BELL TOWER REFURBISHING

With the completion of the interior renovation of the Old Stone Church, the only project left to accomplish is the refurbishing and repair work on the bell tower. With the help and advice of Mike Priebe and Danny Ahner, materials for the necessary repair have been obtained. Russ Matso and Robby Holmes will be in charge of the actual work.

The major task will be to raise the 2000+ lb. bell so that a new floor and covering can be installed in the bell tower. Once this is accomplished, the entire restoration of the Old Stone Church, which began nearly a decade ago, will be completed.

INTERESTING & INNOVATIVE

Cindy Herndon, the Association's Vice President and Program Chairman, has planned a veritable feast of activities for members and friends during the coming "season."

The three regular programs (June 13, July 11, and September 19) are of considerable interest to the general public.

The first regular meeting program (June 13) will feature an illustrated talk on Lake Erie ships and shipping. We're a long time removed from the days of the old sailing vessels and none now living can recall the days when steamboats regularly stopped at Kelleys to take on fuel, harvested from the dense forests which once covered the Island. However, within the last century, larger and larger ships, powered by coal-fired boilers and diesel engines have pushed, pulled, and carried passengers, freight, and bulk goods throughout the extent of the Great Lakes.

There are fewer commercial ships now than in the past for those now plying the lake waters carry cargoes many times greater than their predecessors. By the same token, the present era has seen a steady increase in the number and types of tour boats.

Kelleys has been and continues to be both an observer and participant in these interesting changes in shipping in all of its varied phases.

On Sept. 19, as a highlight of the Association's Annual Butterfly Festival, the summer entomologist from Ohio State's Stone Laboratory on Gibraltar Island will reacquaint us with the interesting life histories not only of the Monarch Butterfly, but with those other insect lives indigenous to Lake Erie and the Islands.

One of the most interesting programs ever sponsored by the Association was the one devoted to commercial fishing in the Western Basin of Lake Erie. Unfortunately time constraints then did not permit much in the way of reminiscing by former Kelleys Island commercial fishermen. In order to remedy that situation, a pot-luck dinner at the Pavilion (4:00 P.M.) will provide an opportunity for members, friends, and fishermen to share their experiences and expertise. Members and friends are encouraged to participate in this unique event. Bring along a favorite "dish" to share as well as your own table service.
