Polo.

Its History Reviewed By Yesterday's Game.

Gus Belmont and Bill Vanderbilt Tried Broncho Riding Here, And Bill Was Floored.

The game of polo or horseback football as it used to be called, was a popular diversion in San Antonio 15 years ago when the tide of English immigration first set in after the Southern Pacific railway reached San Antonio and made this city its terminus for some years. The late Capt. Glynn Turquand, brought over a little colony of brave boys who could sit on a horse finely, among them the late H. Goodwin Mitchell and Mr. Molesworth, now of Uvalde and Capt. C. E. Glazbrook, of Gregory. They remained in San Antonio some weeks, then moved to a farm some miles above Boerne. There they conceived a liking for our trained Texas broncho cow ponies, and decided they could play polo with them. After practicing with them some time and getting the horses acquainted with the game they organized a team of four on a side and came to San Antonio and gave a week's exhibition in the field just south of San Pedro park where the ostrich farm is now located. The games were viewed by thousands. Polo after this soon became a popular sport in the United States and it was not many months afterward that a visit was paid San Antonio by Mr. August Belmont, the New York millionaire, who personally selected a carload of Texas bronchos from Narciso Leal's stock yards on Doloresa street, opposite the Hord hotel and took them to New York with him. Next year none other than Wm. H. Vanderbilt, the great millionaire, visited Leal's stock yards in this city and himself tried to mount a wild mustang and was ignominiously floored on the first round.

He could not get acquainted with the high pommel Texas saddle at first, being accustomed to the baldheaded English article, but on a subsequent attempt he was glad to ride a Texas saddle and as the writer can say from ocular evidence, held on for dear life when the broncho "bucked." It pleased him and he bought a lot of ponies and afterward played polo with them, becoming so accustomed as to outshine all the New Yorkers who had not taken the trouble to come to Texas and learn a Texas saddle. Since those days San Antonio has gained a reputation all over the world as the depot for polo ponies and for the past few years as the game became more popular orders for ponies have come almost too thickly for fulfillment. Mr. Harry Tappen has been endeavoring to supply the demand for some years past, and last year shipped several carloads of trained ponies east and north. Geo. Milten has also made a shipment over to England with good results. Mr. Tappen is about to ship two more carloads this week, one to St. Louis and one to Boston, to polo clubs at these places, but before he shipped them he desired to give a little malice exhibition of the superb training of his ponies to a few friends and all were invited out to his ranch, the old Stribling pasture north of West End, yesterday morning. All who did not get lost in the chapparal on the many winding roads leading out of the city attended the exhibition and there were between 500 and 600 ladies and gentlemen present. The field nicely wet down and rolled smooth as a floor, was only 300x200 yards in area, while a regular polo field must be three times this size. Therefore only four instead of eight men were put in the game and Tony Esquivel, one of the greatest cowboy riders that ever reined a horse, he, who was all over Europe with Buffalo Bill's Wild West show, was one of the riders that ever reined a horse, he, in always striking the ball and rushing it to goal were the admiration of all. Geo. Milten, Jose Cantu and Frank Palmer were almost as good at the game as Tony and some fine fast playing was the result for two hours, the men taking two-minute periods.

After the regular game was ended four amateur horses and four amateur riders took the field. They had never played polo. The men were County Commissioner John Wilkens, who rode Police Officer Jim Mitchell's pet Bolivar, Ed Pfeiffer, Hilmer Meyer and Max Briggs. After one period in which no goal was scored, but lots of fun made by the queer antics of horses and men, they were glad to give it up and adjourn to the refreshment tables, where Mr. Tappen had supplied enough beer, soda and lemonade and delicious sandwiches prepared by Mrs. Esquivel, to satisfy every one present. Among the attendance were many prominent citizens and their families.

MR. SCHUMACHER HERE.

He Talks About El Paso, His New Home, and Commends It Highly.

Mr. W. T. Schumacher, formerly of this city, now of El Paso, is in the city on a visit to his family and friends.

He says El Paso is the best city in the state, size considered and that times are much better there than here. Improvements, he says are being erected right along and money is circulating freely. All the laboring men are at work, says he. The City brewery, of this city, is to erect a mammoth refrigerating plant there in a few weeks to be used as a distributing depot for the trade in that part of the country. Mr. J. W. McGoffen will be the agent.

"It is strange," said he, "the difference between that city and this when they are so near together. Over there they hardly employ any female domestic servants, using nearly all Chinese. The town is 'wide open,' that is gambling and such things are permitted to be conducted openly and still there does not appear to be any lawlessness. The town is one of the prettiest in the state, the streets are all macadamized and are kept well sprinkled and are therefore fine for driving on or for bicyclists. They have some severe sand storms there, however, which are very disagreeable and which I believe are about the worst things the city has to contend with. Vegetables are very high there, too."
