Fifth Sunday of Lent March 29, 2020

The Church of Saint Cecilia

What does being a "good' Catholic look like in the time of the coronavirus? ...a pastor's epistle

Our expectations about what we value and what we can safely do are forcing us to make some radical changes and adjustments to our behavior and thinking. Like you, I look for direction from medical and scientific authorities as well as our civil and religious leaders. Then the burden for each of us is to listen, interpret and apply responsibly as we are able. Sadly, the actions we have determined are central to our functioning as a church, namely assembling on the Lord's Day, hearing the Word of God together and offering our prayer of the Eucharist which bids us to take and eat are those actions which will prove to be deadly.

As a sacramental church, we define ourselves by the ways we fully engage our bodies and our senses in communicating and experiencing the faith. Because we have created so many means to "go through the motions" of our faith expression, we have also discovered ways of *not* being fully present and aware when we are engaged in our practice. Someone wrote recently, "More than we think, we don't know what else to do if we don't do Mass, liturgy, adoration or catechism. In this Christianity of 'doing' things, are we not materialists of the interior life?"

Well before this crisis, though, I have felt that some of our members seem to have been increasingly determined that in order to "count" as a Catholic, the more pious practices one can pile on, the more one can be assured of true worthiness in God's eyes. Once I've determined how satisfying those exercises can be, I can also proceed to determine that others who don't do as I do are likewise less worthy. Perhaps as a church, we have developed a market for those who find security in knowing that tuning in to Relevant Radio, watching only EWTN, praying the Divine Chaplet—as nice as those things may be—are necessary components of being a valued member of the church. Whether we like it or not, the virus may either bring us back to the essentials of our faith or may accelerate the proliferation of private devotional practices to the detriment or our communal witness.

The values of the liturgical renewal which intended to foster "the full and active participation" of the faithful are in real danger of being supplanted by what I've experienced as an increasing cluttering of the liturgical environment and experience. I've felt this in recent years before the appearance of the virus. It seems we have the need to pack more things into the experience to assure ourselves that we are really doing something worthy or sacred. Of course, we have had all kinds of things in our historic and liturgical closets to draw from. From a "less is more" aesthetic, we have jumped fully to a "more is more" one.

The value of streaming the mass in our own church is not a satisfying substitute for being physically present with each other in making a live event of our speech, song and actions. I find it odd, though, that we feel the need to add private devotional prayers or activities into the recordings to suggest that they will enhance the value of what we're being deprived of. I find it odd that at the end of a few of the recorded masses I've seen, some have felt the need to end the broadcast by bringing out a monstrance and placing it on the altar for a display of the reserved host, as if the "real presence" of the Eucharist is now being validated or enhanced by our viewing the host as an object.

The church has been attempting to help us grow in our awareness that we are nourished at the table of the Word *and* the table of the Eucharist. Because we have culturally privileged values that are private and personal over those that are communally held, we have also minimized the value of the <u>assembled body</u> as an expression of the real presence of Christ. Whatever in Word or Sacrament we have been commanded to "take and eat" is also what we are commissioned to support each other to share outside church

Improving the quality of our recorded Liturgies

Thank you for the many responses and suggestions you've sent us. Please be aware that the camera and recording equipment we have do not interface well with the amplified sound in the church. Our camcorder, for example, does not have the capacity to receive an external audio source. We want to explore our options and the cost of upgrading or switching to other equipment/formats before we invest in them. The Liturgy is a live event and transferring it in an effective way that approximates our experience in real time will take us some time. If you have access to equipment or experience to share, send Theresa O'Toole an email. She is the most tech savvy on our staff. Meanwhile, we'll keep experimenting to make sharing this gift of the liturgy more worthwhile.

COMMUNITY NEWS

St Cecilia's Applied Research Project

The St. C's Parish Community Council and St. Cecilia Parish is participating in the University of St. Thomas' MBA Applied Business Research class for this spring. With our participation, four students are researching our demographics as a parish and the community that surrounds us. They are looking at current engagement and potential new members using scholarly research and journal articles, demographic information about our Twin Cities community, and interviews/focus groups of parish members and former parish members. In a few weeks, they will also be sending out a quantitative survey to all members of the parish with email addresses and paper copies for those who do not. We would appreciate participation in these efforts to help our parish understand our current state, future possibilities, and helping four students with their project. This research for St. C's will be presented at the Parish Assembly on June 14. Some people have been asked to be interviewed and some interviews have taken place. More interview subjects for parishioners under 40 who are active and inactive church goers are needed.
