

Parish Membership: Every family and single adult to be considered active members of St. Bartholomew's Parish must be properly registered in the parish, receiving and regularly using the parish weekly donation envelopes. Only in this way can the parish issue documents attesting to parish membership and Catholic practice, e.g. a letter to be a Godparent or Sponsor. New parishioners are requested to visit the parish office.

Sick & Shut-ins: The priests are available to administer the Sacraments to those who are unable to come to Church. The Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick is part of the healing ministry of the Church, and should be received early in an illness or before a serious operation.

Baptisms: Please call the parish office to make arrangements.

Marriages: In order to provide sufficient time for the Marriage Preparation Course, please call the parish office and ask to speak with the pastor at least six months in advance of the wedding.

Parish Council: Meets on the Monday evening after the third Sunday of the month.

BE READY FOR THE SON OF MAN

Isaiah's vision captures the dual movement that he has preached to the people of Israel and Judah. First, people of



every nation, not just the Chosen People, were expected to stream toward God's holy mountain, the place on earth closest to God. At the same time, the word of the Lord would flow down that mountain to bring peace and justice to all nations. God will issue judgments, making human weapons and aggression un-

necessary. God will come to us, but we must come to God.

The end result Isaiah wants is for all to "walk in the light of the Lord!" (Isaiah 2:5). Isaiah foresees a time when people from all nations will be enlightened by realizing God's will for humanity. Since we are all created by God and in God's image, in God's eyes we are all brothers and sisters. To God, people fighting with one another can be compared to a parent when their children fight. To raise a weapon or to kill another person is analogous to fratricide.

Not that there was ever a time that the "works of darkness" were appropriate, but what we hear in the second reading and the Gospel should scare us into the urgency of changing

"The night is adbad behavior. vanced, the day is at hand." Paul writes (Romans 13:12). Jesus warns His disciples that the Son of Man will come "at an hour you do not expect" (Matthew 24:44). If we are honestly preparing our hearts to re-



ceive Jesus, we must stop doing things that injure or demean others and "put on the armor of light" (13:12). If we wouldn't want it "brought to light, "that's a sign we shouldn't do it.

QUESTION OF THE WEEK:

What am I doing that I would not want seen in the light of day, or at the hour I do not expect? What do I need to do to change this?


