BAPTISM SAVES US!

(Is. 40:1-5, 9-11; Ps. 104: 1-4, 24-25, 27-30; Titus 2:11-14; 3:4-7: Luke 3:15-16, 21-22)

Our Lord voluntarily submitted Himself to the baptism of St. John, intended for sinners, in order to fulfill all righteousness. Jesus' gesture is a manifestation of His self-emptying. The Spirit Who had hovered over the waters of the first creation descended then on the Christ as a prelude of the new creation, and the Father revealed Jesus as His beloved Son. - CCC #1224.

The feast of the Baptism of the Lord marks the end of the Christmas season! On Christmas Day we celebrated the birth of Christ and His manifestation to the Jewish people. Last Sunday, on the feast of Epiphany, we celebrated His manifestation to peoples from other nations in the form of the *three kings*. Today, being the first Sunday in the Ordinary Time of the Church's Calendar, we celebrate another manifestation of Christ – His baptism by John the Baptist in the Jordan River.

Our Lord Jesus "is a man like us in all things but sin." He did not need to be baptized but He emptied Himself and received baptism at the hands of John the Baptist so that we, His followers, might imitate His humility, empty ourselves and thus, be filled by Him. John's baptism was meant for repentance - for the forgiveness of sins. On the contrary, Christ's baptism, the one you and I received, is salvific - for our own adoption as beloved sons and daughters of God. Thus, John himself testified, "I am baptizing you with water, but One mightier than I is coming...He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire."

In our catechetical instructions we learned that "Baptism washes away Original sin and all the sins we may have committed prior to baptism." It makes us members of God's holy family, the Church. It also makes us children of God. Today's gospel affirms this belief when heaven opened and the Holy Spirit descended upon Jesus like a dove and a voice from heaven declared, "You are My beloved Son; with You I am well pleased." This is exactly what happened when you and I were baptized, the Father claimed us as His adopted sons and daughters. Our sins were forgiven and we were redeemed and put on the path to God's eternal life.


As we celebrate our Lord's Baptism, we meditate on the fact that He did not need to be baptized, but He did anyway, that you and I might imitate the example of His humility and submission to doing the will of the Father. He gave Himself up so that we might be saved. Evidently, "In Christ Jesus you were given a circumcision but not by human hands, which removed completely from you the carnal body: I refer to baptism. On receiving it you were buried with Christ; and you also rose with Him for having believed in the power of God ... You were dead ... in sin ... He forgave all our sins. He canceled the record of our debts..." (Col. 2:11-14). Baptism frees us from sin and turns us into new creatures of God - it liberates us and empowers us to become His children. Apostle Paul, writing to Titus on baptism, indicates, "The grace of God has appeared, saving all and training us to reject godless ways and worldly desires...live temperately, justly...devoutly in this age ... " It is in baptism that you and I experienced "the kindness and generous love of God our Savior ... not because of any righteous deeds we had done but because of His mercy, He saved us through the bath of rebirth and renewal by Holy Spirit ... "

Like Christ, by baptism, you and I are God's children who must offer lives entirely to doing God's will - loving Him above all else and donating our time, talents and treasure in service to Him and our fellow brothers and sisters. The baptismal candle received on our behalf by our godparents and parents must always light our way to Christ - Light of the nations.

YEAR OF FAITH

BAPTIZED IN FAITH



This Sunday is a wonderful occasion on which we might reflect on the meaning of Baptism. This sacramental event so crucial for our spiritual journey is sometimes misunderstood by others, even those in our own faith community. As in the case of all the sacraments when we receive them has only a preliminary significance. Their effects

assist us in a life-giving way that can be momentous. For example, when a couple weds, the graces available are to form and strengthen their relationship each and every day for as long as they both live. When a man is called to Holy Orders, the graces continually flow as he ministers to saints and sinners. In the case of Baptism, when parents present their child or an adult approaches the sacramental rite, the permanent effect is not only the removal of original sin or any actual sin but the initiation of an eternal relationship with the Trinity and the Church.

With this in mind the reforms of Paul VI in regards to the sacrament are notable. In the introduction of the rite he states, in union with Vatican II, the paramount importance of parents. He goes so far as to say that pastors must have the moral assurance that the children will be led by example in the faith by them or the celebration of the sacrament must be postponed. Godparents are to assist in this function in a confirming role. (Because of this it must be recognized by both that this is not a societal nicety to share merely because of family or friendly connections but is a spiritual responsibility of great import.) In the rite it is the parents who speak for their child and many times during it they are questioned and reminded that it is their role to witness personally to the faith and it is through their eyes as the "first church" that their children will meet the Lord, understand His teachings, and follow His way. It is most moving to hear the words of blessing at the conclusion of the rite calling upon the Trinity to encourage mothers and fathers in the unity of faith they share with their children and upon the whole congregation to realize that it takes a Church to raise a Catholic.

As we rejoice in the beginning of the public ministry of Christ, let us renounce evil, reconfirm our faith in the Trinity of Persons, and be one with the faith community and her teachings.

Even though our winter has been fairly mild to date, snow and ice remain a threat this time of year. Next weekend we will take up a second collection to cover the expenses "old man winter" is sure to throw our way in the coming weeks. Please be as generous as possible.
