas Paine

Fold 5: "We hold these truths to be self-evident that all men are created equal. They are endowed by their creator with certain unalienable rights. Among these are life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness", Declaration of Independence

Fold 6: "We the people of the United States, in order to form a more perfect union, establish justice, ensure domestic tranquility, provide for the common defense, promote the general welfare, and secure the blessings of liberty to ourselves and our posterity, do ordain and establish this Constitution of the United States of America", United States Constitution

Fold 7: "Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press, or the right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition the Government for a redress of grievances", First Amendment

Fold 8: "The basis of our political system is the right of the people to make and to alter their constitutions of government", George Washington

Fold 9: "My God! How little do my countrymen know what precious blessings they are in possession of, and which no other people on earth enjoy!" Thomas Jefferson

Fold 10: "Fourscore and seven years ago our fathers brought forth on this continent a new nation, conceived in liberty, and dedicated to the proposition that all men are created equal", Abraham Lincoln

Fold 11: "Give me your tired, your poor, your huddled masses yearning to breathe free, The wretched refuse of your teeming shore. Send these, the homeless, tempest-tossed to me, I lift my lamp beside the golden door", Emma Lazarus, inscription on the Statue of Liberty

Fold 12: "Ask not what your country can do for you, but what you can do for your country", John Fitzgerald Kennedy

Fold 13: "I have a dream that my four little children will one day live in a nation where they will not be judged by the color of their skin, but by the content of their character", Martin Luther King, Jr.

HISTORIAN'S CORNER

The History of Embassy Duty

Since the formal creation of the MSG program in December 1948, its unique partnership with the State Department has developed into one of the strongest in the history of U.S. civilian-military relations.

The State Department's relationship with the U.S. Marine Corps dates back to 1798, and for more than 200 years, Marines have been engaged in some way with U.S. diplomacy. U.S. Marines have escorted diplomatic personnel, rescued and defended U.S. embassies and consulates, and provided notable support to U.S. diplomatic efforts throughout our nation's history.

World Wars I and II: U.S. Marine Corps noncommissioned officers acted as diplomatic couriers safeguarding the delivery of diplomatic and confidential mail for the State Department throughout World War I, operating in hazardous locations, often with little protection other than their sidearms.

The origins of the present-day MSG program are rooted in World War II, when a 60-man Marine detachment was assigned to guard the U.S. embassy in war-torn London.

Post World War II: In December 1948, the U.S. Marine Corps agreed to provide a force to protect U.S. embassies and consulates throughout the world. The U.S. Marine Corps identified volunteers to fill these assignments, and the MSG program was formed in 1949. When the MSG program became operational in 1949 with the deployment of 83 Marines. Since then, the MSG program has become a prestigious assignment in the U.S. Marine Corps.

2013: President Barack Obama authorized the addition of 1,000 MSGs as part of the 2013 Defense Authorization Act, which increased the number of MSGs to approximately 2,450 at more than 150 diplomatic posts worldwide.
