Every person we met, Muslim and Jew alike, was open, engaging and genuinely hospitable and accepting. Yes, there are still Jews in Morocco. In Casablanca, there is even a Jewish museum, reported to be the only one in the Arab world. The Jewish community, albeit small, is alive and well. There are fully functioning synagogues, Kosher butchers and the like. Jewish cemeteries are well preserved, and at least one was guarded by the Royal army.

There is a peaceful co-existence and mutual respect between the Muslims and the Jews, dating back hundreds of years. As we were told, we all come from the same place. We share Abraham, Isaac and others. We were expelled from Spain during the Inquisition. We have similar beliefs and commandments. Tzedakah, yes that is the word used, is one of the five foundations of Islam. At a tannery in Fes, we learned that the process of slaughter is the same as Kashrut. The major difference is the lack of rabbinical certification.


President Message Continued


Can you believe Muslims eat only "Kosher" meat and have the same standards of acceptable meat sources? Jewish history, Jewish symbols and artifacts, Jewish contribution in Moroccan development, and the Moroccan admiration of the Jews were stressed throughout our trip. We were even told of a secret meeting held between the King and Yitzhak Rabin in an attempt to reach a peace accord.

So we had no reluctance to ask the guestions ever present on our minds. What about al-guaida? What about the fundamentalists? What do the Moroccans think is motivating the violence? How can the violence be dealt with? The universal response was that the fundamentalists are out of control fanatics. The general opinion related to us was that the violence is caused by the Arab leaders themselves and is the result of oppression, both economic and educational. Morocco itself has been subject to attacks within its borders. Recently, its embassy personnel have been kidnapped by al-quaida. Those we spoke with also blamed the Arab leaders for using the Palestinians as a diversion, thus creating and inflaming the Israeli Palestinian conflict. They thought Arafat, with his double talk, was likewise responsible. We were amazed that these opinions were being related by Muslims in a Muslim country. These opinions could have been expressed by any one of us. Were they tailor made for us. Jewish tourists helping their economy? I think not.

Yes, there is hope for the future. We should remember that there are Muslims who are not represented by the fundamentalists. It is those who we should try to reach so that their voice, too, can be heard, alongside ours.

ARAB - ISRAELI CONFLICT

It is not very often we hear a commentary on the Arab-Israeli Conflict from a non Jewish source that is in favor of Israel. In a media that is very anti Israel, anti Jewish and anti American I thought it is of interest for our Jewish Community to know about a brave Christian Arab woman who raised her voice and talked about her "enemy" and it's humanistic values, Jewish values, that prevail in spite of the prolonged suffering and frustration in this conflict.

Brigitte Gabriel Speech at Duke University

Remarks of Brigitte Gabriel, delivered at the Duke University Counter Terrorism Speak-Out

I'm proud and honored to stand here today, as a Lebanese speaking for Israel, the only democracy in the Middle East. As someone who was raised in an Arabic country, I want to give you a glimpse into the heart of the Arabic world.

I was raised in Lebanon, where I was taught that the Jews were evil, Israel was the devil, and the only time we will have peace in the Middle East is when we kill all the Jews and drive them into the sea.

When the Moslems and Palestinians declared Jihad on the Christians in 1975, they started massacring the Christians, city after city. I ended up living in a bomb shelter underground from age 10 to 17, without electricity, eating grass to live, and crawling under sniper bullets to a spring to get water.

It was Israel who came to help the Christians in Lebanon. My mother was wounded by a Moslem's shell, and was taken into an Israeli hospital for treatment. When we entered the emergency room, I was shocked at what I saw. There were hundreds of people wounded, Moslems, Palestinians, Christians, Lebanese, and Israeli soldiers lying on the floor. The doctors treated everyone according to their injury. They treated my mother before they treated the Israeli soldier lying next to her. They didn't see religion, they didn't see political affiliation, they saw people in need and they helped.


For the first time in my life I experienced a human quality that I know my culture would not have shown to their enemy. I experienced the values of the Israelis, who were able to love their enemy in their most trying moments. I spent 22 days at that hospital. Those days changed my life and the way I believe information, the way I listen to the radio or to television. I realized I was sold a fabricated lie by my government, about the Jews and Israel, that was so far from reality. I knew for fact that, if I was a Jew standing in an Arab hospital, I would be lynched and thrown over to the grounds, as shouts of joy of Allahu Akbar. God is great. would echo through the hospital and the surrounding streets.

I became friends with the families of the Israeli wounded soldiers: one in particular Rina, her only child was wounded in his eyes.

One day I was visiting with her, and the Israeli army band came to play national songs to lift the spirits of the wounded soldiers. As they surrounded his bed playing a song about Jerusalem, Rina and I started crying. I felt out of place and started walking out of the room, and this mother holds my hand and pulls me back in without even looking at me.She holds me crying and says: "it is not your fault". We just stood there crying, holding each other's hands.

What a contrast between her, a mother looking at her deformed 19 year old only child, and still able to love me the enemy, and between a Moslem mother who sends her son to blow

himself up to smithereens just to kill a few Jews or Christians.

The difference between the Arabic world and Israel is a difference in values and character. It's barbarism verses civilization. It's democracy verses dictatorship. It's goodness verses evil.

Once upon a time, there was a special place in the lowest depths of hell for anyone who would intentionally murder a child. Now, the intentional murder of Israeli children is legitimized as Palestinian "armed struggle".

However, once such behavior is legitimized against Israel, it is legitimized every where in the world, constrained by nothing more than the subjective belief of people who would wrap themselves in dynamite and nails for the purpose of killing children in the name of god.

Because the Palestinians have been encouraged to believe that murdering innocent Israeli civilians is a legitimate tactic for advancing their cause, the whole world now suffers from a plague of terrorism, from Nairobi to New York, from Moscow to Madrid, from Bali to Beslan.

They blame suicide bombing on "desperation of occupation". Let me tell you the truth. The first major terror bombing committed by Arabs against the Jewish state occurred ten weeks before Israel even became independent.

On Sunday morning, February 22, 1948, in anticipation of Israel's independence, a triple truck bomb was detonated by Arab terrorists on Ben Yehuda Street, in what was then the Jewish section of Jerusalem. Fifty-four people were killed, and hundreds were wounded. Thus, it is obvious that Arab terrorism is caused not by the "desperation" of "occupation", but by the VERY THOUGHT of a Jewish state.

IRONMAN FINISHER

On November 5, 2005 I completed the IRONMAN Triathlon in Panama City Florida. The IRONMAN consist of three events. The 2.4 mile swim in the ocean or gulf (within 2 hours and 15 minutes), the 112 mile bike (within 8 hours), and the 26.2 mile run (within 7 hours). All of these events have a time limit. In order to go on to the next event you must be in the time frame. You have to complete the IRON MAN in 17 hours and that includes the transition (changing clothes for each event).I did the swim in 1 hour 55 minutes, the bike in 7 hours 55 minutes and the run in 6 hours and 40 minutes.

This was a dream come true. I had been training for two years. Last year I went to the competition but I was unable to finish due to a knee injury. I had been training for the IRON-MAN and in June 2005 I went to Lake Tahoe to ride a 100 mile bike ride for Leukemia. I did not train for the mountains (how could I living in Fl. in the keys) and I injured both of my knees especially the right knee. I had to go into physical therapy for several months. I was then able to train again on the bike but I was not where I would have liked to have been. My Dr. and boyfriend both advised me not to participate in it but I wanted to. I was stopped on mile 89 on the bike ride. I was really upset but I knew I was not in the best condition to be participating in this event. I then started training again for the IRONMAN this year.

Every week I would run about 25 miles, bike about 80 miles and swim about 3 miles. I would get up early before work and train. My weekends were dedicated to the long 50 mile bike rides and the long runs.

G-d was with me all the way. I had to have fearless faith. Whenever I would start to worry I would turn to pray. I also turned to the spirit world. My mom was a great swimmer so I knew she was with me in the gulf. My dad was



a bike rider and I knew he was with me on the bike ride. I also knew of a friend called Bob who was with me all the way.

I also did this competition for a charity called ACT (Adirondack Community Trust).This charity helps support youths in sports. For ex: boys and girls clubs, boys and girl scouts etc. Whenever I would have doubt I would think of all the people that were my sponsors. I can always depend on some members of the synagogue to sponsor me in all my events. I was so grateful to be able to finish this event. I wan to thank my boyfriend who was there for me at the start of the race on the course and at the finish. So follow your dreams, believe in yourself, have faith, and practice, practice, practice.

I plan on doing another IRONMAN in two years.



Next month we celebrate Chanukah and here is my family's recipe for latkes along with some other delights.

LATKES

1 onion 1/2 cup flour 1/2 tsp baking powder (mix with flour)

Pare and grate potatoes into a mixing bowl. Squeeze out the water. Peel and grate onion into potatoes. Add eggs, flour and salt. Stir to make a smooth batter. Drop batter by the heaping spoonful into heated oil to cover. Brown on both sides. Lift out and drain off excess oil on paper bags or paper towels.

APPLE STRIPS

2 cups flour (sifted) 1/2 lb butter 2 tsp baking powder 1 tsp cinnamon

6 medium potatoes

2 eggs

1 tsp salt

Oil for frying

4 eggs 1 cup sugar 7 medium apples

Mix butter and sugar in mixer and then add eggs. Sift flour with baking powder and mix with egg mixture by hand. Spread on greased cookie sheet that has a ledge. Peel and slice apples into eighths. Place apples slices in rows on the batter and sprinkle with cinnamon and sugar. Bake in 350° oven for 1 hour.

MINI DATE-NUT CUPS

1 1/2 cups pitted dates

3 eggs (beaten)

1 1/2 cups chopped walnuts

1 TBS sugar

Mix everything together and spoon into greased muffin pan (mini size). Bake at 325° for 25 minutes. Makes at least 2 dozen.

CHALLENGE DAY

This year it has been the third time that I was invited by our congregation member Judy Greenman to participate as a volunteer in a program for Highschool students in the Keys.

The program is called "CHALLENGE DAY" and is an anti-prejudice program that addresses prejudice, stereotyping, and discrimination of all types. It is a powerful, very dynamic program in which youth and adult participants are guided through a series of experiential learning process.

This year in our series of lectures at the KJCC we addressed the issue of prejudice and discrimination in its form of Anti-Semitism extensively.

RECOGNIZING A STROKE

Thank God for the sense to remember the "3" steps. Read and Learn!

Sometimes symptoms of a stroke are difficult to identify. Unfortunately, the lack of awareness spells disaster. The stroke victim may suffer brain damage when people nearby fail to recognize the symptoms of a stroke.

Now doctors say a bystander can recognize a stroke by asking three simple questions:

Just ask the person:

1. TO SMILE.

2. TO RAISE BOTH ARMS.

3. TO SPEAK A SIMPLE SENTENCE COHERENTLY).

If he or she has trouble with any of these tasks, call 911 immediately and describe the symptoms to the dispatcher.

After discovering that a group of non-medical volunteers could identify facial weakness, arm weakness and speech problems, researchers urged the general public to learn the three questions. They presented their conclusions at the American Stroke Association's annual meeting last February. Widespread use of this test could result in prompt diagnosis and treatment of the stroke and prevent brain damage.
