I taught 3 lessons on Saturday to Phyllis Rumley, Sharon Booth and Kelly Moore. While various members filled in gopher holes and setup the course. The previous weekend we also worked on filling in holes and smoothing the grounds. Thanks to Lil, Elaine, Ann, Lilla, Aleks, Ann, Kay and Larry, Liz, Disa, and Jackie for all the hard work. Sunday I judged 10 dressage tests. And we had a Derby, everyone had a ton of fun, relaxed time and many green horses/ mules got out in public. We also had a garage sale going on at the same time. We made \$126 at the sale and \$745 from the event and donations. Very excited it earned enough to pay for Lilla's plane ticket over to the Netherlands! Thank you to all who entered see below. ## Back Seat Driver—Part 2

In the last few months I've had a "different view" of competition and riding on the carriage while helping Diane at shows. By Lilla Hewitt

... Continued from last month...

A few weeks later we were at Sargent's CDE with 'Joy.' I have volunteered for several CDE's but had never competed and I was excited to see how things worked. One of the differences of a CDE vs. HDT is the length of the event. HDTs are one day while a CDE has the phases over 3 days.

The first day was Dressage. We were scheduled to go fairly early so I braided and pined up my hair before going to the barn so that I would not have to worry about trying to make it look nice while getting 'Joy' ready. Weeks earlier, I had meant to ask Diane if I was expected to braid his mane, as I have never braided buttons before (I'm a Ranch "kid"). After seeing my hair, she decided that I should give it a try, so no more than an hour before we needed to get him hitched, I got a 5 minute showing of making button braids using yarn. I gave it my best go and none of the braids fell out during the test.

For the CDE, I got to ride on a "Dickey" seat for Dressage and Cones. The seat attaches to the back step of the marathon carriage and offers almost no view of travel. I had no idea what the dressage test was supposed to look like. After all, the groom is on the carriage if there is a problem with the carriage or horse but not to tell the driver were to go. Within a few movements of the test I could tell that Diane was asking 'Joy' to do a lengthened trot across the diagonal. I thought "wow, that movement comes fast in this test." After reaching the opposite end of the dressage court, we heard the judges bell ringing telling the driver that they messed up the order of a movement. If you ever find yourself getting a bell in your test, report to the head judge and they will tell you where you went wrong and how to fix it. DON'T LEAVE THE COURT! If you leave, you will be eliminated. Diane knew right where she went wrong, and after speaking to the judge, off we went again. Coming up the centerline for the last time 'Joy' tried to stop at X (center on arena) but in this test you are to stop closer to the judges, so Diane pushed him on and then a plane flew over which made him move smartly out and his head come up high. Sitting directly behind Diane's back, I knew that we were running out of space before the end of the arena, and all I see is Diane's elbows "swimming" as she took up the slack in the reins, but she got him stopped just perfectly!

The rest of the day was spent on the marathon course getting familiar with the track and obstacles. As I age, I have been having more allergies, but they were out of control at Sargent's. I think I saw most of the course only through one eye, and the marathon is where the most help to the driver happens. On the way back to the hotel we stopped for some allergy medicine and I was okay for the rest of the weekend.

Marathon was a ton of fun and 'Joy' did the best he could do. Marathon starts with a Section A, where you drive for about 6k (in this competition), then have a Section B which is a kilometer walk, followed by a vet check and hold to try to cool off horse and make sure they are doing okay, then ending with another 6ishK which includes the Obstacles. I had never seen the vet check before but 'Joy' got his vitals taken and then I went to pouring water on me, I mean, him. Well, I poured water on both of us. 

That night, I watched YouTube videos on braiding manes so that I might give them a cleaner look for cones. We went later in the day, but I braided him while he ate his breakfast which really helped him stand still and gave me lots of time. They did look better!

The Cones course was fun even though I couldn't see anything setting in the "Dickey seat." It was very much like being on an amusement park ride.

Before the next CDE this June, I think I need to get a different groom's outfit and work on my braids. Luckily, my old Quarter horse doesn't grow much hair so I think he will be good to practice on.

Tracy, a certified Instructor with the British Horse Society, began her thriving three-day eventing competition business in 1984 in California. Tracy has produced multiple riders to the CCI4\* level and mentors many young professionals. She began competing in combined driving 8 years ago, and with her partner of the last 7 years. Taylormore Laurabelle, Tracy this year won the advanced intermediate division at Clay Station. She also won the Shady Oaks CDE Advanced Single Pony division in 2017, came in 2nd in the 2016 Shady Oaks CDE Intermediate Single Pony division and won the 2015 Sargent CDE Intermediate Single Pony division.

He is the recipient of three purple hearts for his service. He was wounded by mortar, rocket and grenade and has overcome his injuries to train and work with drivers and driving horses at his Winter Hill Driving Center in Morriston, FL.



Diane Kastama, Arroyo Grande, Ca In 1991 Diane became paralyzed from a car accident and found carriage driving in 1994. It is a sport that has welcomed her and fed her competitive spirit. Diane has been to 6 World Championships for Para Drivers as a Grade 1 Driver she has come home with Individual Gold. Individual Silver and Individual Bronze, alone with Team Silver and 2 Team Bronze Medals. She has competed with her own horses Jasper and Rupert and also leased horses. Diane has been awarded the Becky Grant Hart Pegasus Award, FEI Silver Medal of honor, Chronical of the Horse Driver of the Year and been named to the USEF Flite Drivers.

Diane also serves as President of U.S. Driving for the Disabled Inc., where she spends countless hours bringing carriage driving to the disabled community. She strongly believes that carriage driving is an equalizing sport.

ADS Recreational Driving Recognition Program:

Do you love to drive your horse, but don't want to compete in shows? Or, do you enjoy showing but would like to get "credit" for all the time that you spend driving in preparation for showing?

The American Driving Society (ADS) has a great program that recognizes your time spent in the box. It is open to members of the ADS and is completely on the honor system. Simply record the time spent in the carriage (they do have a log that you can use to record time) and get recognized for driving 100, 250, 500, and 1000 hours! These hours roll from one year to the next so you don't have to do it all in a year.

In November, turn in your hours (for each milestone) and be recognized in the ADS's beautiful magazine, "The Whip," January edition, and receive a lapel pin with the hours displayed.

These hours are hours spent driving "recreationally" and time spent showing should not be counted (though, they aren't checking where the hours come from and sometimes ADS gives contradictory information).
