BOOK REVIEW by Linda Toren

The Night Circus by Erin Morgenstern Anchor Books, Random House 2011

Although targeted for an adult audience, The Night Circus could be enjoyed by young adult readers as well. This is Erin Morgenstern's first novel.


Some books are very visual, they beg to be made into a movie. This is one of those stories; a combination of fantasy, magic and dreams fraught with a life and death dilemma. Morgenstern creates the illusion and magic of a circus and a love story that is at once sensory rich and sensual.

The main characters-- Celia and Marco-- have been unknowingly bound to a contract, a competition by their magic masters. The truth being that they pretend magic to hide the fact that they possess real magic. The Night Circus becomes the setting for their complex challenge. It unravels as a mystery for them to understand the import of the competition-- only one will survive. The circus is a character of its own-- the variety of tents each devoted to a different kind of magic. It is interesting to note that Morgenstern developed the setting first, the characters appeared, first Poppet and Widget and then she grappled with the plot line.


The circus and all the performers are dressed in black and white which act as a metaphor for how one might view life although this is rarely the case. Most people exist and make decisions in the gray areas of their lives.

When a friend gave me The Night Circus it felt heavy in my handfive hundred and twelve pages! Yet the pages flew by and I forgot the length as the characters deepened and the plot thickened. Widget explains about magic in a story he tells his sister-- "Secrets have power and that power diminishes when they are shared, so they are best kept and kept well."

There is one character, Bailey, a young man ready to make choices about



In the end The Night Circus is enchanting since we would all like to be there from dusk to dawn to explore and experience real magic. As Kristin Hannah notes in her novel The Nightingale (another must read) -- "Magic, to be its best, must be unexpected."


BOOK REVIEW by Margo Mohn

Nothing to Envy, by Barbara Demick. 2010

Written by a correspondent for the L.A. Times, the setting is North Korea. It covers the life of several ordinary citizens living in the Chongjin area, the 3rd largest city in the northernmost reaches of North Korea.....far from visitors' sites. It covers seven years of conversations in this area, including the extreme famine. The U.S., having fought on behalf of South Korea from 1950-53 had 40,000 troops there. North Korea acts as if the war is still on because there was no official peace treaty ever signed.

During those years, factories were run by women because over 20% of the eligible men were in the armed services. The 'family' status cannot be elevated...you were born into the hierarchy you will always be in and have to accept your 'lot in life' and stay there, no matter how hard you may want to work to elevate yourself and your descendants. They were banned from the best jobs and schools because of their status in society. Their leader was their God.

Interesting book depicting life in North Korea, despite their focus lately on building a Nuclear Bomb to retaliate on their enemies.



INSTRUCTIONS FOR BABY LLAMA STICK PUPPET

STEP 1. Sketch a template of Baby Llama. I made one on half sheet of copy paper.



STEP 3. Attach a stick to the back side. I used paint stir sticks from True Value.



STEP 2. Cut out pj top and bottom pattern. I used red felt, you could use red paper.



STEP 4. Have children 'dress' Baby Llama by gluing on his pj top and bottom.



NOTE: As you read the story, allow children to follow along and act out using their Baby Llama stick puppet. Baby Llama goes to bed, Baby Llama starts to whine, Baby Llama hums a tune, Baby Llama starts to fret, Baby Llama jumps out of bed, Baby Llama screams for Mama, etc.

Encourage the children to take Baby Llama home and re tell the story to a family member.


