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Aid and Attendance Benefit: A Little Known Veterans Resource

While it is not as well-known person to help with bathing, meal available to Veterans and their as many other military benefits, the VA Aid and Attendance benefit provides much needed assistance to individuals who require the regular care of another

preparation, dressing, medication monitoring and other activities of daily living. This tax-free benefit is provided by the Department of Veterans Affairs and may be

surviving spouses who live in assisted living communities, residential care homes and those receiving personal in-home care.

To qualify, a Veteran must have served at least 90 days consecutive active-duty service. He or she must have been discharged with any type of discharge other than a dishonorable discharge. They must also have served one day of active duty during wartime to be eligible for this benefit. Also eligible are Reservist or National Guard Veterans activated during wartime for 90 days and surviving spouses of Veterans if married at the time of their Veteran's death.

Eligible Veterans must be age 65 or older or totally disabled or a resident or patient in a skilled nursing facility due to loss of mental or physical abilities or getting Social Security Disability Insurance or Supplemental Security Income. For a surviving spouse, there is no age requirement.

maximum Aid and Attendance Benefits are as follows:

Veteran: up to \$1936/month. Surviving spouse: up to \$1244/

Married veteran: up to \$2295/ month

Married veteran couple: up to \$3071/month

Proof of the need for assistance with activities of daily living is required. Certain income qualifications also apply, however most unreimbursed expenses such as insurance premiums, the cost of assisted living, nursing home, or in-home care can help reduce the counted income. Other qualifications may apply but each case is decided on the facts of the individual's circumstances.

Painesville City Sidewalk Program

passed the Painesville City Sidewalk Program, a two phase infrastructure improvement plan aimed at improving walkability in the community.

During Phase 1 (2018-ongoing), city staff replaced damaged sidewalk slabs that fell under city responsibility and removed any trees in the tree lawn that were deemed hazardous to sidewalks or infrastructure.

(2020-ongoing), Phase 2 has property owners replacing sidewalk slabs that fall under their responsibility and any trees in the tree lawn that may be deemed hazardous to those sidewalks. As a result, the city applied for a Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) through the Lake

In 2018 City Council County Commissioners Office and was awarded \$50,000 to fund the Disadvantaged Sidewalk Assistance Program for low to moderate income Painesville residents. Please visit www. painesville.com/sidewalks more information.

> Last year, the residents of Ward 2 received a letter stating that the trees marked in the tree lawn would be removed and the sidewalks that were marked the City's responsibility would be replaced. The Engineering Department is still compiling data for the resident responsible sidewalk violation. All individualized letters for those who still need to replace sidewalks in Ward 2 will be sent out by October 31, 2022.

Lake Humane Society Expands Cpl Joshua Harmon Pets to Vets Program

Dog trainers, who use positive reinforcement methods, will help choose a shelter dog from Lake Humane Society that is a good fit for the Veterans they are working with. The dog will be adopted to the Veteran and then go through a 5-week training program. Not only is the training program beneficial to the Veteran, the likelihood of a dog being returned to Lake Humane Society for behavioral reasons will be extremely low.

Veteran Canine Connection will pay the adoption fee, supply 1-year of flea, tick and heartworm medications, provide veterinary care for the first year of the adoption and conduct the training at no cost to the Veteran.

"We are so excited to begin our partnership with Lake Humane Society. They are the first shelter to offer us a real commitment to help us to find the right dogs for our Veteran applicants. With their help, we hope to expand our presence in greater Cleveland and the surrounding communities. Together we will have the opportunity to meet the needs of our great Veterans by connecting them with shelter animals and ultimately enhance the lives of both the Veterans and their dogs.", said Joan Tiefel, Director of Veteran Canine Connection.

The Cpl Joshua Harmon Pets to Vets program is part of a compassionate mission to protect animals and build connections between pets and people through advocacy and education. Cpl Joshua Harmon was a U.S. Army Soldier assigned to the 25th Light Infantry Division (nicknamed Tropic Lightning), 35th Infantry Regiment, 2nd Battalion. He served as a Combat Medic attached to the Scouts Sniper Platoon and received the Army Medal of Commendation of Valor for performing extraordinary lifesaving measures. Additionally, Cpl Harmon was awarded the Combat Medical Badge and is a Bronze Star recipient.

Joshua was deployed to Kirkuk, Iraq on August 5, 2006, serving in Operation Iraqi Freedom. When returning from a mission on August 22, 2007, Joshua, along with thirteen fellow soldiers, lost their lives when their UH-60 Black Hawk helicopter crashed in Multaka, outside of Kirkuk.

Joshua was a Class of 2005, Mentor High School graduate and a devoted husband to the love of his life Kristin (Rathjen) Harmon. The Pets to Vets program was named after Joshua because of his lifelong love of animals.

"This partnership is a winwin for everyone. Our shelter dogs will find loving homes and Veterans will have a new companion animal that shows them unconditional love. We know that pets help alleviate loneliness, bring comfort and reduce anxiety. We are proud to be working with Veteran Canine Connection and excited to enhance the Cpl Joshua Harmon Pets to Vets program", said Lori Caszatt, Interim Executive Director at Lake Humane Society.

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
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AEP - Annual Election Period

During this period, a beneficiary can switch from one Medicare




