Dreams to Reality: Our Road to a Learning Commons

One of our dreams for our school over the last few years has been to be able to transform our traditional library into a dynamic Learning Commons: a repurposed space that would allow our students to take a more active role in their education and experience a more integrated approach to the acquisition of 21st century skills. The Learning Commons environment would integrate the best features of both the computer lab and library into a learning area that

would benefit students by providing the (and their teachers) with a space designed with the teacher's role as a guide for student learning. Learning would be able to be achieved in more depth, STEM concepts can be better integrated into the curriculum, and students will have a greater opportunity to create, collaborate, and communicate throughout the learning process.



Today, we are happy to announce that our Learning Commons has arrived!

- The Learning Commons will now be the home of a new STEM-based class, taught by Mrs. Kinyo.
 - ♦ Students will still learn about the genres of literature, research skills, composition skills, science concepts, and technology tools; however, they will be able to explore all of those concepts and skills in a space designed for activity and supplied with the resources they need to discover, apply, and create.
- Library time will be more effectively spent.
 - ♦ Although library will not be offered as a separate class, as it has been in the past, it will now be customized by the reading teachers and incorporated into the reading class schedule.

This summer, we were able to begin the first phase of creating the Learning Commons by reorganizing the bookstack areas and dividing them into three "zones". Through donations, fundraising, and hard work, we hope to have the project entirely completed by the Fall of 2017. Once the project has been completely accomplished, users will find:

Bookstack Zone:

- ♦ Shelves of books
- ♦ Comfortable places to sit
- ♦ Quite corners to read
- Inviting layout and gathering spaces

Collaboration Zone:

- Desktop computers
- ♦ Laptop computers
- ♦ Group work areas designed for research, collaboration, and communication

Creativity Zone:

- ♦ Flexibility will be the key to the success of this area of the Learning Commons!
- Tables and chairs designed to be rearranged to accommodate small groups, individual work, or large group activities
- ♦ New STEM class space
- ♦ Hands-on projects to create, build, and discover

We will continue to accommodate parish and school groups who use our facility after-hours to hold meetings and other events.

First Day of School Reminders

UNIFORM DRESS CODE is in effect the first day of school and will be enforced. (Optional summer uniform may be worn through Monday, October 31st.)

All clothing is to be the **PROPER SIZE**. The baggy look is not acceptable. Pants are to be worn at the waist, not the hips.

HAIRSTYLES AND HAIRCUTS—NO FAD HAIRSTYLES AND all hair MUST BE THE CHILD'S NATURAL COLOR. NO BLEACHED, DYED, OR STREAKED HAIR IS ALLOWED.

<u>BOYS</u> - haircuts are to be NEAT and trimmed properly. Hair is NOT to go beyond their shirt collar and/or beyond their eyebrow.

<u>GIRLS</u> - NO hair extensions are to be worn. Hair accessories are to be kept simple and are NOT be become a distraction.

LUNCH SERVICE - will be available.

TRANSPORTATION - Make sure your child

knows what mode of transportation they will be taking. If they will be riding a bus, please make sure they know what bus they will be riding.

Protecting God's Children Program

Since the summer of 2004, the Diocese of Allentown has implemented a safe environment program in which parents, educators, employees, and volunteers work together to maintain the safest environment for children.

With this in mind, all volunteers who come into contact with children (e.g., serving as a classroom or lunchroom volunteers, assisting with a classroom party, serving as a chaperone for a field trip, working as a clerical assistant for a teacher or in the office, Scout leaders, CYO coaches, etc.) are required to attend a workshop called Protecting God's Children. This workshop emphasizes the harms of child sexual abuse and what can be done to prevent it.

Plain, pepperoni, and tomato pies were made from scratch,



as were sausage and pepperoni breads. The chefs also had their very own Chopped challenge, as they challenged themselves to come up with ways to use up any
