Everyone is Welcome



From Your Rabbi,

We will soon gather at our community Seder, sharing in a night filled with traditional text, food and melodies. Preparations for Passover begin days and perhaps weeks prior to that first night and the subsequent 7 holy days. Many engage in cleaning their home of bread and all leavened foods, making sure not even a morsel is to be found anywhere.

In honor of the oncoming festival I am sharing this story about Rabbi Levi Yitzchak of Berdichev (1740-1809), a Hassidic leader known as the "defense attorney" for the lewish people because it was believed that he could intercede on their behalf before God.

It was the afternoon before Passover, and Rabbi Levi Yitzchak was wandering through the streets of the Jewish quarter seeking out local smugglers. From one he quietly asked for a quote on illegal tobacco, from another he inquired about the availability of smuggled wool. And no matter the merchandise he sought, everything was found and sold for the right price.

However, when he started asking to supply him with some bread, those very same men who had previously proved so accommodating, balked, drawing a line. "Rabbi," said one, "Are you trying to insult me? The seder will be starting in just a few hours and no Jew would have even a speck of chametz (leavened) left in their home!"

No matter the price offered, not one merchant was able to come up with even a crumb of bread. The town had converted into a chametz-free zone.


Thrilled with the results of his failed quest, the rabbi looked up to heaven and declared: "God Almighty, look down with pride at Your people! The Czar has border guards and tax-commissioners dedicated to his commands. The police and the courts are devoted to tracking down and punishing smugglers and black-marketers, and yet, anything one could possibly want is available. But although You have no army and no police, and do not threaten imminent punishment, Your decrees are faithfully observed. Not a single piece of bread is to be found in any lewish household! "Mi k'amcha Yisrael – God, who is like Your people [srae]?! Their devotion merits better treatment."

Chag same'ach, may the festival of Passover be a celebration filled with joy and meaning.

<u>l Am the L-rd Your Healer</u>

Mishna Halachos 4:347



Since my childhood, in various ways, I have noticed an inherent tension in Judaism regarding the mandate to heal. The Torah empowers the physician to treat illness; however, there are restrictions on how far this extends. The Torah grants a broad license to heal, in that the patient must be ill to allow the physician to treat the patient. This holds particularly if the treatment is dangerous or requires invasive methods during the process of healing.

There is a halachic controversy as to the derivation of the mandate to heal. While most authorities hold to a broad mandate, there are minority opinions that limit the scope of the authorization to provide medical care. [See Exodus 21:19] An example is that the command to heal is a sign that permission has been granted to physicians to heal blows and wounds that are externally visible. However, all internal illnesses are in G-d's hand to heal. Accordingly, our Torah instructs that in the mitzvot to heal, "that any of the diseases that I placed upon Egypt, I will not bring upon you, for I am G-d, your healer." [Exodus 15:26] This verse implies that G-d does not need humans to cure the afflictions that He creates.

As there is no inherent right for Jews to practice medicine, but that the Torah carefully prescribes that medical practice is based on saving human life. The complexity of the tension between G-d's control of health and the role of the human healer is stated in the Shulchan Aruch Yoreh Deah 336, "The Torah gives permission to the physician to heal; moreover, this is a mitzvah and is included in the mitzvah of saving life. If the physician withholds services, it is considered a shedder of blood."


In summary, the Torah clearly states that healing is permitted and it immediately becomes a mitzvah – a religious obligation – like all other mitzvot. Our Jewish law quite appropriately states, "The Torah gives permission to the physician to heal; moreover, this is a mitzvah."






