- 2. **RECREATIONAL AND OTHER VEHICLES**: No person shall be allowed to bring or use upon the Fairgrounds, any motor scooter, motorbike, motorcycle, coaster sled, skateboard, roller skates, rollerblades, bike, ATV, golf cart or diminutive vehicle upon the Fairgrounds during the period of the Fair without the approval of the Fair Board. Such policy does not include wheelchairs or other medically necessary devices or vehicles to be used by Fair Board directors in their duties.
- 3. **TRAILERS**: Livestock trailers must be parked in designated area. Violators will be towed at owner's expense.
 - After unloading livestock, check with superintendents for instructions on parking trailers.
 - Parking is prohibited in the livestock area between 2 pm and 9 pm Monday through Saturday. (Only exception is for loading and unloading livestock.) Vehicles in violation will be towed at owner's expense.
- 4. **GROUNDS REGULATIONS:** No outside coolers, cans, or bottles will be allowed on the Fairgrounds except as may be used by campers in the campgrounds. Coolers, cans and bottles will be confiscated at the gate. Proper clothing must be worn on Fairgrounds. Patrons must wear shoes and shirt, or risk expulsion from the grounds.

- 9. **OVERNIGHT:** Persons staying on the grounds overnight must present a ticket or entry pass when asked to do so by the Fair Board.
- 10. **SMOKING:** NO SMOKING in livestock barn by order of the City Fire Marshall.
- 11. **CLAIMS FOR INJURY:** No claims for injury to any person or property shall ever be asserted, nor suit instituted or maintained against the NEMO Fair, or its officers or their agents, representatives, volunteers, or employees. If any damage, loss, or injury to person or property shall be caused by reason of any neglect or willful acts of any persons, firm, or corporation or their agents, representatives, volunteers, or employees having license or privilege to exhibit on said fairgrounds, or occupying a space thereon the NEMO Fair shall, in no manner, be responsible therefore, and in case it be subject to any expenses or liability all persons causing same or liable therefore, shall indemnify the said NEMO Fair.

UNDER NO CIRCUMSTANCES WILL THE NEMO FAIR BE RESPONSIBLE FOR DEATH, THEFT, DAMAGE, OR INJURY TO ANY PERSONS, ANIMAL, ARTICLE OR VEHICLE.

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The Country Revolution Tour

featuring Jason Michael Carroll, Mark Wills and Darryl Worley Wednesday, July 19, 2017

JASON MICHAEL CARROLL

Sometimes it's hard to keep on top of everything that's going on in your life. Just ask Jason Michael Carroll. Since debuting at No. 1 on the album charts and lofting five Top 20 hits since 2006, he's cut several more acclaimed releases, built a large and loyal following, toured with superstars including Brooks & Dunn, Alan Jackson and Carrie Underwood, written countless songs, kept up a grueling schedule of shows throughout the United States

and for American troops abroad ... He's been busy, in other words. So he can be forgiven for forgetting one little thing in the midst of all this activity. "I forgot to keep making records!" he admits, with a laugh. "Until one day one of my fans hit me up on Instagram or Twitter and said, 'Jason, we love all these new songs you're playing! When are you going to put them on an album for us?" And I had a Homer Simpson moment, like, 'Doh!"

Carroll has been there -- in the emptiness of love lost in "All I'm Drinking 'Bout," the dizziness of early romance in "Love Like July," and in the warmth of a bond that has strengthened through time and trials in the beautiful "Here with Me."

Each song rings true also because of how they're performed. Typically, country artists will write or gather songs first, record them and only then take them out on the road to play before audiences. And often they bring in studio players to make sure everything runs smoothly and antiseptically.

Not so with Carroll. In part because of his Homer Simpson moment, he and his band hammered out their arrangements onstage, tailoring them over time to what felt good to them and rocked their venues as well. So it made sense to bring the guys into the studio as well, where they could lay down their road-tested parts with the same intensity they'd achieved in show after show.

"We don't want to create a project in the studio that we can't recreate live," Carroll states. "That's why there's hardly any fiddle on the record at all, except for a little bit on 'Close Enough.' Now, I love the fiddle, but we don't happen to have a fiddle player in our band, so we kept it real to what we do live."

Texas-born, he remains faithful to North Carolina, where he was raised. "I just felt like I needed to be close to my kids," he says. "That's why I've never actually lived in Nashville. I wanted to be able to pick them up from school. I want to take them to the movies. So as much as I love Nashville, I've been able to be a full-time dad because I live here -- about 25 minutes from a Walmart and 30 minutes from an airport."

MARK WILLS

The Reader's Digest version of Mark Wills' story makes it clear he's an award-winning singer's singer. His matchless phrasing, passionate and meaningful delivery and right-on-the money vocals make each and every song he performs come alive. Like a picture perfect painting, Wills' music is a vocal work of art that walks right off the canvas and into the hearts of country music lovers alike. Bringing the Wills' dimension to some of the greatest songs ever written, he's not necessarily become known for being trendy, hip or even on the cutting edge, but rather and simply as a damn good singer! "I think I'm a good storyteller to make a song meaningful. Whether romantic or 'reality,' my focus is on the music delivery to make it my own for the people who listen—so that they can make it their own."

Since garnering his Top New Male Vocalist recognition in 1998, Wills has become a staple in country music, like salt and pepper on a table; the chapters may have changed, but the story continues. The father of two daughters, a husband and the head of household, Mark's role in life and music are one in the same. "I think I'm at a point where I've seen all sides of me! I've become more aware of who I am not only as an artist, but as a father, a husband and a friend...and as a dad, I want to put out music my children can listen to; all in all, I take more ownership in it."

Anyone who has ever seen him in concert, or has met with him personally, knows that inside this humble, good ol' boy, country singer dwells a soul who just wants to speak to and for all with his music. Wills has made more seven trips to entertain our troops; he is familiar with the places they've been. His trips have taken him to Iraq, Afghanistan and Kuwait. He has also performed at several events for the Champions for Champions Organization, the USO and a variety of Fallen Soldier Charities here in the U.S. Having become personally acquainted with the faces of our brothers and sisters of the military.

First of all, it's a privilege to provide a little joy and entertainment for these people. The first time I went, it was a life-changing experience. The freedom that we have is not something that I take for granted--they're literally giving their lives

for us. By playing a show for them or releasing a song that shares their emotional story, it's my way, however minimal, to say 'Thank You.'" Supporting our troops is just one of a number of philanthropic endeavors Mark Wills dedicates his time and effort to. He has aligned with USA Cares to launch a national awareness campaign surrounding the severity of Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) and Traumatic Brain Injury (TBI). Since 2007, Mark has been the spokesperson for the Children's Miracle Network and its annual celebrations.

As an active representative, he accompanies miracle children to Walt Disney World and then to Washington each year as part of a national awareness campaign; the children enjoy lunch with Congress and a trip to the White House to meet with the President.

Turning the page from bringing all-American music to life to his own brush with death, Wills was caught by surprise by an unexpected, eye-opening crisis. In October 2010, Mark experienced what felt like a "poke" in his side that was followed by flu-like symptoms. A visit to the doctor took him straight to the emergency room. "The nurse said, 'we have to admit you immediately,' I said, 'I need to go home to let the girls know,' her response to me was, 'You don't have the time." Mark suffered from an intestinal infection that could have taken his life, but he pulled through with a nine-inch long scar to remind him of its value. "It was a dire circumstance and it gave me a whole new perspective in all aspects of my life."

A man whose appetite for life surpasses what most people can only dream of - a dedicated parent, philanthropist, outdoorsman, jokester - but, more than anything, else Mark Wills is an artist and, behind the artist, is an even better singer.

"When the story comes to 'The End,' I just want to be remembered as a great singer - who sang great songs - and used his talents to not only speak to people but was the voice for many."

DARRYL WORLEY

Throughout a career that has produced nearly twenty hit singles, including three #1s, as well as chart-topping albums and sales in the millions, Darryl Worley has set himself one primary goal. "I've always set out to make sure every song on every album is a good one," he says. "I want every cut to be a potential single." It is an approach that has helped to make Darryl a mainstay of modern country music. His unquestioned musical integrity earned him an enviable connection with the American public and a reputation as a genuinely traditional country artist who doesn't follow trends or fads, but rather his own bedrock convictions as an artist and a person. It doesn't hurt that he is a distinctive singer and first-rate songwriter whose music chronicles life, love and the world situation with equal facility.

"My job as a songwriter," he says, "is to listen to people and come up with something they'll relate to." It's a journey that took route in Hardin County, Tennessee, among people whose lives were defined in part by hard work, economic hardship, deep religious conviction and bootleg liquor. It paid to be tough and smart, and Darryl was both.

He was also musical—his grandfather played banjo and his mother sang in church, and he took after them. Tall and athletic, Darryl might have earned a sports scholarship to college, but he lost the opportunity when he broke his back playing basketball. Still, he earned a degree in biology with a minor in organic chemistry, playing music in honky-tonks all the while. He continued playing as he worked in the chemical business and taught school for a year, torn between the pressure he felt to establish a secure career and his deep-seated need to pursue music. Finally, his preacher father helped him sort it out.

"One day he said, 'If you're still thinking about that music thing you better do it now'," says Darryl, "because if you don't, you'll be trapped by the obligation of the debt and the responsibilities that come with life.' That was all I needed to hear."

A gifted and hard-working songwriter, he signed a deal with Fame Publishing in Muscle Shoals, Alabama, to write songs for \$150 a week. Years of hard living and honky-tonk nights made their way into his music, and artists like George Jones cut his early work. He was signed to Nashville's EMI Publishing and in 1994 made his way to Nashville. After half a decade of sometimes frustrating development deals, in 1999 he earned the label deal that moved his career into high gear. It is telling that Darryl was quick to turn the resultant celebrity to good purpose. His Tennessee River Run is one of the longest-running and most artist-identified charitable events out there.

"We hit our ten-year mark last year, and it's been an amazing decade," he says. "We've continued to bring in great entertainment and hold a variety of events for people all around my home town. We continue to refine it in ways that bring in even more for the charity, and that's the bottom line."

Darryl was able to make a \$200,000 payment to the local cancer treatment center which bears his name, paying off the debt completely.

He has been a tireless performer for troops here and overseas following a 2002 visit to Afghanistan, Kuwait and Uzbekistan that helped inspire "Have You Forgotten?" He has been back nine times since then, playing both full band concerts and special acoustic sets at remote Forward Operating Bases for troops who rarely receive celebrity entertainment.

Darryl has been honored with the VFW's Americanism Award, the USO Merit Award and the U.S. Army Appreciation Award. He has also been cited by the Tennessee House of Representatives for his contributions to country music.

A dedicated family man, he credits the current stability in his life to wife Kimberly and daughter Savannah. "I feel like my wife and baby girl have breathed new life into me," he says. It's made me want to be a better man, a better Christian, a better husband, a better role model. I feel like I've got my priorities in order."

Through it all, his ability to draw on real life to make deeply moving music has made him one of country's most passionately appreciated artists. With the completion of One Time Around, Darryl adds to that already rich legacy.





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2017 NEMO FAIR QUEEN PAGEANT RULES AND REGULATIONS




The NEMO Fair Pageant competition is held annually in Kirksville in conjunction with the NEMO Fair. Entrants agree to abide by all rules of the NEMO Fair Pageant that are in effect now or as announced later. Entrants agree that the time, manner and method of judging shall be solely at the discretion of the NEMO Fair and the decision of the judges will be final. Entrants agree to pay an entry fee of \$40.00.

- 1. Contestants shall be citizens of the United States and residents of the state of Missouri for no fewer than six months immediately preceding.
- 2. The NEMO Queen/Teen Miss will automatically relinquish her title if she has a child, enters into a marriage contract, or chooses to cohabit with a male in lieu of a marriage contract. A contestant must have never been convicted of any crime or have any criminal charges pending.
- 3. Royalty must be present for <u>ALL</u> obligations as determined by the queen committee including the Saturday before the upcoming fair regardless of any circumstances.
- 4. Contestants for the Division of Queen shall be between the ages of 17 years old and 22 years old. Contestants for the Division of Teen Miss shall be between the ages of 13 years old and 16 years old. Contestants for the Division of Young Miss shall be between the ages of 9 years old and 12 years old. All of the above Divisions shall be as of September 1, 2017.
- 5. Entries shall be postmarked no later than June 15, 2017.
- 6. All entries shall be sent to NEMO Fair Queen Pageant c/o Cathy Houston, 25928 Benton Way, Kirksville, MO 63501.
- 7. A complete entry **MUST** include the following:
 - a) \$40.00 entry fee non-refundable.
 - b) Completed entry form.
 - c) One wallet size photo which will become property of NEMO Fair Association and will not be returned. *Failure to include all 3 items listed above will result in contestant being ineligible to compete in contest.*
- 8. Each Contestant/pageant division winner under the age of 18 must be accompanied by a parent or legal guardian during duration of the 2017 NEMO Fair, while representing the NEMO Fair Association.
- 9. Conduct deemed to be improper and detrimental to the NEMO Fair or the queen pageant will be reason for disqualification and dismissal by the queen committee.
- 10. If Miss NEMO Fair fails to complete her term, the title will be passed to the runner-up in the order of their rank, beginning with the first runner-up.
- 11. Selection of the division winners will be based on the following scoring basis: Personal interviews, 40 percent; public speaking or talent performance, 40 percent; evening gown, 20 percent. Talent is limited to 2 minutes.
- 12. The NEMO Fair Association will furnish the following for the contestant competing for Missouri State Fair Queen:
 - a) Entry fee for the contest.
 - b) One night lodging for the candidate and chaperone with the Sedalia Welcome Committee.
- 13. Missouri State Fair Queen contestant must provide her own chaperone per State Fair Queen contest rules.
- 14. NEMO Fair Queen Committee has the right to change rules to meet the needs of the contest.

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MYERS Pedal Tractor Pulls, LLC

July 21 • 2:30 registration • 3:00 pull time Rules for a Sanctioned Pedal Tractor Pull

- 1. The Event will be for ages 4-12 years old.
 - There will be 9 divisions by age (mixing or not) boys and girls. It is incredibly important that you run the pull in the same way the State and National are run. It is unfair to kids to do otherwise.
 - **There should never be a use of the <u>child's weight</u> to make classes. This is unethical and unfair. This is usually a sign of inferior equipment. This has no similarity to further competition at the State or National level. Please think of the children first.
- 2. Children 3 years old <u>may</u> participate <u>before</u> the 4 year old competition, but will not be eligible for awards or sanctions. 12 year old competitors on the day of the pull may participate, but if 13 on or before the National Pedal Pull, the last Saturday in September, are ineligible for State. Not all sponsors allow time for 2 and 3 year olds please be patient with us it may not be our choice. Remember the event is 4-12 year olds.
- 3. Competitors will enter the division they are the day of the pedal pull, <u>including State and National. State</u> and National will require proof of age and proper sanctioning paper work from lower meets.
- 4. Each participant must register prior to the starting of their age group and have a parent or guardian's signature on the registration forms.
- 5. Rules of Conduct by Participants:
 - A. The child may not place their hand on the tractor tire at any time during their pull to help increase their pulling distance.
 - B. The child may not place one or both feet on the ground to push the tractor forward.
 - C. There can be no loss of forward pressure. In other words, they cannot hesitate or absolutely never jerk the equipment.
 - D. The child will remain in the seat at all times. If a contestant lifts off (losing contact with any part of or sliding over the back of) the seat the pull will be stopped and their distance will be measured to that point. The classic is standing to pedal like a bike while not touching the seat.**
 - E. All participants must be wearing shoes, no bare feet. (We would suggest tie or Velcro shoes that cover the foot and give traction on the pedal.)
- 6. Any arguing with the track officials by a contestant, parent, or guardian will not be allowed and could result in <u>disqualification of the contestant</u>. If you have a disagreement, please talk to us after the pull in private. We will display sportsmanship in all cases and should that not be possible the offender will be asked to leave. No one is perfect, but we will handle things in the proper way.
- 7. All rulings by track officials are final and may supersede any of the above rules. In the case of need, a sled may be re-weighted and the group may start over. If for any reason the tractor or sled malfunction causing an error in the results, there may be a rerun. If a tractor breaks in the middle of a division, we will most likely restart the division with the replacement tractor.
- 8. Sanctioning: We as pullers are sanctioned in Iowa, Missouri, Nebraska, and South Dakota. 1st place and 2nd place boy and girl in each age group will qualify for State regardless of overall finish. In some States it will include the 3rd place boy and girl as well.
- 9. Two items of note; the sled will be given a tug to get the pedals moving, and therefore, there is no reason to set pedals any more, second the seat is set once for the whole age group Never per individual.
 ** This seat issue was a question to us as Kayla seemed to get nipped by kids sliding up the back of the seat. Then last year the National advised us it was permissible to slide without losing contact with the seat. So the height of the seat is the limit to that slide. They can not sit on top of high seat or slide over the top. We were also told the same at International when asked.

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The Austin VanHoutan MEMORIAL AWARD

The annual Austin VanHoutan Memorial Award is sponsored by Hazel Creek 4-H Club. Eligible nominees must be an Adair County 4-H member in good standing. A plaque with the winner's name will be presented to the NEMO Fair Board. The winner will receive a certificate and \$50 cash award.

The Hazel Creek 4-H Club will make nominations for this award. Recipients will be judged on sportsmanship, courtesy, kindness, positive attitude and friendliness. The person should show an enthusiasm for life with a helpful personality and willing to mentor others. They should embody the principals of Learning by Doing and Making the Best Better. This individual may not have been awarded a blue ribbon for his/her project, but was willing to put heart into all they do. The person should be willing to learn lessons from failures and continue to strive to do better.

Rodney Scott MEMORIAL 4-H AWARD

This annual award is made possible by the family of the late Rodney Scott. Rodney was a past member of the Novinger Town and Country 4-H Club, as well as a club leader and a member of the Northeast Missouri Fair Board. Rodney enjoyed working with the young and old at Fair time.

AWARD: Annual plaque and bond donated by the family at the 4-H/FFA Livestock Sale.

ELIGIBILITY: Any bona fide Adair County 4-H member who exhibits at the NEMO Fair.

RECIPIENTS WILL BE JUDGED ON: Showmanship: 25 points. Courtesy: willing to help others: 50 points. Enthusiasm: pleasant attitude: 25 points. Total: 100 points.

Roy E. Jackson MEMORIAL ADAIR CO. 4-H AWARD

Description: This annual award was made possible by the family and friends of the late Mr. Roy E. Jackson, a past president of the Northeast Missouri Fair, a community leader, and a dedicated and enthusiastic person with high ideals for young people.

Eligibility: Any bona fide 4-H member who has an exhibit in the Northeast Missouri Fair.

Award: An annual plaque, donated by family and friends to be presented at the 4-H/FFA Livestock Sale.

Score Card: Part I: A: Sportsmanship and courtesy during the Fair - 25 points. B: Friendliness, pleasant attitude during the Fair - 25 points. C: Enthusiasm of the Individual during the Fair - 25 points.

Part II: The 4-H member who has done the best with what he/she had to work with. This could very likely include a white ribbon exhibit, but a blue ribbon boy or girl who displays qualities of the above in Part III: 25 points.

Selection: Selection of award recipients to be made by a silent committee who will observe 4-H members throughout the Fair each year.

The Myron Propst MEMORIAL COMMERCIAL AWARD

A plaque with the winners names will also be presented to the NEMO Fairboard and to Mr. Jason Dimmitt for the Vo-Tech School.



General Livestock Rules & Regulations

- 1. ALL ENTRIES RECEIVED AFTER JULY 1, 2017 WILL BE ACCEPTED SUBJECT TO PEN AVAILABILITY. LATE ENTRIES RECEIVED JULY 2-10, 2017 WILL BE ASSESSED DOUBLE ENTRY FEE. LATE ENTRIES RECEIVED AFTER JULY 10, 2017 WILL BE ASSESSED TRIPLE ENTRY FEE.
- 2. Application for entry must be made upon printed form found in this fair book. A check for entry fees must be enclosed with the entry form. Entries with no money, incorrect amounts, or incomplete information may be returned to exhibitor. Entries from this Fair book are open to 4-H and FFA members in the State of Missouri. The NEMO Fair Association states that a Season Pass or Day Pass is required for admittance onto the fairgrounds.
- 3. All entries must be sent to: Fair Entries, NEMO Fair, P.O. Box 287, Kirksville, MO 63501, by July

- 1, 2017. Entries July 2-10 will be doubled entries depending on pin availability. Entries July 11-Fair will be triple entries depending on pin availability. After July 1, late penalties will be imposed.
- 4. All 4-H and FFA classes at the NEMO Fair will follow guidelines set forth by the Missouri 4-H Youth Development Program. For a complete listing of all rules and regulations please see the 4-H and FFA section in the 2017 Missouri State Fair Catalog. Some rules may be superseded by rules in this book.
- 5. Articles or animals will not be placed on exhibition unless entered in the Superintendent's Book and entry tag (if required) attached.
- 6. All entries are to be in place at times and dates specified in schedule.
- 7. The Superintendent in each department will be responsible for assigning space and arranging

exhibits, and his/her directions must be followed.

- 8. Exhibitors must accompany their animal/exhibit to the Fair, care for them, and exhibit them. If this regulation cannot be followed, a letter of circumstance must be submitted to the 4-H July Council Meeting. Superintendents may permit another 4-H/FFA member to show an animal in case of illness or physical handicap.
- 9. Uncontrollable animals or animals which the exhibitor cannot handle alone may be disqualified by the Superintendent and required to leave the ring and/or grounds.
- 10. In cases where a member has more than one animal in a class another 4-H/FFA exhibitor must show the second animal.
- Minimal assistance is allowed by another 4-H/ FFA exhibitor at the discretion of the Superintendent.
- 12. Showmanship classes will run oldest age category to youngest. There will be no master showmanship classes; exhibitors will not be required to advance to next age category after winning in their category. (ages as of 1/1/2017; 14 and over, 11-13, and 8-10 for beef, sheep, swine, poultry and goat)
- 13. Unless otherwise stated, no exhibitor will be allowed more than two (2) entries in an individual class and one (1) entry in a pen class in the beef, sheep, swine, poultry, rabbit, bucket calf, goat departments. Each exhibitor will be limited to four steers regardless of breed.
- 14. Each exhibit shall be owned by the exhibitor and shall represent work accomplished in a project in which the exhibitor was enrolled during the past year. A written statement by the leader, stating that the exhibit is bona fide work, must accompany each exhibit, if requested by the Superintendent.
- 15. No red ribbon entries for championship.
- 16. An Adair County 4-H & FFA Show will be held as well as a NEMO Fair 4-H & FFA Show.
- 17. Believing it is in the best interest of all 4-H/FFA exhibitors to maintain a reputation of integrity and to present a wholesome and progressive image, 4-H and FFA members are expected to conduct themselves according to the best traditions of their respective organizations. Inappropriate conduct (drinking, stealing, vandalism, and indiscreet behavior) WILL NOT BE TOLERATED. Any violation of this rule will be grounds for disqualifying the exhibitor and/or livestock involved. Further, any premium monies earned will be forfeited.
- 18. All non-exhibitors will be expected to vacate barns by 12 midnight each evening.
- 19. State Health Regulations will apply to all livestock entries, unless specified otherwise.
- 20. Exhibitors are not permitted to show the same breed in both 4-H and FFA. For example, if an exhibitor shows Chester White hogs in 4-H, he/she cannot show Chester White hogs in FFA, or if an exhibitor shows market steers in FFA, he/she cannot show market steers in 4-H. Animals are designated

- (4-H or FFA) at the time of entry and may not be switched to another division after entries have been received prior to the Fair.
- 21. The Adair County Fair states that any exhibitor (4-H/FFA) may only show in one county fair as "in County" in one calendar year. If violated, the exhibitor will accept the punishment set forth by the Joint Fair Committee.
- 22. 4-H members may exhibit only in projects in which they are enrolled in the current 4-H year.
- 23. All exhibitors must clean their pens before they will be released by Superintendent.
- 24. Missouri Show Me Quality Assurance (MSMQA): By June 1, 2017, all 4-H exhibitors enrolled in food animal projects including beef, sheep, swine, dairy cattle, meat and dairy goats, rabbits, and poultry must complete the appropriate level of MSMQA certification to be considered an exhibitor in good standing in that project.

<u>Judging</u> - Competent judges have been secured for all departments.

- 1. No one shall act as judge for any class in which he or she is exhibiting.
- 2. A judge, at his/her discretion may withhold any or all premiums if an article or animal in his/her judgement is not worthy of award.
- 3. Decision of judges shall be final subject only to protest for good reason and under the procedure hereinafter described under the heading "Protest".
- 4. Anyone attempting to interfere with the judges during the adjudication, or publicly expressing disapproval in the area or grounds of decision of the judges, shall forfeit premiums and be excluded from further competition.

<u>Protest</u> - ALL PROTESTS MUST BE MADE IN WRITING to the Joint Review Board. The protest should include the reason for the alleged ineligibility and the rule governing the case must be noted. All protests must be signed. Such protest must be filed with a Joint Review Committee by or before 8 a.m. the day following the date the award is made.

Liabilities of Exhibitors

- 1. In no event shall University of Missouri Extension, Adair County University Extension Council, University Extension Staff or Adair County 4-H Council, its officers, directors or members be held responsible for any loss or damage to the property of person or exhibitor or other persons while on the fairgrounds whether said loss or damage shall arise from accident or any cause whatsoever.
- 2. Entry form will serve as agreement that you understand and accept responsibility for following all guidelines and understand that failure to do so will result in dismissal from event or activity.

Release of Exhibits - With the consent of the division superintendent, exhibits may be released only in the event of an extreme emergency, or for the purpose of attending a conflicting show by showing the proper papers. Failure to comply will mean automatic forfeiture of all premiums due to exhibitor.

Payment of Premiums

Premiums awarded by the judges under the rule herein described will be distributed as soon after the Fair as possible. ALL payments will be made by check.

In making payment for premiums awarded. no evidence of award will be recognized except Superintendents Entry Book properly approved and signed by Superintendent and Judge of that department in which the exhibitor is entered.

Absolutely NO straw. Wood chip bedding only.

Believing in the best interest of all exhibitors to maintain a reputation of integrity and to represent a wholesome and progressive image, all participants (adult and youth) must observe the following guidelines for conduct:

- 1. Participate fully in all sessions.
- 2. Show respect for property and facilities used during the activity.
- 3. Observe the established schedule.
- 4. Appropriate and courteous behavior is expected. Swearing and obscene gestures are not permitted. Smoking by minors is prohibited; smoking by adults is discouraged, and prohibited in the livestock arena/barns. All other participants, guests, and visitors should be treated with respect and common courtesy.
- 5. This event should bring out a "natural high". No alcohol, stimulants, or nonprescription drugs will be allowed.

(Further, any premium monies earned by a disqualified exhibitor will be forfeited.)

General Rules

- 1. Animals can only be entered in one division (4-H or FFA), to be designated at time of entry, and are not allowed to be switched to another division.
- 2. Animals are to be groomed by the 4-H or FFA exhibitor with assistance from the immediate family or other 4-H or FFA exhibitor only. (Immediate family is defined as father, mother, brothers, sisters, step-parents, step-siblings, grandparents, aunts, uncles and legal guardians of the exhibitor.) All animals will be groomed in the barns or immediately adjacent to the barns.
- 3. Breeding cattle to be shown in a breed class must be recorded in an association recognized by the National Society of Recorded Associations, except that calves dropped this

year must be eligible for registry. Registration papers may be called for at any time during the Fair. All registered breeding animals must show in their respective breeds class if that breed has a represented class. Breeding beef classes may be available for the following breeds: Angus, Chianina, Hereford, Limousin, Maine Anjou, Shorthorn, Simmental, All Other Breeds, and Crossbred/Commercial. - 18. Not more than one (1) calf in the group may be owned by the same individual in the group of 3 steers or market heifer class. Every animal exhibited in the group must have been previously exhibited in the same division (4-H or FFA) as an individual.
- Beef Herdsmanship Award will be determined by a silent committee and will be based on the following: sportsmanship-25 points, cleanliness

(Immediate family is defined as father, mother, brothers, sisters, stepparents, step-siblings, grandparents, aunts, uncles and legal guardians of the exhibitor.) All animals will be groomed in the barns or immediately adjacent to the barns.
- 11. All breeding sheep must have been owned and cared for by exhibitor since July 1, 2017. Market lambs must be owned by and cared for by exhibitor since May 1, 2017.

- Birds must be from a Pullorum\Typhoid free flock. Current certificate is required. Testing of birds will be done at entry time. Testing must occur prior to caging. No early entries. Birds will be disqualified from entry if caged prior to testing.
- 6. Eggs must be boxed and tagged with the exhibitor's name. Only 1 dozen eggs (one entry) per person. No premium paid.
- 7. The exhibitor will be responsible for care of his/ her own birds.
- 8. All reasonable care will be exercised to avoid mistakes, loss, damage or injury but the risk is the exhibitor's.
- 9. Pre-entry is required on Livestock Entry Form found in back of this book. All items brought must match entry form, if you have changes you must go to the office and register your new item. - 3. Clover Kids will have the opportunity to show their pet and speak with a judge regarding nutrition, grooming, or special behaviors. Clover Kids are encouraged to show the pet about which they did their pet poster.
- 4. All pets must come properly restrained or contained. Appropriate examples include on a leash or in a box, cage, or bowl.
- 5. An adult must supervise Clover Kids and pets at all times.
- 6. Animal health requirements must be followed for all species.
- 7. Any female animal in season cannot be shown.
- 8. As with all 4-H Clover Kids events, the pet show is non-competitive. Participants will receive a participation ribbon.

General Rules

- Each exhibitor shall be required to wear the official 4-H/FFA t-shirt of the Fair and their assigned exhibitor number at the time of all judging events.
- 2. Items made by 4-H members should reflect the skills they have learned in their 4-H project during the current program year, the needs and interests of the 4-H'er, and quality workmanship. Use the 4-H project literature and the "Clover" for exhibit ideas and criteria. "4-H is an out-of-school education program. Consequently, articles made in school under the supervision of teachers and on which students receive school credit do not qualify as 4-H project work. This is a duplication of credit for single effort and to a large extent, prevents 4-H from achieving its full objectives."
- 3. Exhibits are displayed at the risk of the individual 4-H/FFA member. The 4-H staff, FFA staff, University Extension Council or staff is not responsible for loss or damage to items.
- 4. Only Adair County 4-H and FFA exhibitors may advance to the State Fair. Exhibits must be of blue ribbon quality to advance to the State Fair or to receive awards. Members are limited to two exhibits in the State Fair 4-H Building.
- The number of exhibits per class that Adair County may enter is printed in bracketed numbers in the class listing. Those exhibits from outside Adair County will have had the opportunity for state fair evaluation in the home county of the exhibitor.
- 6. 4-H members may exhibit only in projects in which they are enrolled in the current 4-H year. Items exhibited must be made in the current year and must be the work of the 4-H member submitting the exhibit. Scrapbooks made in projects other than class 315 will be displayed in the Library at the State Fair. Notebooks, recipes, binders should not accompany any exhibit.
- 7. A member may enter up to three exhibit items per project. <u>Each item must</u> be listed on the Building Voucher entry form to avoid a late entry fee. <u>Registration Deadline is July 1</u>. A late fee of \$1.00 per item will be assessed on all entries postmarked after July 1 and will be \$3 per item will be assessed on all entries postmarked July

- 2-10 and fair entries will triples July 11 if space is available. Late building exhibitor entries accepted at the NEMO Fair Office until July 17, at 8:00 a.m. and judged last; as opposed to late additions to the building voucher which will be accessed the designated fee but will be judged according to the regular schedule. (See judging schedule).
- 8. The following items will be accepted/displayed at the Missouri State Fair in the Library which allows fairgoers to touch and examine the items: notebooks (three ring binders only) with county, region and youth name on spine, posters (flat only; do not fasten items to the poster), see additional poster rules in #9, file card systems. These items will be accepted from any project. Youths who exhibit notebooks, posters, or file card systems should understand that their exhibit will be handled.
- 9. Where the exhibit list states "any item made", the 4-H member may display any item made in that project. This includes notebooks, file cards, photo displays, posters or educational displays. Regardless of project, the following dimensions must be used. Items which do not comply with size or other specifications will not receive a premium or ribbon. Do not attach any items to an exhibit such as notebooks, pictures, etc.
- <u>Posters</u> No larger than 14" X 22", flat only, do not fasten items to the poster, except photos and colored paper.
- <u>Photo Display</u> Full State Fair guidelines and definitions are provided at the following link http://4h.missouri.edu/go/events/statefair/ photoguidelines.pdf.
 - * All photos should be mounted on a 8" x 10" mat board, photographers may mount the photograph to the mat board using an acceptable adhesive designed for permanent mounting of photographs.
 - * A color single window mat (sometimes referred to as a frame) is acceptable, but not required.
 - * Photos can be mounted either horizontally or vertically with no writing or labels on the mat board.
 - * Photo stories must consist of no more than 4 photographs.
 - * To protect exhibits from dust and moisture, photos <u>must</u> be placed in a clear photo bag available at the Adair County Extension Center. Do not put in a bag that's folded over, they are difficult to fit in the state fair display.
 - * Exhibits not meeting these guidelines will not be judged, displayed, or receive premiums or ribbons.
 - * Photo Editing Photo enhancing is permitted. Photo Altering is not permitted. Please see full state fair guidelines for definitions and

- examples of each.
- Educational Display A new product is now available to make educational displays easier to construct. The size is 18 inches in height, 6 inches in depth and 12 inches in width. When it opens and stands it has 6 inch sides and a 12 inch back. Must include three-dimensional items and stand-alone. (Posters with items taped to them do not qualify as an educational display. Science fair display boards are too large.)
- Entomology or Geology Display Boxes Box must be exactly no more than 18" long X 24" wide and 3 1/2" deep to fit in display racks at the Missouri State Fair. Plexiglas or plastic covers are preferred. No handles or knobs. Boxes are displayed in upright racks. For MSF, only 1 box per exhibitor will be displayed.
- Working Models These exhibits should show how things actually work (cutaway-sections of motors or computers) or can be used to help people identify parts such as parts of a motor or computer. Many times these exhibits are considered "hands-on" and can be handled by visitors. Working models should require floor space no larger than 14" x 22".
- Decorated Cakes No real cakes. Forms or pans are required. Must only use Royal Icing, Rolled Fondant or Commercial Product (i.e. DAPP) that will harden and preserve the decorated cake. Butter crème icing or tube/gel icing will not be accepted. Cake boards will not exceed 1" margin on each side of cake pan or form. Cakes must not exceed 13" in height or at the base (includes board).
- <u>Scrapbooking</u> Exhibits should be only 1 page 1 side representative of the complete scrapbook.
 - * No full books.
 - * Size not to exceed 12" x 12".
 - * All pages must be in clear protective sleeve or clear zipper bag. Do not frame.
- Perishable items such as food, vegetables, crops, and home grown items will not be returned after the Missouri State Fair. Edible vegetables will be donated to a charitable organization.
- 11. The assigned point value must be used unless approved by the 4-H Superintendent.
- 12. No early removal or check-out of exhibits is permitted. Exhibits which are removed before release times will not be awarded premium monies and/or ribbons or trophies.
- 13. All dresses and similar items to be exhibited on hangers must be entered on hangers.
- 14. Shooting Sports exhibits should contain no live ammunition and arrow points should be removed.
- 15. If a member is unable to exhibit his/her project, that member must have requested, in writing,

- permission from the 4-H & FFA Fair Committee to exhibit in absentia by <u>July 1</u>. Exhibits to be entered must be accompanied by written approval from 4-H & FFA Fair Committee.
- 16. Large/heavy objects, projects with glass, etc., may not be able to be shipped to the Missouri State Fair. Items too large for display in the 4-H Building will not be accepted for exhibit at the Missouri State Fair, but one photo of the item, no larger than 5 x 7, will be accepted. Photos are not a substitute for bringing or mailing exhibits.
- 17. Conference Judging: All 4-H exhibitors will confer with the judge in that project area while the judge examines the project. Entry and judging will take place simultaneously from 8:30 a.m. - 12:30 p.m. on Monday, July 17 in the 4-H & FFA Building. Please follow the schedule below. Exhibitors will pick up Vouchers & T-shirts at the NEMO Fair office in the Multi-Purpose building. Enter 4-H building through the North Doors for Judging. Entry is allowed up to 15 minutes prior to a club's scheduled judging time. The building will close at 1:00 p.m. or as soon as judging is completed, and will remain closed until all State Fair items and trophies have been selected and project displays finalized. All exhibits (including State Fair items) will be released Sunday July 23, between 1-2 pm. State Fair and trophy winners should be ready to have a picture taken at 1:15 pm. All exhibits need to be picked up by 2 pm. Any item(s) not claimed will be left at the exhibitors risk and will be taken to the NEMO Fair Office. Item(s) will be kept for two weeks and then discarded.
- 18. Exhibit Tags must be picked up at the NEMO Fair Office when you register and must be filled out and attached to exhibit prior to entering building on judging day.
- 19. All building awards and trophies are only given to Adair County exhibits.
- See MO State Fair Building guidelines for country cured hams and bacon selected for state.

Exhibits must be checked in Monday, July 17. All exhibits will be released on July 24, after 3 pm following the livestock sale. Any items not picked up are left at exhibitor's risk.

All entries must have been grown, produced by the exhibitor as a part of his or her supervised occupational experience program. All samples must have been produced during the year specified for the class. The exhibitor shall be keeping records of such entries in the approved Missouri Farm Business Record Book and reporting such enterprises on the departmental VA-3 (Report of the Students SAE Program) and have on file validating forms with the school's depart-mental records.

Only exhibits of high quality and purity will be judged as eligible for premiums. Only blue ribbon exhibits can be selected for a trophy or award.

FFA COUNTRY CURED HAMS EXHIBITS

- 1. Hams in this class must consist of hams that have been cured country style.
- 2. Ham weights accepted from 10 pounds to 22 pounds, inclusive.
- 3. Top FFA ham overall (Adair County exhibitors only) will be eligible to sell at the livestock sale.
- 4. The number of entries shall not exceed 2 per person.
- 5. Hams in this class will be divided by weight after they are entered into the show by the Superintendent to equalize class size.
- Commercial hams in this class will consist of whole hams with bone in and may not be cut or sliced. Hams shall be cured mildly and may or may not be tenderized. This class is considered to consist principally of pumped hams.
- 7. To maximize the member's learning experience, members showing in youth classes are encouraged to do their own project work. The parent and child should decide how much the member is able to do on their own, but having someone else totally do the work for the member is inappropriate.
- 8. All hams in this class must be USDA inspected either at the origin or at the end of processing.

Verification of inspection should be available upon request.

FFA AGRICULTURAL MECHANICS EXHIBIT

- 1. Articles exhibited must have been constructed by FFA members either as part of their agricultural mechanics instruction in agricultural education or as part of their supervised occupational experience programs.
- 2. An article can be shown only once at the State Fair.
- All articles must be painted or properly treated in the case of feeders, etc. All articles must be clean and in presentable condition even though they may have been used.
- 4. Each exhibitor is limited to a total of two entries of the same kind of project.
- 5. The points awarded a project are based upon the amount and difficulty of the work involved, difficulty and cost of moving, and the cost of materials. The Superintendent may award/adjust points as it appears necessary in order to keep the points in balance.
- Projects built to be used as one unit should be entered as one entry and not entered separately. (Ex.: Trailer ramps should not be entered separately from the trailer if the trailer is being exhibited.)

Exhibits must be checked in Monday, July 17 by noon. All exhibits will be released on Saturday, July 22, after 3 pm. Any items not picked up are left at exhibitor's risk.




Adair County 4-H & FFA Premium Livestock Sale Saturday, July 22, 2017, 10:00 a.m.

- 1. Adair County 4-H and FFA members may sell their premium from one of the following categories: market beef, market lamb, market hog, market goat, rabbit meat pen of 3, or poultry meat pen of 4. Exhibitor is required to be present the day of the sale to present their animal in the show ring. Each exhibitor will submit their intent to sell form with their Fair entries and notify class superintendent the day of the show which species they intend to sell.
- 2. Each exhibitor will select which species they intend to sell and will notify the class superintendent of their intentions by using the standardized form. Intent to sell must be submitted on the written form and submitted with their Fair entry. If the exhibitor exhibited animals in more than one species, the exhibitor is to notify the respective superintendent of each species when they will make their final decision as which species to sell. The final determination shall be made within one hour following the goat show.
- 3. The sale will begin with the Sale of Champions (top two animals in each species) except meat pens, which will be champion meat pen only. The Sale Committee respectfully requests all sale orders be turned in as quickly as possible due to the short time for sale preparation.
- 4. Animals not in the Sale of Champions will be placed in sale order according to the placing in class by class then order of ribbon-blue, red, white.
- 5. Sale order identification: Swine-ear tag number, Sheep-ear tag number, Beef-ear tag number, Goat-ear tag number.

- 6. Weight limits: Sheep: minimum-80 pounds. Beef: minimum-900 pounds. Animals not within weight limits will sell at the end of the sale order.
- 7. Exhibitors MUST be present for buyer pictures. Failure to be present will mean forfeiture of his/her sale premium check and the sale will be voided. Emergency releases will be made only at the discretion of the Joint Fair Committee.
- 8. Animals to be sold are to remain at the Fairgrounds throughout the week until the sale.
- 9. To participate in the sale, project animals must have been shown in the show ring at the NEMO Fair by the exhibitor (or by another junior exhibitor if prior permission has been granted).
- 10. Brunch will be provided for all buyers and exhibitors beginning at 9:00 am. Please sign in at the sale window for your identifying tag.
- 11. All sellers need to check-in at sale window at 8:30 am.

Animals can not be sold for premium if they have been sold for premium in another county or fair. Please note you are not required to participate in this sale.

In order to be eligible to sell, you will need to complete the bottom portion of this form and return it with your Fair entries, listing all species the exhibitor might be interested in selling. Within one hour after the end of your species show, the exhibitor must notify respective superintendent of the species they are selling if more than one species is noted on this form. In the event you exhibit multiple species, you must notify the superintendent of your first show that you are waiting until after your final show to choose which species to sell. You MUST notify each show superintendent of your final decision immediately after your final show no later than 5 o'clock on Friday, July 21. PLEASE NOTE: BEEF, SHEEP, SWINE, POULTRY, RABBIT, AND GOAT superintendents are required to submit all lists no later than 5:30 p.m. on Friday, July 21. Failure to notify your show superintendent of your final decision in a timely manner could result in your placement at the bottom of that species sale order.
