Pastor Leanne's Message: Song of Solomon 2:10-13

My beloved speaks and says to me: "Arise, my love, my beautiful one, and come away, 11 for behold, the winter is past; the rain is over and gone. 12 The flowers appear on the earth, the time of singing has come, and the voice of the turtledove is heard in our land. 13 The fig tree ripens its figs, and the vines are in blossom; they give forth fragrance. Arise, my love, my beautiful one, and come away. Okay, so, it's a love song – sensually graphic and not the kind of thing one normally associates with scripture. And yet it is included in the holy script in all of its detailed glory. Young lovers frolic in the emerging springtime – everything is beautiful and new and sensual.

This scripture came to mind as we emerge from a long hard winter. I spotted my first robin last week, and the mountains of snow are almost gone and this morning, raucous birds woke me up around 4:00 in the morning; as the scripture says, the time for singing has come, the voice of birds are heard in the land, things are beginning to blossom. Arise, and come away, the poet cries, "get up, get out, enjoy life, and love, and be glad.

It's good advice for all of us: get up, get out, enjoy life, and love, and be glad. Winter cooped us up - it made gathering inconvenient, and at times impossible, and it kept us in separate places with minimal connection – not good for the soul. Let's let the new creation of springtime thaw out the tiredness of the winter, and let us seek each other in the sunshine for mutual enjoyment of God's blessings.



Covering walkways with cardboard and woodchips for weed control Planting

The Per Capita Special Offering is a special offering of our church that extends the entire year. We start to talk about it in January of each

art to talk about it in January of each Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.)

year and provide added information throughout the year in the form of periodic minutes for mission, special articles in the newsletter and church bulletins.

Per Capita is the amount that the church must pay to the larger church for each member of the church. This year that amount is \$50 per member. The per capita payment of each church in our denomination is divided between the Presbytery, the Synod, and the General Assembly, and provides the most substantial source of funding that supports the larger church and enables it to provide the connectionism that makes the Presbyterian Church unique and enables it to function the way that it does. If you have not served in a leadership position in the church, you may not appreciate all that the larger church does in support of the individual churches and its members. Without the connectional relationships that exist in our denomination between the individual churches and the Presbyteries, Synods, and the General Assembly many churches would find it very difficult to survive without the guidance and leadership offered by the larger church organization and staff personnel. One example of how the larger church benefitted our church in recent years is the Investment Loan Program (ILP) that financed the Phase I of our HVAC system upgrade with a 2% loan. Without this program our church would have found it much more difficult and expensive to obtain the necessary financing.

We mention the Per Capita Special Offering starting in January and request that each member consider giving a gift to the church of \$50 to cover their share of the church's financial obligation to the larger church. If you are a member that pledges income each year to the church, and would like to be able to help support other members who might find it financially unfeasible to pledge or to make the separate per capita donation, your separate gift of \$50 will help cover the cost of membership for that less fortunate member of the church. You can make your per capita gift to the church simply by making out a check and sending it to the church office with per capita written in the memo blank on the check. You may also place it in the collection baskets in the rear of the sanctuary on Sunday morning.

Please consider making a separate per capita payment to the church this year and feel confident that you are doing your part to help support our Presbyterian Church and its membership in the largest Presbyterian Church organization in the world.

Pentecost Sunday is Coming May 28, 2023

The Pentecost Offering helps our youth begin life with a strong start, a solid foundation of faith, formed in the first third of life, from childhood through young adulthood.

Each year on Pentecost Sunday, we celebrate the gift of the Holy Spirit and the birthday of the church. The Holy Spirit remains with us still, connecting us with the church of the past, continuing to inspire the church of today, pointing us to the church of the future. Each year, the celebration is marked by receiving the Pentecost Offering which nurtures the faith of the church to come - children, youth, and young adults.

Psalm 71 testifies that a foundation of faith established during childhood helps ensure lifelong faith and service. The patterns and lessons established during these formative years continue to bear fruit throughout life. By giving the Pentecost Offering, our congregation participates in helping our children, youth and young adults grow up to proclaim with the Psalmist, "O God, from my youth you have taught me, and I still proclaim your wondrous deeds.

40% of the offering is retained by the local congregation for investment in local programs. This year the FPC Child Care Center will receive the 40% to enhance their goals of supportive services to youth and their families. This will create strong healthy relationships in our community.

The remaining 60% is sent to the Presbyterian Church USA for young adult volunteer programs throughout the world, youth ministries and child advocacy that nurtures our children and youth in mind, body, and spirit.

Thank you for participating in celebrating Pentecost Sunday and our youth.


First Presbyterian wiping away flu, cold symptoms in our childcare center!
