October skies! The fall season is one of my favorite times of the year, the colors, the pleasant days and cool evenings, it's one of the reasons why this Florida transplant loves New England...and Houghs Neck.

In this letter, I want to encourage us to begin to talk to each other about the Climate crisis. You may already be talking about it around the dinner table with your spouse, your children or among your circle of frends, your church, at work.

At Houghs Neck Congregational Church our motivation for talking about is that we take seriously the prayer of Jesus, "that they shall be one, just as you, Father, are in me, and I am in you..." (John 17:21). We believe that humanity is one body, not just as neighbors to one another, as citizens of our Commonwealth, our Nation, and, yes, even our planet, but, as in the eyes of the Apostle Paul, we are more than that to each other - we are organically and spiritually connected just as our arms, legs, eyes, and ears, are connected. We need each other. "The eye cannot say to the hand, I have no need of you..." (Paul's first letter to the church at Corinth in present- day Greece. (1 Corinthians 12:21)). He goes on to say, "If one member suffers, all suffer together; if one member is honored, all rejoice together." (1 Corinthians 12:26). We are connected. How much our relationships with each other in Houghs Neck and with others around the world would be strengthened if we saw each other in that light.

Sixteen year old Greta Thunberg from Sweden sees her relationship to each of us in that light. If you don't know who she is, google her. Based on her speeches to our Congress and the United Nations, she clearly sees many people around the world suffering. And she suffers. We too, in subtle ways, are suffering. One wonders how much suffering will have to happen before we as the human family decides to act and begin to heal this broken planet which is OUR home. What do you think? We need to be talking about this with each other, taking it seriously. Believe it or not, we really are one.



I hope you are having a good start to the fall. Through the hard work of the Houghs Neck Community Council, Quincy Police Department, Boy Scouts Troop 6, Quincy High School students and many volunteers, the annual Chowdafest was a hit once again. Congratulations to Peg O'Connor for being the 2019 Mayor of Houghs Neck. Thank you for all the wonderful work you do in our community.

As you may have seen in the news, the number of people who have contracted Eastern Equine Encephalitis is increasing. Even though summer is over, it is important to remain alert until the cold weather sets in. My office receives regular updates from the Department of Public Health (DPH) on this issue. DPH is still advising people to be cautious and use mosquito repellent while outdoors where mosquitos are present, especially during dusk-to-dawn hours.

The House and Senate overrode the Governor's veto on the "Janus bill", a piece of legislation I filed in January. The new law was in response to the Unite d States Supreme Court decision diminishing public employee collective bargaining rights. legislation codifies existing collective bargaining practices and allows nonunion employees access to a union's legal services for representation against grievances by management for a reasonable fee. The House and Senate engrossed the legislation in June and the Governor sent it back to the legislature with amendments in July. The House and Senate rejected the Governor's amendments and continued to push for the original language. In August, the Governor vetoed the legislation while we were in recess from formal session. This September, the House overrode the veto by a 156 to 1 margin and the Senate followed with a 39 to 1 vote. I greatly appreciate my colleagues support on this legislation to ensure public employees' rights are preserved.

The House also engrossed legislation, on a 156 to 0 vote, that would establish a Women's Rights History Trail Taskforce. The taskforce would solicit public input and establish criteria to determine who will be a part of the Women's Rights History Trail. It will work with the Office of Travel and Tourism to put together the educational materials and outreach in order to promote awareness about the notable women in our history. The taskforce would also work with the Massachusetts Department of Transportation to provide signage along state roadways.

As the House Chairman of the Joint Committee on Consumer Protection and Professional Licensure, I am happy to say that my staff and I have started up the fall hearing schedule. As you might have seen in the news, two ballot initiatives will likely appear before the committee and be on the 2020 ballot. The first ballot question would eliminate the cap on how many retail beer and wine licenses are given to stores whose products are comprised of over 50% food. This ballot question is currently being challenged in court by the Massachusetts Package Store Association on whether the it was properly drafted. The second ballot question addresses auto right to repair. The initiative questions whether the owner of a vehicle should be able to access the computer software of their car, download information and potentially make changes to the software. This is prevalent as today's vehicles are heavily computerized, collect information about your driving and the car's performance, and its ability to control the car's safety features like locks and airbags.

October is upon us so that means Quincy Schools are back in session. Please drive a bit slower and plan accordingly as Atherton Hough is back in session. Designated Student drop off signs were posted last year on Manet Ave so parents can drop off and move on in an organized fashion. With Ward 1 Schools on the mind the council moved forward on Monday the 16th of September by passing a very important well overdue capital improvement budget.

A quick breakdown of much needed improvements included Atherton Hough flooring repairs and appropriation for replacing/updating the antiquated bathroom facilities in the school. Snug Harbor as well as Broad Meadows also received appropriations to replace bathrooms, floors and HVAC. I try to tour all the schools each year with Public buildings and custodial management to get a sense of what we can improve on. From there we try to work the funding.

The big appropriation on the 16th was the Seawall funding. Funding approved that evening was for 14.3 million to begin the first phase of Seawall replacement/drainage improvements. Additional approvals will come for 2.8 million for a stormwater pumping station and 120,000 for the Willows Culvert Hydraulic Study which is in conjunction with the Army Corp of Engineers. All positive steps forward.

Congratulations to the HNCC for the great success once again of the Chowderfest on September 14th. Once again Cagney's came out on top as the Chowder king. Nice work Mark DiBona and team.

Congratulations to Peg O'Connor who at the Chowderfest was crowned

2019 Mayor of Houghs Neck. Citations were abundant that day as Congressman Lynch and Mayor Koch were on hand for the ceremony. I myself also presented Peg with a citation from the Quincy City Council. A great day for all.

Victoria's Walk was also a great success on the 14th of September. The walk was 2.5 miles through scenic Houghs Neck. The attendance and support was wonderful again this year. Make it a point every year to support the Schuerch Family and the research towards finding a cure for Leukemia.

Understanding Breast Cancer

Cancer is a broad term for a class of diseases characterized by abnormal cells that grow and invade healthy cells in the body. Breast cancer starts in the cells of the breast as a group of cancer cells that can then invade surrounding tissues or spread (metastasize) to other areas of the

What Causes Cancer To Develop?

Cancer begins in the cells which are the basic building blocks that make up tissue. Tissue is found in the breast and other parts of the body. Sometimes, the process of cell growth goes wrong and new cells form when the body doesn't need them and old or damaged cells do not die as they should. When this occurs, a build up of cells often forms a mass of tissue called a lump, growth, or tumor.

Breast cancer occurs when malignant tumors develop in the breast. These cells can spread by breaking away from the original tumor and entering blood vessels or lymph vessels, which branch into tissues throughout the body. When cancer cells travel to other parts of the body and begin damaging other tissues and organs, the process is called metastasis.

Facts About Breast Cancer In The United States

1 in 8 women will develop Breast Cancer in their lifetine.

In 2019, an estimated 268,600 new cases of invasive breast cancer will be diagnosed in women in the U.S. as well as 62,930 new cases of noninvasive (in situ) breast cancer.

62% of breast cancer cases are diagnosed at a localized stage, for which the 5-year survival rate is 99%.

This year, an estimated 41,760 women will die from breast cancer in the U.S.

Although rare, men get breast cancer too. The lifetime risk for U.S. men is about 1 in 1,000.

An estimated 2,670 men will be diagnosed with breast cancer this year in the United States and approximately 500 will die.

1 in 8 women in the United States will develop breast cancer in her lifetime.

Breast cancer is the most common cancer in American women, except for skin cancers.

There are over 3.5 million breast cancer survivors in the United States.

On average, every 2 minutes a woman is diagnosed with breast cancer in the United States.

Nipple that is turned slightly inward or inverted

Skin of the breast, areola, or nipple that becomes scaly, red, or swollen or may have ridges or pitting resembling the skin of an orange

Any Nipple Discharge—Particularly Discharge Or Clear Discharge

It is also important to note that a milky discharge that is present when a woman is not breastfeeding should be checked by her doctor, although it is not linked with breast cancer.

Let your doctor know about any nipple discharge, clear, bloody or milky.

Questions

If I have some symptoms, is it likely to be cancer?

Most often, these symptoms are not due to cancer, but any breast cancer symptom you notice should be investigated as soon as it is discovered. If you have any of these symptoms, you should tell your healthcare provider so that the problem can be diagnosed and treated.

If I have no symptoms, should I assume I do not have cancer?

Although there's no need to worry, regular screenings are always important. Your doctor can check for breast cancer before you have any noticeable symptoms. During your office visit, your doctor will ask about your personal and family medical history and perform a physical examination. In addition, your doctor may order one or more imaging tests, such as a mammogram.

Detecting Breast Cancer Earlier

Breast cancer can't be prevented, but you can take three important steps to help detect it earlier. The free resource, 3 Steps to Early Detection, can increase your chance of finding breast cancer before it spreads.


