

Read "Unfolding Journey", the report written by the Compelling Vision Process Team about the district conversations.

In anticipation of some questions, reflect on the characteristics and practices of Christ-centered ministry, what it means to be a Christ-centered community, and the evidence of those qualities among us. Come prepared to share scriptures that inspire your understandings.

September 21, 2019—Living Faith CoB, Flora IN

This year, the District Conference Board has chosen CWS hygiene kits as the mission project. Each church is being asked to supply a minimum of 5 kits, plus the \$2 each for shipping. Please place your donations in the box at the rear of the sanctuary. Needed items are:

- One hand towel measuring approximately 15"x 28" to 16"x 32" (no fingertip, bath, dish towel or micro-fiber)
- One washcloth
- One wide-tooth comb removed from the package
- One finger nail or toe nail clipper removed from the package
- One bath size bar of soap in the wrapper
- One toothbrush in the package
- Ten standard size Band-aids

All items need to fit inside a one-gallon plastic zipper closure bag. Remove the excess air from the bag and seal before boxing. Do not add any extra items or toothpaste. A tube of extended expiration date toothpaste will be added to each Hygiene Kit just prior to its journey.

Church of the Brethren Minister's Association -Pre-Annual Conference Continuing Education Event "the denomination has very clear policies that advocate and define fair and appropriate considerations of pastors..." (Statement of Ethics for Congregations in the Church of the Brethren, 1996) "I will strive to maintain reasonable expectations for myself and not allow others' unreasonable expectations to endanger my well-being." (Ethics in Ministry Relations, 2008) One's thoughts may tend to turn to misconduct when hearing the term, "setting boundaries." There are, however, everyday boundaries which, when continually crossed, can ultimately lead to an unhealthy ministry for both pastor and congregation. Dr. Olsen and his co-author, Nancy G. Devor, bring to light some of those everyday boundary problems. They offer suggestions for pastors and congregations on how to be aware of possible pitfalls and how to work together to set healthy boundaries.

Dr. Olsen is an Adjunct Professor with The Sage Colleges and Executive Director of Samaritan Counseling Center. His writings include several articles in the Journal of Clinical Psychology on clergy burnout, as well as the following books: The Spiritual Work of Marriage, The couple's Survival Workbook, Prevention of Burnout, When Helping Starts to Hurt, Integrative Family Therapy



Action Alert

Join us! Conference on Drone Warfare

The use of drone strikes by the U.S. government has increased dramatically in the last few years. There has never been a more urgent time for members of the Church of the Brethren to speak out against these immoral drone strikes, which kill civilians and destabilize communities.

The Church of the Brethren's 2013 resolution against drone warfare called for "individual mem-



bers to study this issue in relation to our Brethren history of peacemaking and our biblical understanding of peace, so that Brethren may continue to be dynamic and prophetic peacemakers in a world riddled with violent behavior." This September, you are invited to study and act on this issue with the Interfaith Network on Drone Warfare.

The network is sponsoring a national training conference to equip people of faith interested in organizing on the issue of drone warfare within the faith community. It will be held at Princeton Theological Seminary in Princeton, NJ from September 27th to September 29th.

Those attending should be willing to organize their communities on drone warfare until at least February 1, 2021. The conference will begin with dinner on Friday, September 27 and will end with lunch on Sunday, September 29. The cost of the conference, including room, board, and registration fee, is \$50, and some financial help will be provided to you to cover travel costs.

We need volunteers for different BDM assignments. Figure out how you can go and invite friends and colleagues to join you!

 BDM continues to work in Lumberton, North Carolina.
 Floods from the two hurricanes. FEMA has a waiting list of nearly 10,000 families waiting for assistance. In August BDM will open a new project either in a new location in North Carolina or in Florida to respond to earlier storm Irma.
 S/C Indiana District needs 15 volunteers September 8-14. Those volunteers will be assigned to either the site in Florida or the new site in North Carolina. Please respond so we can start to build this team. An assistant cook will be a key addition to the operation of the team. Other volunteers can be

skilled artisans or beginners. All help can be used. 3. BDM continues to work hard in Puerto Rico. Volunteers and construction leaders are needed this summer and through the fall for building and rebuilding. Volunteers should expect two week stints with heat, sun and hard physical labor. Cliff: kindy@cpt.org. 4. The increasing number and severity of storms that are requiring a BDM response have led to high demand for disaster cleanup buckets. Those can be sent out quickly and easily to homeowners who are usually the first to respond to weather crises. When you and your congregation want to help renew the supply of buckets, check out CWS Emergency Cleanup Buckets online.

5. Our district is also responsible for seven volunteers to one of the BDM projects December 1-7. It is not too soon to ask to be part of that team!

6. The floods from rain and snow melt that ravaged Nebraska and the surrounding area this spring have led to requests for folks to rebuild and restore farms and homes. BDM is not establishing a project there but is working under the umbrella of Mennonite Disaster Services (MDS).
