IT'S YOUR RESPONSIBILITY

(Is. 45:1, 4-6; Psalm 96:1, 3, 4-5, 7-10; 1Thess. 1:1-5b, Matt. 22:15-21)

In Exodus 20: 1-3, we read: "God said...I am the Lord your God...Do not worship any god except Me." You and "I pledge allegiance to...the United States of America...one nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all." Our nation was built on God's values! However, like many other nations we practice the policy of separation of church and state. In contrast, during Jesus' time, no one ever conceived of the idea of separation of church and state. At that time the official Roman religion revolved around emperor worship, while the religion and government of Judah revolved around the Lord, the God of Israel. It is no wonder that there was always a clash between Rome and Judah. It was often violent and bloody, but could have been prevented!

Most people do not love paying taxes! In today's gospel, we see the Pharisees who resented the Roman occupation of the pure land of Israel. They did not support the Roman occupation and their policy of paying the census tax. On the contrary, the Herodians supported it. The former tried to trap Jesus: "Tell us...Is it lawful to pay the census tax to Caesar or not?" They wanted Jesus to take a political stand, but He did not want to be drawn into the fight. If He supported a side, He would either be considered a collaborator or an insurrectionist. Hence He retorts: "Why are you testing Me, you hypocrites...Repay Caesar what belongs to Caesar and to God what belongs to God." Over the years, this pronouncement has been taken out of context, and has been used to justify a two kingdom ideology or philosophy, where life is divided into two autonomous realms – the secular and the religious, or worse still, it has been used to justify unswerving obedience to secular authority. These views are far from the truth of the Gospel. By saving: "Repay to Caesar what belongs to Caesar," Jesus addresses the census tax issue only and exemplifies His rejection of violence as a way of dealing with oppressive or hostile situations / governments.

In every aspect of our life, we must give to God what belongs to Him – honor – worship praise – glory – obedience! As Christians living in a materialistic and consumerist society, we are faced with balancing the demands of Caesar with the commands of God. All over the world, Catholics are called to live a life of the gospel in any and every situation. At baptism, we promised to reject Satan – to obey and love God above all things. Inasmuch as we have the civic duties to vote, pay taxes and patronize our country; we have a much higher obligation to be faithful to our religious duties – our baptismal promises. We must put God first above all other things.

In today's first reading, the Lord blesses Cyrus, because, although he was a pagan king, he respected God and put God first in his dealings with the people. In the second reading, St. Paul writing to the Thessalonians, compliments them for "their work of faith and labor of love and endurance in hope of our Lord Jesus Christ". As Christians, we are called to endure and continue to be committed in our faith in the midst of challenges. We should not give in to pressure from political leaders and legislators who pass laws that seek to destroy lives by legalizing abortion, going to war or by continuing the practice of the death penalty. When societal values and governmental legislations conflict with our Christian values, we must always give priority to God's laws, rather than human's. A Christian has the duty and indeed the obligation to obey God's commandments over and above all civil and human legislations.
