## **Chapter Meeting Abstracts**

#### Show and Tell

This meeting will be a 'Show and Tell' gathering where all are welcomed and encouraged to bring any items related to the field of archaeology, particularly as they might relate to our local area, but certainly not restricted to that. We encourage individuals to bring in artifacts, both prehistoric and historic, to display and talk informally about their own collections and to see other's collections and interests. The displays could include metal detector items as well.

#### **Holocaust History**

In July of 2018, Dr. Joe Harmon was one of 20 U.S. teachers invited to take part in a Holocaust history tour through Poland. The program was conducted by Yad Vashem of Israel. During the six-day journey, Dr. Harmon spent time in Warsaw, Lodz, and Krakow. He was able to visit the former sites of the Jewish ghettos in each city. He visited the site of the Warsaw Ghetto Uprising and toured the Nazi extermination camps, mass graves of Jewish victims, and other Holocaust related sites. The tour concluded with a tour of Auschwitz concentration and extermination camps.

#### Homo erectus to Us

This program focuses on Early Man starting with how climate change has affected man from the beginning. It includes some discussion on evolution which Darwin had some concerns about and centers on the development of Homo erectus to Neanderthal to modern man. John will also bring examples of tools made as early as 1.7 million years ago to modern tools (Ice Age period).

#### Clarion University's Archaeological Explorations of Western Pa

Starting in 1997, the anthropology program at Clarion University of Pennsylvania began a summer program of archaeological field schools. These field excavations, primarily in partnership with the Heritage program of the Allegheny National Forest (ANF), has multiple purposes. They train students in archaeological field and laboratory techniques, help the ANF to assess their cultural resources, serve as outreach to residents interested in the past of their communities, partner college students as mentors to participating high school students, and help to recover the past. Recently, the mission of the archaeological program has expanded to include the creation of digital archives of the archaeological records at Clarion. This talk will highlight some of the important discoveries of the Clarion University anthropology program.


#### Over the Hump : Portages and Pathways into Western PA

This program will review both geographical and artifact evidence relating to extensive prehistoric inter-regional travel and trade between the Susquehanna and Allegheny River basins by utilizing the east to west flowing tributaries of central western Pennsylvania.

#### Stones N' Bones Exhibit

In case you missed the grand opening this new 3 gallery exhibit focuses on the Geology, Paleontology and Ice Age of Jefferson County and surrounding region. It will be open until December 2020.

Visitors to the geology gallery can explore local rocks and minerals and a rock lab provides hands on samples that can be used to discover their various properties. Younger visitors can don a lighted hard-hat and explore the coal mine or dress as a caveman or geologist explorer and take a snapshot at the selfie station.



The Paleontology gallery

hosts a full size Dimetrodon skeleton, an Allosaurus skull and a large selection of plant and animal fossils from Pennsylvania's Permian, Carboniferous and Devonian periods. Of special note are a selection of fossils from the Red Hill site in North Bend, PA which record the time when sharks developed teeth and tetrapods first began leaving the water for land.

Our center piece of the Ice Age Gallery is a Woolly Mammoth skull with tusks. It is accompanied by a number of other now extinct species from Pennsylvania's past when early Paleo-Indian hunters first entered this region 14,000 years ago.





#### In the NEWS

Texas A&M University researchers have recently announced the discovery of what are believed to be the oldest weapons ever found in North America: ancient



spear points that are 15,500 years old.

"There is no doubt these weapons were used for hunting game in the area at that time," said Michael Waters a professor with Texas A&M. "The discovery of numerous projectiles at the Debrah L



Friedkin site north of Austin, Texas is significant because almost all pre-Clovis sites have stone tools, but spear points have yet to be found. These points were found under a layer containing Clovis and Folsom projectile points.

In addition to the title and abstract (150 words or fewer), provide name, affiliation, address, phone, and email address for each presenter.


Please include audio-visual requirements. Thematic session chairs should identify participants. Abstracts may be submitted to the Program Chair attached to an e-mail in .doc format.
