

TOLLESBORO LIONS CLUB APPROVES GROUNDS IMPROVEMENTS AND USE AT MARCH MEETING

TOLLESBORO LIONS CLUB TO BE TRAINING SITE FOR SPECIAL NEEDS ADULTS TRAINING FOR SPECIAL OLYMPICS

At the March 14, 2022 meeting of the Tollesboro Lions Club approved the use of the Tollesboro Lions Club Community Park Walking Track for use as a training center for Special Needs Adults training for the Special Olympics. Special needs adults will be utilizing the blacktop walking track for training. The group will led by Lighthouse Farms and plans to train on Mondays and Thursdays at the Fairgrounds to compete in future scheduled Special Olympics events.

TOLLESBORO LIONS CLUB APPROVES ADDITIONAL IMPROVEMENTS TO PLAYGROUND

At the March 22, 2022 meeting of the Tollesboro Lions Club, the Club approved the erection of a 4' black chain-link fence to be placed around the new Playground at a cost of \$5,526.62 to improve the safety of children utilizing the playground as well as making it easier for parents to watch over their young children. The majority of the cost of this improvement is from donations made to the Club specifically towards the Playground.

STEVE PEDERSEN JOINS RANKS OF MELVIN JONES FELLOW AND FINIS DAVIS FELLOW

Tollesboro Lions Club member Steve Pedersen joined the ranks of Lions Club members who have made financial contributions to Lions International (in consideration of the Melvin Jones Fellowship) and the Kentucky Lions Eye Foundation (in consideration of the Finis Davis Fellowship). Melvin Jones was the founder of Lions Clubs. Finis Davis is - to date - the only Kentuckian to become the International Director of Lions Club International. To become a Melvin Jones Fellow, the member (or an individual or entity on his behalf) must contribute \$1,000 to the Lions Club International Foundation. To become a Finis Davis Fellow, the member (or an individual or entity on his behalf) must contribute \$500 to the Kentucky Lions Eye Foundation.

Steve is only the second Tollesboro Lions Club member to join the ranks of a Melvin Jones Fellow ((the first being Charter Member William B. "Buddy" Grant, 1918-2002 the Club's third President 1956-1957 and first member to serve as District Governor 1957-1958), although the Tollesboro Lions Club did bestow the honor on Glenn Cole recently. Steve is the first Finis Davis Fellow in the Tollesboro Lions Club.

The Melvin Jones Fellowship Award is the highest honor that may be bestowed on a Lions Club Member and may be presented to a Lions Club member or a member of the public by a Lions Club. The Finis Davis Fellowship is the highest honor that may be bestowed on a Lions Club member or a member of the public by the Kentucky Lions Clubs.

Steve is the Treasurer of the Tollesboro Lions Club, a past president, and is the LCIF Coordinator and Service Chairperson for the Tollesboro Lions Club. He is also serving as the current 2nd Vice District Governor. Steve joined the Tollesboro Lions Club in 1996.

TOLLESBORO LIONS CLUB TO HOST MEET THE CANDIDATES, FISH FRY & CAKE AUCTION EVENT

The Tollesboro Lions Club will host a Meet the Candidates Fundraiser, Fish Fry and Cake Auction Saturday, April 2nd, 2022 to be conducted at the Tollesboro Lions Club Fairgrounds in Tollesboro. This event is co-sponsored by the Lewis County Farm Bureau. The fish fry will begin being served at 6:00 pm. All 43 candidates on the Lewis County ballot for office in May -- including four statewide candidates for US Congress Representative, ten 4th Congressional District US Senate candidates, and 29 candidates for local office -- have been sent postcards informing them of the event and encouraging their participation (regardless of whether opposed or unopposed, regardless of party affiliation). Candidates wishing to place signage on the fence are encouraged to contact Tollesboro Lions Club Treasurer Steve Pedersen (606-301-1904) prior to the event to make arrangements. Neither the Tollesboro Lions Club nor the Lewis County Farm Bureau endorses any political candidate, political party, or political ideology and this event is sponsored solely as a fundraiser and to permit the public at large to meet the candidates.

At the February 14, 2022 meeting of the Tollesboro Lions Club, a member of the Club made a motion, properly seconded and ultimately approved that the Club host a Meet the Candidates Event and Cake Auction and further conditioned that Craig Stanfield be placed in the charge of the event. Under discussion, the argument being that Craig has always been in charge of these events in the past (as he is a licensed auctioneer and conducts benefit auctions on behalf of the Lions Club and other organizations each year); Craig pointed out that this year however is a bit different: While Craig is the Lions Club President, by making him the Organizerand the Master of Ceremonies of the Event, as well as Auctioneer, but this year Craig has the added responsibilities of being the current County Judge Executive and a candidate for County Judge Executive. Craig could not successfully argue against the event or the manner in which the Club wanted it conducted, as in the past Craig had always told the Club "You ONLY get this chance once every 4 years, and it's basically FREE MONEY!". Therefore Craig accepted the condition, the motion passed unanimously, and thus therefore Craig designed the postcards, sponsored their creation, addressed them to all candidates on the ballot, and mailed them at his expense to ALL the candidates on the ballot (just like he has done in the past when these events were scheduled).

ARBOR DAY IS APRIL 1ST! TOLLESBORO LIONS CLUB PARTICIPATES IN A TREE-GIVEAWAY

While National Arbor Day is April 29th, in Kentucky Arbor Day for 2022 is April 1st (Arbor Day is celebrated in all 50 states, however many states establish different dates in order to coincide with the best tree planting weather). The Lewis County Fiscal Court will be giving away oak trees (Willow Oak, a variety of Red Oak) AND Paw Paw trees (while they last; only 12 trees were acquired and as they require a pollinator, only 6 persons will be able to obtain Paw Paw trees) at the County Judge's Office at the Lewis County Courthouse the week ending April 1st (April 1st is a Friday). In addition, the Tollesboro Lions Club will be offering 100 oak trees as well, also available to pick up at the Judge's office in the Lewis County Courthouse (this means that 200 oak trees will be available as well as 12 Paw Paw trees). These will be 2-year-old trees ready to transplant.

NOTE: Any trees not claimed/left over from the County Judge's office, will be made available for pickup at the Tollesboro Lions Club Meet The Candidates/Fish Fry/Cake Auction Event, Saturday, April 2nd.

The oak trees were provided and delivered by Michael Carter, Lewis County Forest Ranger through the Northeast Region Division of Forestry. Tree planting is a project recommended by the Lewis County Judge/Fiscal Court and by Lions Club International's Initiative to Improve The Environment. Lewis County Judge Executive Craig Stanfield (who is also the current President of the Tollesboro Lions Club) made arrangements through Michael Carter of the Division of Forestry to provide these trees free to the public. The Paw Paw trees were provided by Kentucky State University of Frankfort and were picked up by the County Judge who met Sheri Crabtree, Sheri Crabtree, MSc, Horticulture Research and Extension Associate Academic Affairs, Kentucky State University College of Agriculture.

NOTE: The Paw Paw trees have proven to be extremely popular with all 12 of the Paw Paw trees claimed by persons calling in to Judge Stanfield, going to 6 individuals prior to Judge Stanfield's return from Frankfort with the trees!!!

While trees provide natural beauty to the areas in which they are planted, it is not just their inherent beauty that improves the environment. Oaks produce acorns, one of the most beneficial nuts for providing energy to deer, squirrels, and other wildlife, especially during the winter months. Oaks become large trees (each can grow in excess of 50 feet in height, with the Willow Oak capable of reaching heights greater than 100 feet) that provide shady canopies in which many birds nest and as necessary to the survival of many other plants and animals. The shade created by trees also acts to cool the earth, providing an important defense against global warming. And of course, once trees mature, they sometimes become homes for different wildlife and also produce timber which we use for a variety of purposes (fuel, building materials, furniture, manufacture of paper, etc. Willow Oaks - as well as other varieties of oaks - are hardwood trees, with lumber well suited to a variety of uses). However, the most important benefit to the environment is that trees act to

clean air, taking in carbon dioxide from the air that we exhale and converting it through the process of photosynthesis to oxygen which we inhale.

Quercus phellos (Willow Oak) Beech Family (Fagaceae)

Introduction:

Willow oak is a member of the red oak group with willow-shaped leaves. The fine foliage of the willow oak is one of its best ornamental features. The willow oak has excellent texture, rounded form, attractive bark, and beautiful winter features (fine-texture, persistent leaves and twiggy form).

Culture:

The willow oak is an excellent choice as a shade tree. It thrives in moist, well-drained, acidic soil and full sun. The willow oak will tolerate pollution and drought and is considered a trouble-free tree as long as soil pH is acidic. Willow oak has a fibrous root system and is therefore easy to transplant. It has no serious disease or insect problems. As little as 1 inch of fill soil can kill an oak.

Additional comments:

Willow oak is an excellent large shade tree. Its fine texture contrasts with the coarseness of most other red oaks. It is one of the best oaks for avenue plantings or large residences. Willow oak is a fast-growing oak that transplants easily and is tolerant of a wide range of growing conditions.

Willow oak is a member of the red oak group without lobed leaves. Its acorn matures in two years. With age, the willow oak becomes a stately tree. It is a superior choice where space permits a large oak tree.

Willow oak's common name comes from the shape of the leaves and its specific epithet, *phellos*, is the ancient Greek name for the cork oak, *Quercus suber*.

Co-national champion willow oaks are in Memphis, Tenn., (123 feet tall, 100-foot spread) and Noxubee County, Miss. (73 feet tall, 132-foot spread).



Botanical Characteristics:

Native habitat: Southeastern USA in alluvial soils, swamps.

Growth habit: Unique among the oaks, the willow oak has a rounded habit.

Tree size: Growing fast for an oak, it can reach 70' in height and equal width.

Flower and fruit: Female flowers are inconspicuous; however the pendulous male catkins look like a cloud of green smoke. The small, 1/2 inch acorn is topped by a shallow cup.

Leaf: The long, pendulous, narrow leaves of this willow-type oak are light green and glossy above and dull below. The leaf is tipped by a bristle. Fall color varies from yellow to red but is not showy.

Hardiness: Winter hardy to USDA zone 5.

Asimina triloba (Pawpaw) Custard Apple Family (Annonaceae)

Introduction:

Pawpaw, found from New York to Florida and west to Texas, has a semi-tropical appearance and is known for its fruit, the largest berry (up to 5 inches long) produced by any tree native to the United States. The fruit is nutritious and has been used in cancer therapy. Its twigs and bark contain a natural insecticide.

Culture:

Pawpaw prefers fertile, moist soil that is slightly acidic, and will sometimes tolerate wet soil. It can be grown in sun or shade, exhibiting dense growth in sun and open growth in shade. Pawpaw grows quickly if mulched and watered during droughts; it is drought-sensitive when grown in sun. Seedlings should be planted in shade for the first year as they are sensitive to ultraviolet light.

Pawpaw is pest-free and hardy in zones 5 through 8. It can be trained to grow with multiple trunks and its limbs are break-resistant. Some pruning is needed to create clearance because of drooping branches. Mowing or pruning the suckers that emerge from the root system encourages sprouting, so they should be hand-pulled while still small.

Cultivars:

There are at least 45 cultivars of pawpaw selected for their fruit characteristics. The national germplasm repository for pawpaw is at Kentucky State University in Frankfort, KY. Selected cultivars include:

'Convis' - Large (up to 1 pound) fruits with yellow flesh. 'Davis' - An older, popular plant from Michigan introduced in 1961. The fruit are less than ½-pound with yellow flesh. 'Overleese' - Heavy producing plant with clusters of 1-pound fruits. Selected in Indiana.

'Sunflower' - Produces 8-ounce fruit with a butter-yellow flesh. Said to be self-fertile. Selected in Kansas.

'Wells' - This cultivar has fruit with green skin and orange flesh. Fruit are a little less than a pound. Collected in Indiana.



Botanical Characteristics:

Native habitat: Northern Florida to Western New York, northern shores of Lake Ontario, Southern Michigan to Southwestern Iowa, and west to Southeastern Nebraska, and eastern parts of Kansas, Oklahoma and Texas.

Growth habit: Round, upright pyramid, with moderate density and coarse texture.

Tree size: 15 to 20 feet tall, 15 to 20 feet wide; can grow to 30 to 40 feet tall in ideal locations. Growth rate is moderate.

Flower and fruit: Flowers are nearly 2 inches across, pale green before turning brown, then maroon or purple. Pawpaw blooms in spring before leafout. Fruit is a 3- to 5-inch-long berry that is green when young then becomes dark and wrinkled when ripe in October or November. Ripe fruit has a flesh like custard and tastes a lot like bananas.

Leaf: Alternate, simple, 4 to 10 in+ches long and 4 to 6 inches wide. Light green, turning yellow in fall.

Hardiness: Winter hardy to USDA Zone 5.

Asimina triloba (Pawpaw) Custard Apple Family (Annonaceae) Page 2

Additional information:

There has been great demand for pawpaw recently, not only because of its appealing ornamental characteristics and tasty fruit, but also because of its potential as a source of organic insecticide and for use in cancer therapy. An insecticide can be made from the tree's ground-up bark and twigs. Extract from pawpaw can overcome the ability of some cancer cells to reject chemotherapy.

On dormant stems, pointed buds are vegetative while flower buds are round and fuzzy.

Cross-pollination is needed to get good fruit set in pawpaw. Pawpaw fruit develops in clusters. Fruit with orange flesh is considered the tastiest.

The fruit attracts wildlife (especially raccoons, opossums, gray squirrels and birds). It also attracts the beautiful zebra swallowtail butterfly, giving added incentive for wildlife lovers to obtain the tree. It is an excellent source of vitamins A and C, and is high in unsaturated fats, proteins and carbohydrates. Pawpaws contain more potassium, phosphorus, magnesium and sulfur than apples, grapes or peaches.

The first reference to pawpaw came in writings of Hernando DeSoto's expedition to the Mississippi Valley in 1541. The fruit, a favorite food of American Indians, was used to feed DeSoto's conquistadors. Early North American settlers used the fruit to make jelly, and the tree's inner bark to string fish. Indians in Louisiana used the inner bark to weave a fiber cloth.

Although pawpaw is in great demand, it does have a disadvantage. Its fruit and foliage produce a great deal of litter. Planting only one tree can help alleviate the problem, as lack of cross-pollination leads to production of less fruit. Because they are broader at the tip than at the base the leaves droop, giving pawpaw a "sleepy" or tropical appearance. The genus Asimina includes the only temperate members of this family.

The tree, which is hard to transplant because of its wide root system, should be balled-and-burlapped and moved when it is less than 6 feet tall

Family and other involved persons were successful in obtaining donations and sponsorships so that guaranteed payouts for each class could be provided, ultimately permitting the addition of two additional classes (MRA Super Stock Class and a Side-By-Side Class). In addition to the event, gate, and food sales, there were a number of raffles conducted as well.

Classes held included the MRA Super Stock, Pro Street, Hot Stock, Pure Stock, 4/6 Cylinder, and County Only. There were 46 entries in the various classes, and drivers came from West Virginia, Indiana, and Michigan (as well as Kentucky and Ohio) showed up to compete.

While rains and cold weather hampered the crowd participation (and likely impacted the number of competitors as well), the event was successful in raising nearly \$8,000 for the Forman Family.

Stanfield, who is also the President of the Tollesboro Lions Club, made arrangements for 200 oak trees (100 on behalf of the Tollesboro Lions Club and 100 on behalf of the Lewis County Judge Executive's Office) through Michael Carter, Lewis County Forest Ranger through the Northeast Region Division of Forestry, to giveaway to the public for transplant throughout the county. Due to specific requests, Craig also made arrangements for the provision of 12 Paw Paw trees through Sheri Crabtree, MSc, Horticulture Research and Extension Associate Academic Affairs, Kentucky State University College of Agriculture. All of the trees were 2-year old trees ready to transplant. The trees were well-received by the public, with many persons taking advantage by stopping by the Judge's office to pick up the trees, some of which exceeded 4 feet in height and with many having guite large/advanced root systems.

Tree planting is a project recommended by the Lewis County Judge Executive and the Lewis County Fiscal Court --- as well as by the Tollesboro Lions Club and Lions Club International's Initiative to Improve The Environment, for just that very purpose: Improving the Environment.

The oak trees were Willow Oak (a variety of Red Oak), a hardwood capable of reaching heights greater than 100 feet.

Paw Paw trees, while considerably smaller in stature, produce a wonderful fruit, the largest edible fruit indigenous to the United States (excluding gourds), with a flavor described as resembling that of a sweet banana custard; it can be eaten raw, or processed into jam/jelly or even ice cream and other desserts. Paw Paw trees require a pollinator so as to produce fruit; therefore only 6 persons received Paw Paw trees. Surprisingly, the Paw Paw trees proved to be extremely popular with all 12 of the Paw Paw trees claimed by persons calling in to Judge Stanfield, going to 6 individuals prior even to Judge Stanfield's return from Frankfort with the trees!!!

While trees provide natural beauty to the areas in which they are planted, it is not just their inherent beauty that improves the environment. Trees provide shade canopies in which birds nest, and are necessary to the survival of many plants and animals. Flowering trees provide nectar for bees to produce honey; fruit and nut trees provide food sources utilized for human consumption as well as for deer, squirrels and other wildlife; and the bark of trees can provide for homes for insects which in turn become food sources for other animals (such as the woodpecker). Further, the shade created by trees acts to cool the earth, an important defense against global warming. Once trees mature, some varieties produce timber which we use for a variety of purposes (fuel, building materials,

furniture, manufacture of paper, etc.). However the most important benefit to the environment is that trees act to clean air, taking in carbon dioxide from the air that we exhale and converting it through the process of photosynthesis to oxygen which we inhale.

County Judge Executive Craig Stanfield offers many thanks to Michael Carter, Lewis County Forest Ranger through the Northeast Region Division of Forestry and Sheri Crabtree, MSc, Horticulture Research and Extension Associate Academic Affairs, Kentucky State University College of Agriculture for providing the trees and also extends his thanks to the citizens of Lewis County for their assistance in improving the environment and making this project an overwhelming success!!!

It should be noted that Lewis County Coroner Tony Gaydos was in attendance but chose not to speak, and unopposed candidate for Jailer Bryon Walker was present early but had to leave before the Meet the Candidates event began.

Next, all 6 candidates for Lewis County Judge Executive were introduced and addressed the attendees. The candidates for Lewis County Judge Executive included 5 candidates for the May Primary and one candidate for the General Election in November. The candidates for Lewis County Judge Executive included: George Sparks, Tony Palarie, Carey Highfield, David Iery, Steve Applegate and Craig Stanfield.

Next, the two candidates for Lewis County Court Clerk were introduced and addressed those in attendance. The candidates for Lewis County Court Clerk were (appointed County Clerk) Stephanie Story and Leslie Collier.

Next, the three candidates for Magistrate District 1 (which includes Tollesboro, the site of the event) were introduced. The candidates for Lewis County Magistrate District 1 include (incumbent) Terri Thomas, Johnny Osborne, and Mike Grayson who each took an opportunity to appeal for votes.

Next, Cindy Applegate, one of two candidates for Magistrate District 2 was introduced and she took the opportunity to appeal to those members of the crowd eligible to vote for her to consider electing her to the position.

It was mentioned that the Maysville Community and Technical Center (MCTC) Nursing Program has qualified for a grant to permit the College to provide transportation services to and from homes within the area to an authorized provider of Covid-19 vaccines for vaccinations and/or boosters.

Lion Larry Tucker then informed the group that he had been in touch with Treasurer Steve Pedersen as a representative of Woodmen Life and that Woodmen Life Chapter 890 would contribute to the cost of feeding Special Needs individuals during the Annual Tollesboro Llons Club Fair's Event whereby Special Needs individuals would be permitted an opportunity to ride rides free of charge during Thursday afternoon prior to the Fair's opening that evening. This event has been a success with Special Needs individuals being able to participate in the fair without the overwhelming crowds that exist during the evening, with the Club providing lunch for those individuals.

The <u>VANCEBURG LIONS CLUB</u> hosted a <u>MEET THE CANDIDATES EVENT & CAKE AUCTION</u> on Friday, May 6th at the Black Oak Volunteer Fire Department (originally scheduled for the Veterans Park in downtown Vanceburg, relocated due to heavy rains and inclement weather. The Event had a great turnout with 16 candidates for office (and one State Representative) present.

Craig Stanfield, the President of the Tollesboro Lions Club (and Lewis County Judge Executive) acted as the master of ceremonies, introducing the candidates who were in the audience who were then permitted to speak to the crowd for up to 5 minutes each. It should be noted that no candidate used the entire 5 minutes and actually none had to be given a one-minute warning although several approached a 4 minute time mark. Craig Stanfield then acted as auctioneer, with his wife Beverly clerking the auction and collecting the funds from the sale of cakes, pies and other desserts.

First, Craig introduced the candidates for US Senate. Tami L. Stainfield and Joshua Wesley Blanton, Sr. were present and spoke to the crowd as to why each had chosen to run for office.

Next, Craig introduced the candidates for Lewis County Judge Executive. All six candidates for the position were present. Cards were drawn and candidates spoke in the order of the draw. Lewis County Judge Executive, the Master of Ceremonies and the Auctioneer, drew the first position and spoke to the crowd. Next, Steve Applegate addressed the assembly. He was followed by Carey Highfield, then David lery, Tony Palarie, and George Sparks, who each addressed those gathered to listen.

State Representative Patrick Flannery was then introduced to the crowd; he welcomed the opportunity to introduce himself to the citizens of Lewis County and invite all to feel free to contact him at any time with concerns. Representative Flannery only recently had Lewis County added to his constituency due to redistricting.

Following the candidates for County Judge Executive, the candidates for County Clerk were called up and drew for positions. They outline their qualifications and proposed changes, with Leslie Collier the first to speak, followed by County Clerk Stephanie Story, both of whom addressed the crowd.

Next the Magisterial Candidates were introduced. No candidates appeared from Magisterial District # 1. Both candidates for Magistrate District 2 were present, with Joey McCann addressing the crowd followed by Cindy Applegate. These two are both on good terms and friendly and had fun making their appeals to the group.

Magistrate Woody Underwood is unopposed and was not present at the event. Three of the four candidates for Magistrate District 4 were present. Magistrate Chuck Swearingen drew post position and spoke first discussing what he had accomplished during his term, followed by Mitchell Wilson and then Mark A. Horsley who provided their qualifications and desires to improve the county.

No candidates for Constable chose to speak, although Mark A. Riley had been present early in the event.

Next began the auction of the cakes and desserts, the monies spent going to the Vanceburg Lions Club, the host of the event.

During the cake auction, most of the candidates were successful in purchasing at least one dessert. Between the auction of cakes and desserts, candidates on the ballot who were unopposed were invited to address the crowd. Lewis County Attorney Benjamin Harrison first spoke, informing those assembled of his plan to make the Fiscal Court more transparent and user friendly, with proposed improvements to the courtroom to permit improved sound, video, and online viewing of Fiscal Court meetings. Sheriff Johnny Bivens spoke about how the Sheriff's office had improved and expanded since he first took office. Property Valuation Administrator Kenny Ruckel spoke to the crowd about his duties and how assessments were established. Coroner Tony Gaydos briefly addressed the group, informing of the increased deaths due to the Covid-19 Pandemic as well as drug overdoses.

NOTE: Tollesboro Lions Club members offered their support of the Vanceburg Lions Club in organizing this event. Tollesboro Lions Club President Craig Stanfield contacted the Vanceburg Lions Club and encouraged them to setup the event (his statement "this opportunity only comes around every 4 years and it's basically freemoney" with "very little labor (other than a few people to take the desserts to the purchaser, and of course an appeal to have desserts prepared for the auction)", created, sponsored, addressed, and mailed out the postcards that were sent prior to the event to ALL of the candidates and elected officials, acted as Master of Ceremonies and organized the Meet the Candidates portion of the Event, acted as Auctioneer at the event (his wife, Beverly, clerked the auction and collected the sale proceeds), and then purchased a dessert which he then donated back to the event. Tollesboro Lions Club Treasurer (and 2nd Vice District Governor) Steve Pedersen purchased a \$100 pie from the auction which he then donated back and it sold again for \$100, thus contributing \$200 to the finances of the Vanceburg Lions Club!). The Vanceburg Lions Club earned \$1600+ from the auction!



FUND-RAISER PLANNED FOR ILL 8 YEAR OLD



After reporting this information to Steve, Steve sent out a mass email to members of the Club to inform them of the project and the cost to put the project into play and to see their level of support.

As a majority of Club members responded affirmatively (with none responding in opposition), Craig picked up the flags and delivered them to the Tollesboro Lions Club Clubhouse, where they will soon be picked up and placed through town, in time for Independence Day and in advance of the Tollesboro Lions Club Fair (and particularly in advance of the annual Tollesboro Lions Club Fair Parade).

UPDATE: A total of 61 US flags were purchased by the Tollesboro Lions Club and placed througout the town along the Parade Route and upon the grounds of the Tollesboro Community Park. They were placed prior to Independence Day and will remain through the Fair and Parade (the Parade is July 17th; the Fair will run July 15th through 23rd). Lions Club Second Vice President Lee Thomas provided and operated the lift used to install the flags; President Craig A. Stanfield and member Charles Kendall installed the flags. Lee, Charlie, and Craig, assisted by Lion Daymond Thomas, Lee Thomas' girlfriend Robin Barker and her daughter Taylor Patrick, and Craig's wife Beverly put the flags together. Installation occurred over three evenings (39 flags the first evening, 7 the second evening, and 15 the third evening). The total cost of the flags was \$800.

Upon arrival, a meal was prepared and ready, open to the public, for donations only, consisting of pork tenderloin, hotdogs, chips, baked beans, coleslaw, and desserts. At 6 pm., Johnny Byard led the group in prayer, and read an update from the Poe's (who could not be in attendance as Raylen was undergoing treatment) to update the crowd on Raylen's condition. Craig Stanfield then began conducting the live auction, which included many nice items donated by local supporters and businesses.

The event was an overwhelming success, raising over \$19,000 for the Poe Family.





TOLLESBORO LIONS CLUB JULY MEETING

The Tollesboro Lions Club hosted it's regularly scheduled second July meeting Monday, July 25th. The meeting was opened by President Craig Stanfield who asked Lion Secretary Phil Cropper to offer blessing, followed by Lion Charlie Kendall leading the group in the Pledge of Allegiance. The group then broke for a wonderful dinner prepared by Skeeter and Sonya Shaw.

Following dinner, the minutes from the last meeting were presented by Secretary Phil Cropper and the Financial Report (excluding the Fair) was provided by Treasurer Steve Pedersen. Steve reported that he would provide a report on the Tollesboro Lions Club Fair at the next meeting, but he did report the gate information to the Club, with this year's fair experiencing a wave of attendance that has only been exceeded by last year's event (with both year's having great weather, but with last year's event blessed by the first crowd gatherings since the Covid Pandemic with people coming in droves last year and with each night last year setting record attendance numbers). Next, two new members were approved to join the Club, and two recently admitted members were in attendance.

Under Old Business, the gates for the playground were discussed as were the concrete vehicle parking curbs which were approved for purchase previously. The gates were ordered and should arrive and be installed soon; the curbing will be acquired and placed soon as well.

It was mentioned that a short work night would progress following the meeting in order to put away chairs, tables and picnic benches utilized during the fair. It was also discussed that the Club needed to take down the flags placed throughout town and store them for next year.

Under new business, a motion was made to make a donation to the Amish School in appreciation for the Amish Volunteers who donated their time to park cars 4 nights during the Fair. Also, due to the increases in costs of food and as the Club has added several new members lately, a motion was made to increase the price paid for food at the monthly meetings by \$25; this motion was seconded and passed.

As improvements were being made to the grounds to increase electrical services (this would have been completed prior to the beginning of the Fair, but had to be scaled back as some electrical components needed could not be obtained due to materials shortages), it was suggested that a 2 inch waterline be extended in a trench that was going to be dug; a motion was made and seconded to proceed with the 2 inch waterline to provide for future growth. As a practical matter, a parking plan was discussed to be implemented before next year's fair, a fluid plan that could be altered to consider the events being held and the placement of the event on the grounds. It was also discussed to work with the Department of Transportation to provide signage along the "AA" Hwy during Fair Week to inform the public to expect slow-downs and delays, as well as the possibility of changing Lions Club Lane to a one-way (northbound) thoroughfare during Fair Week. A Command Post was discussed (again; this was brought up a few years ago but has not been implemented to date) whereby a central location could be utilized for First Aid, Lost and Found, and other uses. It was suggested that perhaps an Amish-built building could be utilized, electrified, plumbed, and provided with heat and air conditioning for such use.

It was also suggested that a newspaper article be prepared and submitted to

local papers thanking the public, our sponsors, concessionaires, volunteers, and attendees for their support of the Tollesboro Lions Club and the Tollesboro Lions Club Fair. The president, Craig Stanfield, who is also the marketing communications chairperson and the writer of most of the Club's press releases, offered to prepare such an article and provide to local papers for publication.

Being no further business, and as the members were encouraged to assist in a short work night following the meeting in order to put up tables, chairs, picnic tables, gather traffic cones, etc., the meeting adjourned.

The Tollesboro Lions Club held their regularly scheduled first meeting in August on Monday the 8th with 21 members and guests present. The meeting opened with Club President Craig Stanfield leading the group in Prayer, followed by the Pledge of Allegiance led by member Charlie Kendall. The group then broke to have dinner. After supper, Secretary Phil Cropper presented the Minutes from the last meeting which were approved as read. Treasurer Steve Pedersen did not have a Treasurer's report to present, however did inform the Club that the monies that the Club had borrowed from Buffalo Trace (when the Club acquired the last tract of land and when it was necessary to borrow some monies to complete the Playground Project) had been paid in full, and that the lease payment (for the tract of land extending the grounds to the AA Hwy) had been paid.

The only item of Old Business was that the flags placed through town prior to the Independence Day and the Fair were going to be taken down following the meeting and stored for use next year.

NOTE: Following the meeting, 60 of 61 flags that had been purchased and hung were recovered and stored for next year (the mount for one flag had broken apparently during some of the recent windy weather and that flag and pole was not recovered). The flags were taken down by Lion Lee Thomas who operated his lift, with Craig Stanfield riding in the basket to remove the flags from their mounts, with Charlie Kendall following behind in an Emergency Vehicle from the Fire Department to slow down traffic. The Club would like to offer a Special Thank You!!! to Lee for providing the lift to install and remove the flags as the Club could not have accomplished this without Lee and his equipment!!!

Under New Business, Lion T. J. Palmer made a motion requesting that the Club host an Oct 1st Mud Sling and a Oct 29th Demolition Derby, fully sponsored; this motion was seconded and approved.

Next, it was brought up that Hickory Grove Church had requested the use of grounds Labor Day (Monday) for a picnic and family event; their request was approved.

Lion Treasurer Steve Pedersen then informed the membership that a suggestion had been made for the Club to prepare and provide meals for Eastern Kentucky cleaning up from the devastating and unprecedented flooding that had occurred recently. It was suggested that the Club provide meals for 1,000 people, breakfast and dinner. The estimated costs were projected to be \$1,500 for breakfast and \$3,300 for dinner, for a total of \$4,800. It was mentioned that an individual had committed \$1,000 towards this project if the Club would provide \$3,800 towards the project. The Treasurer indicated that the Club had the monies available for the project, and made the motion to proceed, which was then seconded and passed unanimously.

Being no further business, the meeting adjourned.

TOLLESBORO LIONS CLUB EVENTFUL MEETING SEPTEMBER 12TH

The Tollesboro Lions Club met Monday, Sept. 12, 2022 at the Tollesboro Lions Club Clubhouse for their regularly scheduled first meeting in September. Thirteen members were present. The meeting was opened by Tollesboro Lions Club President Craig Stanfield who gave the invocation, followed by the Pledge of Allegiance led by Lion Charles Kendall. The group then broke for dinner before starting the business portion of the meeting.

The business portion of the meeting began with a reading of the record of the last session by Lions Club Secretary Phil Cropper. As President Stanfield, also the Communications and Marketing Chairman, was unable to attend the August 22nd meeting (August 22nd), the report from the last meeting follows: There were 12 members present, meeting was opened by Second Vice President Jim Meadows, prayer offered by Secretary Phil Cropper, the Pledge of Allegiance led by member Charles Kendall. The group then broke for dinner. The minutes from the August 8th meeting were read and approved. The first item reported was a report to the members about the Club's recent participation offering aid to persons in Eastern Kentucky recovering from the unprecedented recent flood disaster. The Tollesboro Lions Club contributed \$3,000 towards the cost of feeding those displaced by the flood waters as well as providing a number of members who volunteered to help and offer aid to the recovery efforts. The Tollesboro Lions Club was assisted in this venture with financial support, aid, and volunteerism being offered by members of the Tollesboro Christian Church and the Lewis County Farm Bureau (members from all three organizations participated not only financially to this project, but also in the preparation and distribution of meals). This group visited Hindman, Kentucky and set up tents, six 5' grills, and other equipment. They then cooked, prepared, and distributed 940 dinners in styrofoam clamshells with tenderloin sandwiches, mashed potatoes, green beans, corn, cookies, pop or water which were served to persons who drove-thru to pick up meals for themselves as well as for distribution to families in the region affected by the flooding (many of whom not only lost their homes and most if not all of their belongings, but with many losing their vehicles as well). The devastation witnessed just along the roadways was truly of unprecedented proportions. The second item of business from the August 22nd meeting was a motion to replace the old window air conditioning unit in the Clubhouse, which was seconded and approved. Being no further business, the meeting adjourned. The Secretary's report was approved as read.

Next, the Club heard the most recent financial report. The Club's financial outlook has never looked better following the 2022 Fair which provided the second largest attendance the Club had ever witnessed, beat only marginally by last year's fair (the 2021 Tollesboro Lions Club Fair met with a relative "perfect storm" effect: After the Covid Pandemic Restrictions which impacted 2020, 2021 had a crowd "eager to get out and about", coupled with extremely favorable weather, AND with a booming economy, created an atmosphere that resulted in the largest attendance the Fair had ever been able to attract), with 2022 --- while having good weather and with great attendance --- could not quite match.

Under old business, it was evident that the new air conditioning unit was purchased, installed, and working to cool the building.

Next, the Treasurer mentioned that the Club should now consider an improvement that President Stanfield had suggested earlier in the year for an fairgrounds improvement for the Club to consider, that being to place garage doors on the south side of the main Pavilion to permit the Pavilion to partially cut off the effects of weather (rain and wind) so as to make the Pavilion more suited to some of the events (such as the fund-raising auctions that the Club has held during the year to raise funds for persons suffering from the effects of Cancer and other diseases) as well as making the building more suited for some events during the fair. Lion Jim Meadows had contacted a company about installing garage doors on the south side of the building. The bid that he received was \$15,000, more than \$3,000 less than the bid that had been received from another company just a few months ago. Treasurer Pedersen made the motion to approve the bid and improvement project, which was promptly seconded, all discussion was favorable, and the motion passed unanimously. This will be the next great improvement that the Club makes to the ever-improving Fairground facilities.

Next, Lion Denny Hornback and Daymond Thomas reminded the members that the Club had approved placement of concrete parking curbs/bumpers to be placed in front of the Playground fence. Also, the gates had yet to be installed on the chain link fence at the Playground. Treasurer Steve Pedersen would work on getting the concrete curbing pieces to place in front of the Playground (the gates will have to be ordered and installed by someone else as the installer who built the chain link fence has taken on a new job and no longer has time to perform the fencing improvements; an installer has been contacted to schedule this improvement).

Next, the Trade Days over the past weekend was discussed, and overall considered a very successful event (albeit the weather was not predicted to be as balmy this past weekend as it had been in the Summer Trade Days and the Spring Trade Days which did impact the number of vendors and likely the crowds as well).

Next Treasurer Steve Pedersen, reported that the Club would provide another meal to those in Eastern Kentucky as it had already received donations to support such an event from Brown County Construction, Lion George Lohman, the Flemingsburg Lions Club, and the Tollesboro Christian Church. He made a motion that the Club offer to donate up to \$1,000 towards such an event as a contingency in case the donations were not quite enough to complete the event. The motion was promptly seconded and approved unanimously.

Next, Steve Pedersen, who is also Lion Vice District Governor, reported that Lions International had provided a grant in the amount of \$10,000 to aid Eastern Kentucky flood victims. He also reported that the Kentucky Lions Clubs and District 43-Y had donated \$30,000 additional aid to Eastern Kentucky Flood Victims (this DOES NOT include those donations made directly to the recovery efforts, such as the dinner that the Tollesboro Lions Club had contributed to recently). This past week Steve accompanied Lions from other parts of the state and made deliveries of goods (building materials, generators, water, etc) and \$12,000 in gift cards to Lions Clubs in Eastern Kentucky (Hindman, Pikeville, Neon, and Jackson), including appliances for the Church in which the Jackson Lions Club meets.

Next, Lion Lee Thomas went over the upcoming planned uses of the Fairgrounds of which he was aware:

On Thursday, September 15th, the Pavilion will be used for a 5th Graders Youth Day "Farm To Plate" Dinner event.

Friday evening, September 23rd, the Crosspointe Church will use the facilities from 5 to 9.

On September 26th, the Tollesboro Elementary will make use of the Pavillion. On October 1st, the Tollesboro Lions Club will host a Mud Sling.

On October 28th, a fund-raiser for the Tollesboro Elementary School, Auntie Ann's Pretzels, will set up on the Fairgrounds on the southwest corner, visible from the AA Hwy.

On October 29th, the Tollesboro Lions Club will host a Demolition Derby.

Next, it was announced that at the next meeting, all new members would be formally inducted into the Club. This year, the Tollesboro Lions Club has grown substantially, with 8 new members joining the organization. Members were encouraged to contact those new members not in attendance about the next meeting plans; members were also asked to bring their vests to allow the new members to "look the part" until sizes could be obtained and orders placed for the new members to have their own vests.

Finally, with no additional business to come before the Club, Lion President Craig Stanfield and Treasurer/Vice District Governor invited Lion member Clinton Applegate to come forward and he was surprised to be presented with the Lions Club International Melvin Jones Fellowship Award. This award is the highest award presented by Lions International. The Tollesboro Lions Club has 4 members who have received this recognition, plus presented the recognition recently to a non-member (for a total of 5 presentations, 4 of which occurred in 2022). Photos were taken presenting Clinton with the recognition, and a hearty round of applause was given to Clinton for all his contributions to the Club.

Being no further business, the meeting adjourned.

NOTE: An additional item of business conducted but not reflected in the "press release" as this is to be a surprise and not included in the newspaper or other publications. The Club unanimously voted to make a donation to Lions Club International in order to provide a Melvin Jones Fellowship to be presented to Lion Larry Tucker. Larry is our Club's longest current active member; has been a member for nearly 55 years (the 55th anniversary of joining the Club is fast approaching, Oct. 1st) and is very deserving of this acknowledgement!

TOLLESBORO LIONS CLUB PRESENTS CLINTON APPLEGATE WITH MELVIN JONES FELLOWSHIP

On Monday evening, September 13th, 2022, Tollesboro Lions Club member Clinton Applegate was honored by the Tollesboro Lions Club as a recipient of the Melvin Jones Fellowship, the highest honor that may be bestowed on a Lions Club member by Lions Club International. The Melvin Jones Fellowship is named after the founder of Lionism. As a surprise, the presentation was made to Clinton following the business portion of the regular meeting of the Club. Clinton was bestowed the honor in

appreciation of his service to the Tollesboro Lions Club, having served 5 terms as Lions Club President, the current Zone 43-Y chair (a position he has held for 3 terms), and having served several terms as Chairman or Co-Chair of the Tollesboro Lions Club Fair, Clinton has served with dignity the Tollesboro Lions Club for 32 years, during most of which he was instrumental in hosting the Tug Tractor pulls, both during the fair as well as fund-raisers held during the year. He also serves as a member of the Lewis County Livestock Boosters and is active in most of the agricultural show competitions during the Tollesboro Lions Club Fair. Clinton is only the fourth member of the Tollesboro Lions Club to receive this honor (the third member to be so honored this year), with the Club also having bestowed the honor on a non-member earlier this year; he is also the third Tollesboro Lions Club member to be the recipient of the Melvin Jones Fellowship as well as the Finis Davis Fellowship (the highest honor bestowed by the Kentucky Lions Eye Foundation, named for Kentucky's only International President, Finis Davis, who served as the President of Lions Club International in 1960-1961), all of whom obtained their dual Fellowships in 2022.

TOLLESBORO LIONS CLUB SITE OF FARM TO PLATE EVENT

The Lewis County Extension Service 4-H and Agriculture and Natural Resources programs conducted a Farm to Plate Program for all fifth graders in Lewis County. The program was designed to teach youth where their food comes from and was held at the Tollesboro Lions Club fairgrounds. It was sponsored by Lewis County Farm Bureau who paid for the meals and transportation for students to attend. Rip's Farm Center provided ice cream for everyone and farm equipment for the youth to see. The Kentucky Dairy Development Council provided milk for everyone that attended. Rip's also provided employees to teach youth about beef and field crops.

Other businesses and individuals that provide educational resources for the program were Greenup County Farm Bureau, Lewis County FFA, Ag-Pro of Flemingsburg, Rose Farm Supply, Montgomery Tractor Sales of Mt. Sterling, State Fire and Rescue Training District 9, Mike Setters, Sonia Cooper, and Diana Wilson. Greenup County Farm Bureau provided Gerdie the Milk Cow so youth could learn about milk and where it comes from. Ag-Pro of Flemingsburg provided a lawn mower and an employee to teach lawn mower safety. Rose Farm Supply provided a tractor and an employee to teach youth about tractor safety, and Montgomery Tractor Sales of Mt. Sterling provided a Utility Vehicle (UTV) for State Fire and Rescue Training District 9 to teach youth about UTV safety.

The Lewis County FFA program provided their Leadership Team to teach youth about lambs and goats, by-products from animals, and about dairy. Sonia Cooper brought her favorite pigs to teach the youth about the swine industry and pork products. Program Assistant Diana Wilson taught participants about chickens and poultry products.

The FFA officers also helped with setup, teaching, and cleanup. Lions Club member Mike Setters provided his cooking skills to grill hamburgers and hotdogs for everyone that attended the program. Setters was assisted in cooking with FFA advisor Tyler Clark in cooking hamburgers and hotdogs. 
Teachers and participants said they had a really good time and that they liked having the program at the fairgrounds.

TOLLESBORO LIONS CLUB RETURNS TO SERVE EASTERN KENTUCKY FLOOD VICTIMS

The Tollesboro Lions offered their support once again to feed those suffering in Eastern Kentucky after the devastating floods ravaged the area recently. On September 26th, a group of 32 persons, including members of the Tollesboro Lions Club, the Tollesboro Christian Church, Lewis County Farm Bureau, the Flemingsburg Lions Club and other individuals and organizations (including several youth) drove to Hindman, Kentucky to serve meals to those rebuilding their community. Most of the group had been present recently when they managed to serve approximately 945 persons; this trip, the group was able to feed 1,300 persons!

The Tollesboro Lions Club, the Tollesboro Christian Church, the Crosspointe Church of Tollesboro, the Lewis County Farm Bureau, the Flemingsburg Lions Club, and several individuals contributed funds towards this event, which provided meals to feed 1,300 persons. The meals included tenderloin sandwiches, potatoes, green beans, cookies, and drinks. The food and drinks cost approximately \$5,600!

While at Hindman, Tollesboro Lions Club member as well as Vice District Governor Steve Pedersen was able to make additional presentations of gift cards on behalf of District 43-Y Kentucky Lions Clubs also contributed \$7,000 to be distributed \$1,000 each to the Lions Clubs of Hindman, Jackson, Hazard, Neon Community, Pikeville, and Whitesburg, with \$1,000 provided to a Church group at Chavies (which did not have a Lions Club organization). The Tollesboro Christian Church added an additional \$1,000 in gift cards which were divided between the Neon Community Lions Club and the Church group in Chavies to aid in the rebuilding process.

Following this photo presentation, those present were shown photos of the group who went to Hindman, Knott County, Kentucky earlier that day where they fed 1,300 persons. The costs of the food used to feed those affected by the recent devastating floods was approximately \$5,600. The monies were provided by the Tollesboro Lions Club, the Tollesboro Christian Church, the Crosspointe Church of Tollesboro, the Flemingsburg Lions Club, the Lewis County Farmers Farm Bureau, and several individuals. Additional funds were made available to organizations within those communities most heavily impacted by the flood-waters.

Following these presentations, which were made by our guest Jennifer Meadows, the meeting began. Lion Secretary Phil Cropper read the minutes from the last meeting. No Treasurer's report was available. Under Old Business, Lion President Stanfield informed those present that the gates and fencing improvements proposed for the Playground had been arranged. The upcoming events (Oct. 1st Mud Sling and the October 29th Demolition Derby) were discussed, with members encouraged to help this weekend with gates/admission and event details. Zach Tully informed the group that he would bring his dozer to create the Mud Pit for the Mud Sling. Craig Stanfield, President of the Tollesboro Lions Club, conducted fund-raisers to aid the Vanceburg Lions Club and the Orangeburg Lions Club in October. He conducted a Meet the Candidate Event and Cake Auction Event Saturday, Oct. 8th. In addition to organizing the event (including designing and having postcards created to send to all the candidates, which he also addressed and mailed out), he acted as the Master of Ceremonies, a candidate for the position of Lewis County Judge Executive, the auctioneer (his wife Beverly clerked and cashiered the event) AND EVEN SANG THE NATIONAL ANTHEM (for the first time in public!). He purchased one of the desserts (as did his wife) to offer additional support. The event was successful in raising \$860 for the Vanceburg Lions Club!

Craig also conducted the auction of cakes and items donated from local businesses for the Orangeburg Lions Club at their Fall Festival, October 15th (Craig's wife Beverly also clerked this auction). This annual event has been conducted every year since 1989 by the Orangeburg Lions Club with the sole exceptions of 2020 and 2021 (which were canceled due to restrictions on gatherings due to the Covid-19 Pandemic); of these, all but one were conducted by Craig, this event scheduled on a date where Craig was out of town; even then, Craig had his crew of auctioneers conduct the auction event in his absence. The Fall Festival Auction is Orangeburg Lions Club largest annual fundraiser. This event raised over \$7,000 for the Orangeburg Lions Club (these monies included proceeds from both the auction and the dinner).

NOTE: While not a Lions Club, also on October 8th, Craig conducted a benefit auction for the Mt. Carmel Volunteer Fire Department of Fleming County. For those paying attention, that is 3 auctions where he conducted fund-raising events for 3 separate organizations in three counties in 2 weekends.

TOLLESBORO LIONS CLUB MEMBER HONORED WITH COMMUNITY LEADERSHIP AWARD

In an emotional presentation at the regularly scheduled meeting of the Buffalo Trace Area Development District (BTADD) October 18, 2022 that had both the recipient and the presenter on the verge of tears, Craig Stanfield presented the Community Leadership Award for Lewis County to Clinton Applegate of Tollesboro in recognition of his contributions to Lewis County and the Tollesboro community.

Clinton joined the Tollesboro Lions Club in 1990 thus serving this organization for 32 years. During which time he has served 5 consecutive terms as the Tollesboro Lions Club President, has served several terms as the Fair Chairman or Co-Chairman, and has served 3 terms as Zone Chairman. He has been involved with the Tug Tractor Pull, the Tollesboro Lions Club Fair Livestock Shows, and Lewis County Youth Livestock Boosters supporting youth showing livestock during the Germantown Fair Livestock Auction. In 2022, he was selected as the 2022 Tollesboro Lions Club Fair Parade Marshall, and has been recognized by the Tollesboro Lions Club as a Melvin Jones Fellow as well as a Finis Davis Fellow recipient. Clinton was honored earlier this summer with a Public Rally and auction event hosted by the Tollesboro Lions Club after a dire health diagnosis. Without appealing to businesses, but relying only on word of mouth, donations poured in resulting in a benefit auction that eclipsed prior benefits by nearly 2.5 times, as the public showed their support to Clinton in unanticipated and unprecedented fashion (two cakes selling for \$1,300 each and with desserts alone bringing in \$10,000 were just some of the highlights!!!)!

The Community Leadership Award is presented in recognition of a person's contributions and involvement in their county and community. Clinton now joins several other Tollesboro Lions Club members who have been recognized by the BTADD for their presence and their community involvement. The Community Leadership Award was presented to Tollesboro Lions Club member Steve Harris (posthumously) in 2013, and to Tollesboro Lions Club member Jim Meadows in 2019. In 2016, BTADD honored Tollesboro Lions Club member Craig Stanfield with the Regionalism Award (BTADD members are not eligible for the Community Leadership Award. However, the Regionalism Award is available to those members of the BTADD BOARD of Directors for "Outstanding Contribution And Dedication to the Buffalo Trace Region". Craig has served as a citizen member of the BTADD Board for 23 years including Board Chairman from 2014-2016 - and is currently serving his 24th yr. on the BTADD Board as the Lewis County Judge Executive. Coincidentally Craig was swornin as the current Vice Chair just prior to presenting Clinton with his award. Craig also served as a Citizen member of the Kentucky Council of Area Development Districts -KCADD - for 7 yrs., including a term as the 2019 Chairman).

NOTE: The reason that this was such an emotional presentation is that Craig and Clinton both joined the Tollesboro Lions Club at the same time, have both been heavily involved in the Tug Tractor Pulls since joining the Club, and together have served 13 terms as Club President. Craig also conducted the benefit auction for Clinton.

After dinner the business meeting began with Secretary Phil Cropper providing the minutes from the Oct. 24th meeting. Treasurer Steve Pedersen then provided a report of the Club's finances.

Following the Secretary and Treasurer reports, the recent (Oct. 29th) Demolition Derby was discussed. Over 250 persons attended to watch, with 32 entries spread out amongst three classes. Next, the Club was informed about the upcoming Tollesboro Lions Club Christmas Parade which will be Saturday, December 10th, with line-up at the Fairgrounds at 4 pm. with Parade to begin at 5 pm. This was followed by a discussion about the upcoming Lions Club Christmas Party which will be Monday, December 12th, at Caproni's in Maysville.

Treasurer Steve Pedersen, who is also the District 43-Y First Vice President, then discussed recent trips to Eastern Kentucky to assist those affected by the recent catastrophic flooding event. In all, this created 42 pallets of merchandise which was distributed to various locations in Eastern Kentucky with a 26' enclosed box truck with lift gate in three trips to seven locations in 3 days, traveling over 1500 miles in the process.

Next, the next trip to Hindman (Eastern Kentucky) to assist flood victims was discussed. The Lions Club will be assisting in putting together a Thanksgiving Meal with plans to serve 1,500 persons. This event has been fully funded by donations. Volunteers will gather at Rip's Farm Center at approximately 9 am. on Saturday, December 19th and 8:30 am on Sunday December 20th to begin preparations, load and prepare the dinner, then leave approximately 5:30 am on Monday, November 21st to make the trip to Hindman to serve dinner. As this trip is fully funded by donations, it was suggested that the Tollesboro Lions Club contribute funds towards acquiring coats to distribute. A motion was made and passed unanimously to contribute \$1,500 towards purchase of coats for Eastern Kentucky flood victims.

Next, a member reserved the use of the Lions Club Clubhouse for a Church event on December 11th. This was followed by the reading of a card from Dale Helphinstine of Maysville on behalf of Taryn Mains thanking the Club for the Special Needs Event during the fair (this had been provided to the Club immediately after the Fair and had not been presented before the Club previously).

Next, member Daymond Thomas was given a 10 year Membership Chevron. This was followed by members Zach Truesdell and Shane Wallingford being presented with new membership packets and their sponsors provided with Sponsorship pins (Shane Wallingford was sponsored by Steve Pedersen and Zach Truesdell was sponsored by T. J. Palmer).

Before adjourning, it was mentioned that there were several members of the Club who have had recent health issues; members that had been in recent contact with those members suffering health issues provided updates to the Club. The members were reminded to keep in mind those members in their thoughts and prayers, particularly as we approach the Thanksgiving and Christmas Season.

At the time of his passing, Larry was the Club's longest serving active member (since the Tollesboro Lions Club's chartering in 1954, only 4 members have served for 50+ years, with Larry's tenure in the organization only surpassed by two members: Charter member Mack Wright, who at the time of his passing in 2015, had been a member for 61 years; and Don McCann, who at the time of his passing in 2019, had been a member for 60 years. Charter member Elmo Gillespie was a member of the Tollesboro Lions Club for 50 years).

While a member of the Tollesboro Lions Club, Larry served at least two terms (there are a number of years where the record as to whom served as President is incomplete and it is entirely possible that he served an additional term/terms during this period) as President of the Tollesboro Lions Club (1969-1970 and 1976-1977). Larry was also named the Tollesboro Lions Club Outstanding Citizen of the Year in 1990.

Larry was a retired educator with the Lewis County School system, teaching English, serving as a guidance counselor and basketball coach. He also was well-known locally as a minister serving the Concord Christian Church for 44 years; served as the last Mayor of the City of Tollesboro, was a 50+ year member of the Tollesboro Volunteer Fire Department, and a long-time member/leader of the Woodmen Life Chapter 890.

Larry was a respected and vital member of the Tollesboro Lions Club, present at almost every meeting, a fixture at the gate collecting gate money throughout the fair each year, and a trusted advisor to the Club. He will be missed...

NOTE: The Tollesboro Lions Club had unanimously voted September 26th to make Larry Tucker a Melvin Jones Fellow; the award had been ordered but has not arrived and thus had not been presented to Larry prior to his passing. A posthumous presentation will be forthcoming.





The Following report was prepared by Steve Pedersen, Tollesboro Lions Club member and District 43-Y Vice Governor, and presented at the Tollesboro Lions Club Christmas Party. Steve was a very active participant in making deliveries and Tollesboro was made a drop-off point (Rip's Farm Center) for many items (coats, gloves, clothing, tents, heaters, generators, etc.) sent from Lions Clubs throughout the area for delivery to Eastern Kentucky for Flood Victim Relief. The Tollesboro Lions Club contributed financially to relief efforts in purchasing food items, coats, gloves, socks, etc. Tollesboro Lions Club members also made significant contributions to the relief efforts by providing staging areas (Rip's Farm Center owned by Jim Meadows, a Tollesboro Lions Club member; the Tollesboro Lions Club structures were also used for storing coats until deliveries could be arranged. The Tollesboro Lions Club contributed \$1,500 for purchase of coats which provided for nearly 100 coats for distribution to Eastern KY Flood Victims) for items to be unloaded, sorted, palletized, and then reloaded and ultimately transported and delivered to Eastern Kentucky for distribution to provide for those in need.
