

Black-Eyed Susan



This carefree Native perennial belongs in every garden. Perfect in the border or a meadow, this plant blooms for up to 10 weeks. Black-eyed Susan are important wildlife plants. They are an important nectar source for many pollinators. Rudbeckia are a larval host to 16 species of butterflies and moths. Many species of birds feed on the seedheads throughout the fall and winter. Deer don't normally eat the Orange Coneflower.

Rudbeckia fulgida var. fulgida

- Hardiness: Zone 5-7
- Size: 2-3'
- Flower: Yellow flowers from July to October
- Culture: Prefers full sun and Dry to Average soils. Drought tolerant
- Uses: Naturalizing, border, meadow, deer and drought tolerant, pollinators, butterflies, birds, cut flower
