May Day is celebrated on May 1 in many cultures around the world. What is it? It's a celebration of spring and a day of unity, togetherness and rebirth; a day for everyone to come together and celebrate life. We did not celebrate it in our household, but every May 1 our neighbors hung a basket of paper flowers on our door.

When I asked a fellow worker about May Day, the response was, "You mean 'mayday' like the distress signal?" I replied, "No, May Day!" Honestly, I had forgotten there is another use of "mayday." It was conceived as a distress call in the early 1920s by Frederick Stanley Mockford, officer-in-charge of radio at Croydon Airport in England. It was chosen because it could be easily understood and is very similar to some French words (m'aidez) that mean "help me."

So you have basically the same term but two different meanings. "May Day" means a celebration of life while "mayday" is a cry for help.

In a way it sort of sums up our lives as followers of Christ, and

even when we come together to worship. At the beginning of our worship we confess our cry for help, "I, a poor miserable sinner" and receive the Good News that we are forgiven. Then we move on to hear the Good News from God's Word through the readings and sermon. As baptized children of God we are encouraged to reflect on God's Word and then apply that to our lives by loving our Lord and our neighbor.

It is interesting that in May we have set aside opportunities to love those around us. May 1 is School Principals' Day. The first week of May is Teacher Appreciation Week. I hope that we reach out and encourage these faithful workers in our parochial and public schools. They need to hear that we are thankful they are in the classroom, teaching and modeling for our children. It has been a tough two years. Thank them!

During May, we certainly remember the second Sunday as it is Mother's Day. As it states in Prov. 31:28–29:

Her children rise up and call her blessed; her husband also, and he praises her: "Many women have done excellently, but you surpass them all."

Honor her. Pray for her daily.

Many confirmations are celebrated in May, when the catechumens, baptized individuals, publicly confess their faith and renew their baptismal vow. The prayer of parents and members is that they be faithful in their profession, become fruitful in every good work and in the end receive the crown of life.

Excitement at NEWLHS

School Association, which oversees the operation of **NEW Lutheran High School** (NEWLHS), Trinity Lutheran School and Faith Christian Preschool in Green Bay.

NEWLHS opened its doors in 1977 with 36 students. Times have changed. There has been a lot of ministry at NEWLHS the past few years, including a recently completed building project. Nelson answered a few questions to provide some details about the project.

What was built and what it will allow you to do?

Under the supervision of Principal Jim McClellan, the faculty and staff collaborated to determine the facility needs moving forward. What was undertaken, through our "All Things New" capital campaign, was an addition onto the east side of our existing building. This new space has dedicated instructional areas for chemistry, biology, music, 3D printing and tech ed.

By creating these new dedicated spaces, along with renovating existing space for a new art room and athletic training, we are meeting the needs of our faculty and student body in new and dynamic ways, now and for years to come.

Were there any surprising moments when God's hand was clearly blessing the project?

Our general contractor, Todd Wendt of John J. Calmes Construction, was on top of his game when it came to communicating with Mr. McClellan, meeting with the city of Green Bay, securing the subcontracts and keeping us informed of each step of the process. With the supply chain and labor issues being very real obstacles, we felt that God truly was at work throughout this time.

The other aspect of this that was truly remarkable was how God has worked in His people who love our schools. The total campaign goal that also addresses initiatives at Faith Christian Preschool and Trinity Lutheran School is \$1.9 million. By God's grace and through His generous people, we recently reached the \$1 million mark. It is truly humbling to see God at work — His blessings are flowing for His schools in Green Bay!

What was the most difficult part of the project and how was it overcome?

I think the time frame of the project was challenging from the beginning. We had an aggressive timeline, so identifying a campaign team, creating the case and then holding events to communicate the needs and ask for support were essential. The board, the faculty and staff from all three schools, our school families and the campaign team all were key players in the success of "All Things New" to date.

What is next for NEWLHS?

With a tremendous administrator and a dynamic and dedicated faculty and staff who challenge each other to identify educational trends and ways to attract students, we are striving to fill the new addition as quickly as possible. It is not unreasonable to prepare for 75 to 100 new students in the very near future.

We are so grateful to God for His many blessings and excited to see how He leads us forward in our mission of "helping families prepare Christian leaders."

e was a man who knew great suffering. It was a part of his personal calling (Acts 9:16). His name was Paul and he was Christ's missionary to the Gentiles.

Frequent imprisonments were only one challenge Paul endured (for a full list of sufferings, see 2 Cor. 11:23b-28). During his imprisonment in Philippi, Paul penned these words regarding his calling for Christ:

But one thing I do: forgetting what lies behind and straining forward to what lies ahead, I press on toward the goal for the prize of the upward call of God in Christ Jesus."

PHIL. 3:13B-14

It is noteworthy that Paul wrote those words while He was still in prison. The apostle leaned into the challenges rather than bemoan his plight. The suffering he faced only increased his passion to carry on the work before him. Paul did not let the past deter his determination. His focus was fearless and forward. He was fully ready to passionately "press on" for the sake of Christ!

Paul adds two additional thoughts:

Let those of us who are mature think this way Only let us hold true to what we have attained. PHIL. 3:15A-16

Spiritual maturity is a vital goal for all who follow Christ. What have been attained are the gifts of forgiveness and salvation

and the privilege to be Christ's called servants. All these insights can be applied to our calling today.

we remain focused on Christ and His calling to be a part of His kingdom mission. Even the suffering holds merit as it promotes perseverance, character and hope (Rom. 5:3-4).

We dare not lose sight of another key component in our ministry work. It is one that is too easily ignored. This is the vital partnership we have with the Holy Spirit for the work before us. As with those first apostles, we too have "power" through Him (Acts 1:8). He also gifts us for this work (Rom. 12:4-8, 1 Cor. 12:4-11, Eph. 4:11-13 and 1 Peter 4:10-11).

We never do ministry alone! With that thought in mind, we do well to consider one additional aspect of Paul's ministry for Christ. He had a ministry partner on his three mission trips. This prompts the question — who is our partner in ministry?

Paul speaks to all in ministry today in light of the challenges being faced ... "Press on!" Let it be a part of our lasting legacy, "There is one who pressed on!"
