Pids these days! I recently found myself at the Temple of Luxor exhibit at the Metropolitan Museum of Art. As might be expected, a tourist was taking a


possibilities for learning through technology, that careful attention is being paid by the nonnatives to ways in which they can get the natives to turn their interest in technology into

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE by Jonathan Meister

There is something to be said about sitting on an airplane at 37,000 feet. For one, the phone doesn't ring and I refuse to purchase wifi to connect to the internet. Instead this is my downtime. I just got off a flight to Los Angeles and while flying is torture in many ways it also allows me to decompress, have time for myself and think. So does Shabbat.

While the summer is supposed to be "quiet" it has been anything but that. For me personally at work it has been a very challenging time as I have just assumed the role of Managing Partner of my law firm. My normal long hours have become longer and will so for the forseeable future. Our synagogoue will continue to keep me busy and there are always new things to do and new challenges. Yet, every Friday at sundown comes a break, Shabbat. This past week was particularly busy. I sat on the bima after two hours in traffic Friday afternoon, turned to the Rabbi and he gave me a look and wave of his hands to signify that all was to slow down, all would be calm as we broke into the *Lecha Dodi* and it was true, I was back at 37,000 feet, albeit in a more comfortable chair.

THE CANTOR'S CLOUD by Cantor Menachem Bazian The Unscheduled Meeting

Came to work this morning expecting to work on a combination of things, some related to my new job and some related to my old. My day was going to be filled with changes to the district website, special data requests, construction and renovations projects, security plans for the new school year and much more.

My phone chirped at about 11 a.m. I was being summoned to the superintendent's office. No explanation was given. It was just a request to immediately leave my office and go to the main administration building. Naturally, I was curious. I grabbed my files so as to be ready for whatever the subject of this unplanned meeting was and I ran out the door.

I came in to grave faces. I was informed that one of my fellow directors, a young woman of 42 years old, had been found that morning in her apartment. Apparently, she passed away in the middle of the night.

In the blink of an eye, my day changed. I still had to get my work done but I now had to deal with a grieving staff. My administrative assistant was in tears. People were in shock. For the first time in over three years here, I had to change "hats." I switched from my weekly role of employee for the Board of Education and exercised my skills as a clergy and comfort them. Now that the day is done and my work has been completed, I realize that this is my first opportunity to deal with my own feelings of shock and sadness over a sweet, dear person who passed at a much too young age. It has given me another opportunity to take a step back and reflect on what is really important.

I once worked for a consulting firm in New Jersey. I had recently joined the firm and I asked for permission to work from home one morning. I informed the president of the company that I intended to take a few hours and attend my twin sons' Chanukah play (I think they were 4 or 5 at the time). The day after the play, I thanked him for allowing me the time. He responded with words I have never forgotten:

"Menachem, don't you realize that this is all baloney? Important baloney, to be sure, but compared to what is really important, this is baloney."

It is so easy to get caught up in the day-to-

day craziness and lose track of what life is truly about. I have become increasingly cognizant over the years of everything I missed when my kids were growing up. All those hours I worked in the office that perhaps I could have spent with them are hours I will never have back.

As we enter the High Holiday season this September, we have an opportunity to take stock of who we are, what we do and how well we allocate that most precious resource: time. We are not masters of the time we spend on this world, that is determined by the *Rebono Shel Olam* (Master of the World). During the *Mussaf* service on *Rosh Hashana* and *Yom Kippur*, we say:

"On *Rosh Hashana* their decree is inscribed, and on *Yom Kippur* it is sealed: how many will pass away and how many will be created, who will live and who will die;"

We know that the High Holiday season is when we are meant to look at where we are at and what we can do better. We are asked not only to look at how we can do better with *Hashem* but we must also look at how we can do better with each other. As the *Talmud* breaks it down, we have to review our actions *Bayn Adam LaMakom* (between man and G-d) and *Bayn Adam LaChaveiro* (between man and his fellow man).

I truly believe that G-d, who created us as we are with our strengths and weaknesses, stacks the deck in our favor. He wants us to have a good year. If that were not true, we could not call him *Hashem Hashem Kayl Rachum VeChanun* (G-d, G-d, Almighty who is merciful and gracious). Yet we do call him that because he is.

All he requires of us is that we make a good faith effort to better ourselves.

I cannot explain the phenomenon of death coming to someone so young. But I can take a lesson from it. Each day is a gift from *Hashem* and we should treat it as such. Yes, we have to work and pay bills, but we must do our best to make time for what is truly important in life: the ones we love.

As we go through this High Holiday season, let us resolve at least to make more time for those we love. When all is said and done, there is nothing more essential than that. Let us also resolve to be there for those in our families and our community. Let us spend more time improving ourselves by spending time with and helping others. Let us endeavor to help bring peace between parents and children, siblings, and friends where conflict may exist. These are truly worthwhile undertakings. The salaries gained from such activities may not increase our balance at the bank but it will increase our balance with *Hashem*. It will also give us happier and more fulfilled lives.

Chana and I wish you a happy, healthy and prosperous new year. Or, more to the point, *Ah Kesiva Vachasima Tova*! May you all be inscribed and sealed in the book of life for the year 5779.

Congregant of the Month Jonathan Meister: A Man of Many Parts by Julie Feldman

Conathan Meister, our current synagogue President, hides a lot underneath his buttoned-down, lawyerly exterior. A graduate of Suffern High School, Pennsylvania University and Albany Law School, he works for a Manhattan law firm that specializes in medical malpractice defense. During his school years, he was involved in a variety of groups, where he developed his organizational and leadership skills, learned how large volunteer groups functioned and how to work effectively toward goals with others. He has had a lot of leadership training and has developed the ability to multi-task effectively. He and his family joined Congregation Shaarey Israel five years ago after his father passed away and Jonathan needed to find a minyon for Kaddish. Jonathan's father was a rabbi and a friend of Rabbi and Leah Chanofsky, Jonathan got his school supplies at Sam Bradin's "Toy Box" and his parents knew many of the synagogue members. We spoke over several evenings and below is a condensed version of my questions and Jonathan's answers.

JF: What made you decide to become a lawyer? **JM:** My father was a Rabbi and a chaplain for the Holland America line, (which was where I first developed a passion for travel), and also a professional speaker. This was my introduction into public speaking, obviously a necessary skill for a litigator. Although there was some talk of me also going into the rabbinate or into medicine, I found myself drawn to law. It was a popular field at the time, and I'd read a lot about it. Later, in my first position, I got involved with medical malpractice law and liked it.

JF: If you didn't end up doing that, what would you have done? JM: I would have become an airline pilot!

JF: What are your hobbies? **JM:** I love to travel and we go to Israel at least once a year, as well as other places. I also like to read when I get the chance.

JF: If money were not an object, what would you do?

JM: I'd probably do more traveling and volunteering. It would be great to have homes in various countries, especially in Israel, and a place in New York City and up in Massachusetts.

JF: If you could pick any time period to live in, what would it be and why? JM: It would probably be Israel, 1948, as a

pioneer, to be part of the founding and building of the nation. My family and I have very strong connections with Israel with a lot of friends and relatives there and I have always been impressed with the sacrifices and lives of that generation.

JF: Please sum up your philosophy of life in one sentence.

JM: It's important to be respectful of all people.

JF: What is the one thing about you that would surprise people?

JM: I'm more social and more relaxed than people think. I'm much more approachable. When I'm not working or not "being President", I like to be with friends, relax and enjoy the times.

JF: What last thoughts do you want to end this interview with?

JM: This congregation is special and welcoming, but it can't remain static. We have to adapt to the realities that we, and other organized religious institutions face. My goal is to plan how to insure the ongoing functioning, future and life of our congregation. I want to assure the congregation that the future is not being ignored. Stability is primary and we now have a base on which to build with the integration of Rabbi and Yocheved Weinbach into our congregational family. 
