#### Pantry Grocery Games By Marcia Lewis

I watch a lot of food network shows. My favorite one is Guy's Grocery Games (Triple G). I have a group of ladies who celebrate each other's birthdays during the year with shopping and dinner and sometimes out of town trips. As I was sheltering in place on a Wednesday, I sent my "Birthday Babes" a group text and said "why don't we play a food game on Friday night?" They all agreed and the Birthday Babes took out their aprons and we played our own version of Triple G, calling it "Pantry Grocery Games."

Our rules were as follows: we had to use at least 75% of our ingredients from our current pantry items, and no more than 25% from our current freezer or refrigerator. We had to take 2 pictures: The first was of the pantry items to make sure the item count was within the rules. The second was a picture of the finished, plated dish-which was of course paired with a glass of wine. Finally, we had to make a video describing our ingredients, showing our dish with our husbands tasting, commenting and rating our dish. The husbands were to judge the dish (for a total of 4 points) by 1) correct use of ingredients, 2) plating/presentation, 3) taste. Unbelievably all dishes received a 4. What husband would not give his wife a 4?

Each Babe looked in their pantry and came up with their own recipe. We talked and texted back and forth over a day or two, laughing about what we could

make with the items we had at hand. We spent way more time talking about the meal than actu-

ally cooking, but it turned out to be a great diversion from the current world situation. Jane made spaghetti sauce and pasta with homemade Italian breadsticks and peanut butter cookies. Kathy made a chicken and dumpling casserole, English peas and deviled eggs with jalapeno. Mary Lou made a tuna potato casserole with Alan's green beans, accompanied by a very risquély plated salad. made Chicken Piccata with capers over angel hair pasta and homemade bread. We then spent the evening "together" eating dinner and sharing our pictures and vid-



#### Creativity and Joy Abound in Smoke Rise

What do you do when your son turns 23 and you can't throw a party? According to Kanawha neighbor Brenda Alexander, you "Card My Yard!" That's her with her grand-daughter, husband, mom and birth-day boy, Charlie. She found the Card My Yard company online and ordered up a party.

Intrigued by the idea, I did some investigating and found the company



was founded six years ago by two stay-at-home moms in Austin, Texas. They met at a Bible Study, became friends, and founded the company with the goal of spreading joy and making a positive impact on the community as small business owners.

While there is plenty of bad stemming from the Corona virus, it seems to be doing some good, certainly for this company. They already have more than 75 franchise locations in 20 states across the country, and the uptick in business from people like the Alexanders, wanting to celebrate a milestone without a gathering, will be good business for them.

On their website is a statement reflecting the hearts of these creative and caring entrepreneurs: "We are honored to share in celebrating milestone moments in others' lives and hearing stories of great joy and accomplishment." What an honorable business motivation!

#### Tucker Kicks Off 2020 SPLOST Campaign

The City of Tucker kicked off their 2020 SPLOST resurfacing efforts in late March,

with crews getting to work on the first of what will be nearly 80 streets to be repaved over the next few months.

"We're happy that Tucker is at work," said Tucker Mayor Frank Auman at a ribbon cutting celebration on Thursday morning. "We want to keep operations going in the City and we want to keep operations of every business that can do so safely going in the City."



The Mayor and City

Council voted last month to approve a \$4.4 million contract with Gwinnett County-based contractor E.R. Snell to perform the work. Their crews will resurface 79 roads covering 19.2 miles of roadway throughout the remainder of the year.

The work is being funded mostly through Tucker's share of the DeKalb County SPLOST. The SPLOST passed a referendum in 2017 and will be in effect until 2024. In the first two years of its SPLOST-funded road resurfacing program, the City has managed to repave about 50 streets. The program, which has consistently stayed under budget, is managed by professionals from Jacobs Engineering.

By the end of January, the Varsity and JV squads were selected and it was time to prepare for the season. In addition to the team's readiness, the field was manicured, and the concessions were fully

stocked. Hot dogs, hamburgers, chicken fingers, fries, chips, drinks, candy, gum & sunflower seeds were the key items. It was time to play ball!

By early spring, the baseball teams had begun playing and THS was leading in their region. This would come to a screeching halt with the onset of the COVID-19 pandemic. But the Tucker Tigers were still able to hit an amazing out of the park homerun!

How could they hit a homerun, you ask, if the season was cancelled? The answer is Carolyn's Giving Closet. With school out, many students and their families still need assistance with food. The Tucker Tigers Baseball Team made the decision to donate all of its concessions to a chari-

From this closet, she now helps needy THS students by giving donations of food, supplies, and other necessities. Carolyn's Giving Closet has not only received attention from the THS community - but from the Mayor of Tucker, Frank Auman, the local news, and was nationally featured on the Steve Harvey Show.

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

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



cost is \$27,621,279. It is anticipated that the new school will be "open for business" in August of 2021.


Here's a drawing of what the school will look like when all is done:




DeKalb County shares its news, events, and meetings on television, online, and through the county's various social media channels. The county also compliments city services with the seamless continuation of essential government operations – including public safety, public works, and sanitation. I'm sure you've noticed our garbage, yard waste and recycling are being picked up as usual! DeKalb County's Watershed Management continues its vital functions to ensure our drinking water is still safe to consume. According to the Centers for Disease Control, the COVID-19 virus has not been detected in drinking water, and conventional water treatment methods that use filtration and disinfection, like those in our drinking water systems, should remove or inactivate the virus that causes covid-19.

The county's "Meals on Wheels" program continues (with some minor adjustments due to COVID-19) as well as the meal service provided to members of the county's multi-purpose and senior centers. And, while the Tucker Recreation Center is temporarily closed, along with the county's nine recreation centers, students can still pick up free afternoon snacks at each of the county's recreation centers – Monday through Friday, from 3:30 p.m. to 4:30 p.m.

The electric-green unfurling pines and hardwoods were joyously letting us know their presence. Slim Iris buds were pointing to the sky, promising a future show and the spiky creeping phlox was spilling over the stone wall in an array of bright magenta and lavender. I never grow tired of the riot of color and texture as spring unfolds.

Suddenly, something fast and buzzing whizzed past my window. With the flowering trees and profusion of pollen Mrs. Carpenter Bee had come to take up residence. She would soon be busily drilling holes in the bright white painted wood under the gutters. Last year I had craftily purchased a "bee trap" only to sympathetically release them when they became trapped and agitated in the catch jar. Turns out these cumbersome and less than dainty insects are actually expectant mothers and their perfectly drilled holes are for their eggs. Fortunately, they are not eating the wood (like termites) or building colonies or hives. These little ladies expertly bore their nest, shove in wads of pollen and then lay their eggs. Their male counterparts hover near the nest and often will approach nearby animals, but have no stinger so are harmless. The new baby bee larvae soon hatch and eat the pollen until later in the summer when they emerge into the garden. Like many other bees, carpenter bees are good pollinators and necessary to the balance and survival of our plants and world. Several flower species are solely pollinated by carpenter bees alone.

Glad to have ya girls, but maybe I'll try out a little vinyl siding next year!

### **HEALTH NOTES:**

#### **All Movement Counts!**

The phrase "All Movement Counts" is at the top of my list for the year of 2020. In our day and age, so many people believe they are not doing enough if they do not go to the gym or dedicate 30 minutes daily to exercise. We all know this--going to the gym, workout classes and home exercise machines are a relatively new thing. Today, during our time of social distancing, I thought I would give you some ideas you can use at home to keep active, burn calories, maintain or gain strength and stay healthy.

The first thing I would like to point out is that your baseline level of activity counts. This is what has changed most in America. We have so many conveniences! Everything is at the touch of our hand or just down the street. We no longer grow our own vegetables, gather eggs, milk the cow or walk long distances. For the most part, our jobs are no longer physically active. Some of us never go outside. Many of us do not maintain our own lawns or maintain the interior of our houses. Someone else does it for us. This 'frees us up' to do other important tasks-- tasks that are largely sedentary. An important study I read several years ago showed that 'fit' athletes who ran 60 minutes a day and then sat seven hours or more a day --in their jobs, commuting and in front of the TV or computer-- had higher death rates over an eight year period than those who ran 60 minutes a day and sat for only one hour a day. This points to the importance of baseline activities being incorporated into our lives again.

The second thing I would like to point out, is that it is not just the calories burned that counts. In fact, strength, muscle mass, flexibility and balance are very important to maintain as you age. This can keep you from becoming a frail elderly individual, and instead keep you vigorous and active.

Finally: My little list of alternatives to the gym to consider while sheltering in place:

- 1. YouTube videos of home exercise routines. MANY are free! Your gym or current exercise class may be posting classes to follow along with virtually. Some will have a small cost attached. Among them are dance routines, Pilates, Zumba, yoga, stretching, balance exercises, high rep, low weight strength exercises you can do with resistance bands, 1-5 lb weights or using canned goods as weights. Leslie Sansone has quite a few walking routines that can be done inside.
- 2. MapMyWalk/ MapMyRun/ MyFitnessPal all are apps for your smart-phone. They will help you calculate calories of food, find and track exercises or steps and often have challenges, some with prizes if you reach the goal.
- 3. Gardening, raking, and sacking weeds and leaves are all roughly equivalent to water aerobics in energy expended. Lawn mowing, and any outdoor work is real exercise.
- 4. Moving boxes around or moving furniture burns even more calories. You have time for this now!
- 5. Painting a house or rooms in a house.
- 6. Walk the dog. Go at least ½ mile each time.
- 7. Climb the stairs in your house. Make multiple trips up and down.
- 8. House work: vacuuming, dusting, sweeping, laundry—they burn more calories than you think.
- 9. Wall sits, planks, pushups (modified if needed), burpees. All these exercises have 30-day challenges associated with them on the internet.
- 10. Walk, jog or bike in the neighborhood. Take a hill for a challenge. Do a 60 second sprint or fast walk 2-3 times during your walk. Develop an after dinner walk routine with your family.

Move, move, move. All movement counts! Chores are activities that strengthen and stretch muscles and will keep you from losing what you already have.



Using Time Wisely

A friend shared with me his plan for getting through this unsettling time of sheltering at home. He was taking the advice of experts who say we should use this time to "finish up things we have started." So he dove right in, first finishing off the Merlot, moving on to the Chardonnay, and ending with topping off the Scotch. Ok, so that isn't what the experts were recommending, but here is something well worth doing while you are shuttered in.

Many of us who are staying home and using appliances more will likely see higher than usual energy bills. But that doesn't have to be the case. There are lots of easy ways to reduce bills, and a quick and easy way of finding those ideas is at your fingertips on the Georgia Power website

www.georgiapower.com. When you get to the website, select Residential, then select Save Money & Energy. On that page, scroll down until you find the Home Energy Checkup. Or you can use the search box on the home page to locate it. When you click the Checkup link, you are given two options: One is for an Online Energy Checkup and the other is for an Estimated Energy Checkup. The Online one is best because it pulls in your billing history, meter-read dates, and coincident local weather and then runs a sophisticated energy analysis of potential savings in your home. You DO have to have registered on their website and have to log in to your

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can use the Estimated Checkup on the website. It's remarkably accurate even without your billing information.

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Either Checkup will ask you some questions about your home. They are simple questions that most customers can easily answer, like how many people live there, how large is your home, how insulated is it, and so on. Once you complete the home profile and click Submit and you will see six or more recommendations, each showing the dollars you are likely to save by taking that suggestion. Some of the recommendations have links to rebate programs you can access to save even more money. At the bottom of the Recommendation page, you can see your Annual Energy Use Breakdown showing where your energy dollars are going for Cooling, Heating, Refrigeration, Lighting and other Appliances. This is enlightening as many people think their lights and appliances are the energy hogs in their homes. This is rarely the case because in Georgia, the typical home annually uses 60 percent of its electricity for air conditioning! And it is well known that moving the thermostat a few degrees higher in the summer is one of the most impactful savings tips around.

Fortunately, the pandemic hit during a time where few are running their air conditioners, so bills should not be extremely high yet. If you do struggle with paying the bills now, the Georgia Power website has a whole section on Payment Options with many helpful links and advice.

So, while you may be pent-up at home, there are productive uses of time that can save you money in the months and years to come.

#### Shelter in Place Means Our Gardens Will Prosper! Things You Can Do Right Now

The Shelter-in-Place order has had Smoke Rise residents spilling out into their backyards to get out of the house. This is going to make Smoke Rise a more beautiful community. Here are a few ideas in case you need some motivation.

- NOW is the time to weed and trim back bushes that have just bloomed. You can mulch, too. Just throw the mulch over the trimmed branches unless they had disease.
- Pull the ivy, but be on the look out for snakes. Wear heavy boots and stir the ivy with a stick before you reach.
- Cut the ivy at the base of trees. You can pull it down or wait for it to die before pulling, but that will take several weeks.
- Spray poison ivy with a heavy-duty weed killer.
- Pull blackberry brambles (with leather gloves on). Be sure to get the roots. Leaving a little root will allow it to grow back.
- Cut honeysuckle down from fences and paint the cut surface with Round-up or pull it out by the roots.
- The Garden Enthusiast will pick up plants from Grower's Outlet for you. You have to order and pay online (see below). Other stores like Pike will meet you at the curb with plants you have ordered and paid for.
- Freshen you borders with perennials like phlox and candytuft. Plant iris, daylily and other bulbs that will bloom later. Pull mulch away from the rhizomes of bulb plants, exposing them to the sun. They will bloom better.
- Plant groundcover in places under trees where the grass no longer grows.
- Prepare raised beds or try a small bed in a sunny spot—6 hours of sun is minimal. If you are like me, you have few spots like this, so you could use containers that can be moved around, or put containers in the driveway near the garage, on a deck or near the front door.
- Pressure wash your deck and driveway/sidewalk.
- Get out there and soak up some sun!!

On my first trip to buy groceries after "shelter in place" had been implemented, I was expecting to see empty shelves of some items--toilet paper, milk, bread and the other usual suspects that are the first to go in an ice storm. I was shocked to see that the shelves were completely empty of flour, sugar and other baking products. It makes sense, I suppose. Moms are killing two birds with one stone and letting kids make their own snacks. I am hoping that it also means that home baking is undergoing a revival. No mix will ever replace Aunt Molly's coconut cake or Mama Stella's homemade caramel cake. I decided that since this is the 50th anniversary of The Smoke Signal (1970), it would be nice to research some of the most popular cakes of that era. It was not an easy choice, but I chose Red Velvet Cake and German Chocolate. There were many other popular cakes, such as Hummingbird Cake, Italian Cream Cake, Mississippi Mud & Carrot Cake to name a few. All are worth the extra time and effort it takes to make a treat your family will forever associate with being housebound during the Covid epicemic!

#### Red Velvet Cake

1 ½ tsp baking soda 3 eggs 1 ½ cup buttermilk 2 ½ cups sugar 1 ¼ cup cooking oil 1 ½ tsp vanilla

1 ½ tsp. vinegar 1 bottle red food coloring 3 ¾ cup plain flour 1 food coloring bottle of water

Beat eggs, add sugar, oil and vinegar. Sift flour and soda; add to egg mixture. Add buttermilk slowly. Add vanilla, red coloring and water. Bake in 3 layers (9 " pans) for 30 min. at 350 degrees.

When cool, frost layers with cream cheese frosting:

- 1 (8oz) pkg. cream cheese at room temperature
- 1 box powdered sugar
- 1 stick butter or margarine- room temp.
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 1 cup chopped pecans.

Mix butter and cream cheese add vanilla. Add powdered sugar a little at a time, then add pecans. Spread on cooled layers.

#### German Sweet Chocolate Cake

1 (4 0z.) pkg Bakers German Sweet Chocolate

½ cup boiling water

- 1 cup butter
- 2 cups sugar
- 4 egg yolks, unbeaten
- 1 tsp Vanilla
- 2 ½ cups Swan's Down cake flour
- ½ tsp salt
- 1 tsp baking soda
- 1 cup buttermilk
- 4 egg whites stiffly beaten

Melt chocolate in boiling water. Cool. Cream butter and sugar until fluffy. Add egg yolks one at a time and beat well after each. Add melted chocolate and vanilla. Mix well. Sift together flour, salt and soda. Add alternately with buttermilk to chocolate mixture, beating after each addition until smooth. Fold in beaten egg whites. Pour into three 9" layer pans. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 to 40 minutes.

#### **Coconut Pecan Frosting**

- 1 cup evaporated milk
- 1 cup sugar
- 3 egg yolks
- ½ cup butter
- 1 tsp vanilla
- 1 1/3 cup Bakers Angel Flake Sweet coconut
- 1 cup chopped pecans

Combine evaporated milk, sugar, egg yolks, butter and vanilla. Cook and stir over medium heat until thickened - about 12 minutes. Add coconut and pecans. Beat until thick enough to spread. Place one layer of cooled cake on plate. Add frosting on top and spread to edges. Repeat for all layers. Sides are not frosted but frosting will cascade down sides of cake for dramatic presentation!
