## **Words from Our Pastor**

hen circumstances changed and I realized I would be continuing to serve at Trinity Church a bit longer than anticipated, my wife, Elizabeth, and I decided it was time to ask for our own box of offering envelopes. We had already used up most of the generic pink envelopes in the first pew rack so it was clear we needed a less temporary way to give our weekly offering. Rebecca Casey kindly fixed us up with our personal box of offering envelopes and I noticed the the envelope number 13 assigned to us. I joked with Rebecca that I did not like having such an unlucky number for my offering, but it's better than 666 right?

But as I got to thinking more about it – I feel very lucky that I get to give to the work of God's kingdom through his church. A better word than "lucky" is the word "blessed" because I have been blessed by gifts others have given over the years. I have been blessed by people who taught me the goodness of God and the goodness of living generously. I have been blessed with more than enough of everything I need for spiritual and physical health. I am richly blessed and I am glad I get to give a portion back to God.

I recently read an interesting analysis of generosity in America – *Who Really Cares?* by Arthur C. Brooks. This is not a new book, but it is still relevant to our current national condition. As an economist/theologian, I am always interested in the relationship between beliefs and economics. I have had some hunches about what makes people generous and this book confirmed some of my hunches. It also offered some surprises. The book is filled with lots of economic data and statistics – so be warned – I'm not recommending the book if you're not interested in facts and figures. Brooks is a public policy professor at Syracuse University, not exactly a hotbed of religious fervor or conservative values, so I was surprised at the conclusions he arrived at after conducting his research.

Brooks argues that there are three cultural values that best predict charitable giving: religious participation, political views, and family structure.

I had always suspected that Christianity helped make people more generous since we stress love, generosity, and sacrificial giving for the sake of God and other people. It turns out that church attendance in America is one of the strongest predictors of generosity. Ninety-one percent of people who identify themselves as religious are likely to give to charity, as opposed to 66 percent of people who do not. Those who attend church or another religious body are much more likely to give to all forms of charity than those with no religious

commitment/affiliation. They also give a much higher percentage of their income than the non-religious. The religious give away four times the amount of money than the secular do. It turns out that when we teach people to give to God, we are instilling in them a spirit of generosity that carries over to other forms of giving. Those who attend religious services not only give to their religious group, but they also give more to strangers, more to family members in need, more to educational institutions and more to the United Way. They also give more blood.

Some people assume that rich people are more likely to be generous than poor people, but it turns out that this is not true. Those in lower-income categories tend to give higher percentages of their income to charity than those in higher-income categories. This is partly because the poor are more likely to be religious than the rich. However, the poor who are not working tend to not be very generous when compared with the working poor. In families with incomes at or below the poverty level, working poor families give more than three times as much as families on welfare. They also are twice as likely to give and volunteer.

Finally, people who couple and raise children are more likely to give philanthropically than those who do not. The more children there are in a family, the more likely that a family will donate to charity.

Another interesting predictor of generosity is a person's political views. Those who strongly agree with the statement that "the government should redistribute income to remedy income inequality" are much less likely to give to any form of charity than those who disagree with this statement. Those who think the government should do more to redistribute income are less likely to give to charitable causes. Those who believe the government has less of a role to play in income redistribution tend to give more. One of Brooks' more surprising findings was that political conservatives give more despite having incomes that are on average six percent lower than liberals. Thus the accusation that conservatives are stingy while liberals

are big-hearted is simply not true. Brooks confesses in the introduction to his book that he started his research as a political liberal but his research has prompted him to question his earlier assumptions about how best to help make a better society. "There's something incredibly satisfying, inherently, about voluntary giving," says Brooks. "And nobody has ever reported any brain science suggesting that you get an endorphin rush when you pay your tax bill."

In summary, the research shows that giving is dictated by "strong families, church attendance, earned income

(as opposed to state-subsidized income), and the belief that individuals, not government,

offer the best solution to social ills – all of these factors determine how likely one is to give." Though these findings are very well documented, the results seem to be invisible to the larger culture which seems opposed to church, opposed to big families, and in favor of income redistribution – not realizing that this mindset undermines the development of a generous population. In my opinion, generosity is one of the great treasures of this nation, yet

it is a treasure that may be lost as we drift away from God, church, hard work, and family life.

Though my focus as a pastor is often on caring for the people inside a congregation, I found myself encouraged by this book since it helps me to see that what we do as an intrinsic part of our ministry. Helping people grow in the grace of giving has a ripple effect into the rest of our community and our larger society. I have seen the way the members of Trinity Church give, serve, and volunteer in so many different ways to help make San Diego County a better place. I've also seen the way you care for members of the church and your extended families in times of need. The Good News of Jesus Christ saves souls but it also blesses those outside the community of faith in all kinds of ways. I am so glad we get to be part of being salt and light in our world as brothers and sisters in the body of Christ.

ur three major Back to School events were well attended and appreciated. We were thankful that Pastor Jim was able to speak at the Thursday night mandatory parent meeting. Sharing from his heart, he was well received by the parents. The family picnic was fun and included more than 300 people. The new Family Dessert Night was a blessing as we welcomed 50 new students from 32 new families. God has blessed the school with 205 students this year. Our Watch D.O.G.S. (Dad's of Great Students) enjoyed a Pizza Night where they signed up to help around campus and keep a watchful eye on the school. Our student council has been elected and is already leading our morning pledges to the Christian flag, the American flag, the Bible, and our closing prayer. They are excited to make plans for the remainder of the year ahead.

It has not felt like fall, but the calendar says it is indeed fall! School days

have become part of the students routine which includes some of the special classes being offered to our middle school students as electives. They include art, Spanish, cooking, forensics, and TriniTV class (reporting the school news online).

All of our classes, kindergarten through eighth grade, also enjoy the following "specials" every week as part of their school day, physical education, library, Spanish (K-5th), and Latin (6th-8th), music and technology. ## **Lifewater Update**

In August 2018, Trinity Church donated \$24,000 to Llfewater to build wells for two villages in Uganda – Kasambya Mbili and Kasambya Moja. Each village consists of 40 families; approximately 240 people. These projects are on track!

As of May 2, 2019, BOTH villages have been "CERTIFIED ODF." This means that when each household builds and uses their own functioning restroom, a community earns an "Open Defecation Free" (ODF) certification. Each country has their own processes and celebration for ODF villages. This certification is a big hurdle to have overcome. The process of getting

to ODF is the most difficult one for the whole project to accomplish for various reasons, but gets the village on track for greatly improved health for everyone.

The next step is for both villages to create their own Water Committee. Once this has been confirmed, the villages are ready to begin the construction process.

ne of the responsibilities of the Board of Deacons is to serve as church historian. The current historian, Jackie Van Dyne, is interested in taking a different approach from the standard paper scrapbook. Instead, she is hoping to create a resource that could be viewed and edited online.

The goal would be to create collections of photographs, with captions, related to various church events which will be compiled and organized in an online system and then printed or viewed online by members. The process would be as follows:

- Our church family is encouraged to take photos of church events.
- Email those photos along with descriptions or captions, including names of participants, to historian@trinitypres.org
- The historian receives the photos and organizes them using Shutterfly with a password-protected account.
- The password and access code are shared with the congregation so they can view the collections created by historian.
- Collections of photos with captions and descriptions are printed once a year in booklet form as permanent record for the church.
