PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



As the year 5766 draws to a close and the New Year approaches, I am asking, how do we make the old new? How do we approach parts of our lives that are important and meaningful, but perhaps have become routine and lost some of their meaning? I ponder this question because it arises in many areas of our lives: in our friendships, in our work, in our connection with Judaism, and yes even in our marriages. During Rosh Hashana, we pray hadesh yamenu k'kedem . Renew our days, make our lives real, engaging and meaningful. How do we do that as we enter a new year?

I do not pretend to have "the" answer. Yes, we rely on our spirituality and we pray. But simply saying the words without thinking about what they mean, and merely going through the motions without involving our hearts and minds, does not fulfill our obligation to pray according to the rabbis. The point is to be engaged, to be passionate. In a broader sense, we are to live life like we really mean it.

We have all had a friendship where we once felt really close and then felt as though we were just going though the motions. We still hung out and talked about this or that but didn't really talk about what's on our minds or share what's in our hearts. Getting excited about a new friendship is easy, but making a friendship last over time means investing our minds and our hearts in the relationship. Making a friendship last means we must accept the fact that sometimes there will be misunderstandings and disagreements. It's trusting that we can talk through problems and make ourselves vulnerable enough to open up. A major challenge to both friendship and love is our tendency to withdraw and simply go through the motions of friendship or love. To engage our relationships means that we commit to bringing energy, direction and honesty into the relationship, even though it feels easier to pretend things are fine. By doing this, the passion is renewed.

So my goal for the New Year is to find something that makes me excited and fully engages me, "with all my heart, with all my soul and with all my might." I am intent on taking parts of my life that feels routine and animate them with energy, so that other areas of my life will likewise be infused with passion. If we remember that our lives are supposed to be fun and full of passion, we can insure we do not miss the life we are meant to live. L'Shana Tova

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Excerpted from the Israeli press

Jerusalem, 31 July 2006

From Address by Prime Minister Ehud Olmert to the Mayors Conference

We are not willing to give up our right to a normal life - like any other nation, like any other society, anywhere.

Not everyone identifies with us. More than a few criticize us and express reservations with our battle. We seek neither conflict nor confrontation, but it is our right to tell all those who attack us: none of you would ever acquiesce to such murderous attacks against your citizens. I do not want to tell you what you would have done if you had been in our place.

I will only say that the State of Israel sanctifies the most fundamental moral values, which are carved in our ancient Jewish tradition - and in our blood which was spilled - and we do not need any nation or any country to teach us these principles. We do not pursue innocent civilians, we do not fight against the Lebanese people and we do not seek to topple their government. We are fighting against reckless terrorists, and we will not stop fighting them until we remove them from our border.

I wish to appeal to the citizens of Lebanon: Just when a new chapter began in your country, with new spirits of freedom and democracy, you were taken hostage by the Hizballah organization of murderers. This organization does not fight the war of the people of Lebanon. There is no cause for conflict between us and Lebanon. There is no territorial dispute and no ideological "abyss" between us. We and you need to want the same thing the right to a simple, quiet and safe life.

Citizens of Lebanon, we regret the pain caused to so many of you, the fact that you had to flee your homes and places of residence and the unintentional harm to innocents, but we do not apologize for it.

We want to coexist with you in calm and tranquility, and, with G-d's help, also in peace. But we will not give up - not even for a moment - our right to protect the State of Israel and defend our lives, and we will not apologize to those who dare to question Israel's right to exist.

The founder of the State of Israel, David Ben Gurion, said at the Temporary State Council in 1948: "while we have never despaired of the human conscience and never ceased - and will never cease - from demanding from the world what is rightfully ours, based on law and justice, we must always memorize to ourselves, day and night, that our existence - our freedom, our future - depend first and foremost on ourselves, our efforts, our abilities and our will".

Let me finish this reflection on the Crisis in the Middle East with the following opinion: I share with my Israeli friends the belief, that this war in Lebanon against terrorism is not over, we have to prepare ourselves for the next battle. Israel cannot fight this war alone, we need the help of the international community. Israel needs us, the Jewish Community in the Diaspora, especially America, to support her with strong lobbying,....... we need Israel for the survival of the Jewish people.

TASHLICH

A popular practice during the Rosh Hashana is holiday Tashlich ("casting off"). We walk to flowing water, such as a creek or river, on the afternoon of the first day and empty our pockets into the river, symbolically casting off our sins. Small pieces of bread are commonly put in the pocket to cast off. This practice is not discussed in the Bible, but is a long-standing custom. Tashlich is normally observed on the afternoon of the first day, before afternoon services.

YEDA The Crisis in the Middle East:

THE WAR AGAINST TERRORISM AND ITS THREAT TO EXTERMINATE ISRAEL



When the conflict between Israel and Lebanon broke out on July, when Hezbollah kidnapped our soldiers, we were sitting at my cousins home in New York watching Israeli TV News...... and we were very concerned for our family and friends that live in northern Israel. We made calls to Israel and talked to them every day. They were not afraid, they did not want to leave their homes in Haifa and vicinity. They were resolved to respond to the attacks by fighting back......

My childhood friends asked their parents, who live in Haifa (our hometown), to leave and go to Raanana (near Tel-Aviv) to stay with them. They refused and remained at their home, using the shelter for many days. It is the same shelter we were staying at as small children during the other Arab-Israeli wars. It is so sad that our parents and our children and grandchildren have to use these same shelters once again. We wanted so much to believe that a coexistence with the Arabs is possible, but we have no illusions now.

Another dear friend, a teacher from a northern town, kept sending me e-mails and articles, telling about reactions and feelings of other friends in Haifa. Let me share with you what a teacher at the Haifa University wrote:

"While I write this in the comfort of my apartment, I know full well that at this moment (I can hear the warplanes overhead) people are being blown to bits in Beirut in my name, and soldiers who could be my children are fighting

and dying to keep me safe from people who have been trying to kill me all week. I know that Hezbollah targets civilians (people just like me), and I know that our army does not -- but I also know that there is no such thing as a "surgically precise" airstrike.

My heart cries out to stop the death and pain in Lebanon, but I do not speak. Hezbollah started a war and could end it. Imagine what would happen if they said: "We are releasing the two kidnapped soldiers and stopping the Katyushas." Israel in a matter of minutes would suspend operations in Lebanon. Every Lebanese child killed by a Jewish bomb dies because Nasrallah refuses to make that announcement.

What would Israel do if Hezbollah disarmed? Stop the bombing and turn its back on Lebanon. What would Hezbollah do if we disarmed? I leave that to your imagination.

The Israeli view of the world has room for Lebanon, for Jordan, for Egypt, and even, for the majority of Israelis, for a free and independent Palestine. The Hezbollah, the Hamas, the Iranian view of the world has no room for Israel."

This war affected not only the people living in Israel, but all the Jewish people and the Jewish Communities all over the world. To me, watching those immages on TV showing the Hezbollah terrorists training for the killing of Israelis, is something quite scary. All this hatred they are teaching their children, how can we expect a peaceful coexistence? scary.

To listen to Israel's leaders in these difficult times makes me aware, again and again, of how courageous we, the Jewish people, are. And it makes me understand that as long as we stand united, we will continue to be strong.

Letter from an Israeli Citizen

Hi,

I wanted to share with you a letter from my brother Moshe, who lives in Haifa, with his family.

Feel free to share with your friends and loved ones.Hanan.

From the Haifa incident to the Qana incident: Every day (except for the recent days that I am locked in a shelter) on the way to work to the University, I drive by a particular bus station, a mile away from my home here in Haifa. It is a bus station turned into a sober minimalistic monument but still functioning as a bus stop: a stone wall with a plaque with 21 names inscribed, mostly children who were on the bus that was blown to pieces by the terrorist.

The bomber was Palestinian, the sponsors and planners were the Hibzollah (who are responsible for 70% of the terrorists bombings incoming from the Palestinian territories, over the last two years).

The children on the bus were from the Reali school, the same school that my kids now attend, among them Abigail, a gentle girl whose parents were Mormons, not Jews, her father was a visiting professor at the Haifa Univ. Why do I mention Abigail in particular? Personal acquaintance: this gentle soul happened to be my wife's student in her afternoon art therapy class.

I do not recall any outrage, a single demonstration anywhere in the world, at this hideous act committed by the Hizbollah....

Actually the two acts are similar, yet different. The similarity, that in both cases many people, most of them children, were killed. For kidloving people who don't care about context, that would have been enough reason to demonstrate in both cases. But that is where the similarity ends. It makes all the difference in the world - in the Haifa case the kids were mur-

dered. In the Qana case the kids were unintentionally killed. Israel did not target the kids in Qana, we never do, but Hizbollah did target our kids in Haifa, then and now, it always does.

Now, if those pious souls thousands of miles away from here, taking to the streets in outrage, people in other continents most of whom probably cannot even point where Israel is on the map, really cared about kids, should we have heard of them when the body parts of our kids were sprayed on the pavement and the walls of the homes across the bus station where the Hizbollah-launched human bomb mounted the bus? (And there was not just a single bus, but tens of buses like this in Israel, I just describe the one I pass by everyday).

Why is it that whenever we stand up to fight a monster who kills our civilians while hiding among its civilians and putting its own people at risk, while exercising our right for selfdefense we unintentionally happen to hit civilians, the Europeans gang up to stop us, to leave us helpless, exposed to the threat? Is this a World Warll European tradition?

Speaking of WWII, Benjamin Netanyahu gave an interview yesterday to a British network, in which he reminded them of a forgotten episode in their history: The Royal Airforce Pilots set out to bomb the Gestapo headquarters in Copenhagen. The bombs fell instead on the nearby Children's hospital. 83 Danish kids were killed...

Examples like this, of democracies unintentionally hitting civilians while fighting existential threats, abound. Want some recent ones? How about Nato in the Balkans repeatedly but unintentionally hitting bus-loads of innocents, many of them kids? No demonstrations against them. Examples of the other kind also abound, e.g. hundreds of Iraqi civilians includ-

ing many kids being wiped out almost daily by Islamic terrorists. No demonstrations against them.

Why is it that when the Israelis are involved in a tragic incident, directly caused by the terrorist enemy firing from a few tens of meters away from the house that was hit, right into our homes here in Northern Israel, aiming to kill every kid that hides in every home here throughout a third of my country, then the whole word takes to the streets, but not to denounce the terrorists for causing the outrage on both sides, but rather to tie up our hands behind our back? What have we done to you to deserve being weakened by you to the point where our justifiable right of self-defense is being stripped off? The words we hear are "stop the bloodshed" but the message is "shed your blood".

I say squarely - the weapon was an Israeli plane, the murderer of those kids in Qana is Hizbollah. The weapon was a Palestinian human bomb, the murderer of those kids in Haifa is Hizbollah. If you have any decency - whether you are European, American or Arab - take to the streets to denounce Hizbollah. Take to the streets to protest Qana denouncing the killer, Hizbollah.

Baked Corn

1 can creamed corn 1 can whole kernel corn

2 eggs 2 T milk

2 T very finely grated onion (or onion juice) salt & pepper as desired

8 - 10 crushed saltine crackers

For Top -

2 T butter 5 - 10 finely crushed crackers

Mix all ingredients except butter and pour into a buttered \square casserole dish. Put additional pieces of butter on top and sprinkle \square with additional cracker crumbs. Bake at 350° for 45 minutes until center puffs up.

Vegetarian Baked Beans

3 medium onions, chopped

1/3 c vinegar

1/3 c maple syrup

1/2 c brown sugar

1/3 c ketchup

1/2 c liquid smoke (optional)

15 oz. cans each of:

- white kidney beans

- green lima beans

- dark red kidney beans

- vegetarian baked beans

Cook onions in large frying pan. Add sugar, vinegar, ketchup, maple syrup and liquid smoke. Drain all beans (except baked beans). Mix beans together in large cooking pot or casserole dish. Add onion mixture. Bake at 325° for one hour.

Yes, you non-vegetarians can fry some meat with the onions. Cube the meat small, crumble it after cooking, leave out the liquid smoke.

Honorable "MENCH"ion

Many of us, while growing up, had the very good fortune to have parents and grandparents that seemed to embrace us, our friends, and life all around them. No one was turned away and there was a purpose for each of us no matter our background or place of birth. That ancestral practice seems to still be very much alive here in the Florida Keys.

When you consider that nearly every member of our congregation is from some place

else, it truly defines us as a melting pot of personalities from all corners of the globe. What makes the Keys Jewish Community Center (KJCC) so special is the camaraderie that exists almost immediately after first visit. We one's announce at every service that "You are a stranger only once; after that you are part of our mischpuka (family)". Each of us has our own indi-

As one enters the sanctuary facing the bema it is impossible not to notice the beautiful stained glass windows and panels that tell the many stories of the Torah. On sunny days these tiny panes of colored glass seem to come alive with the travels of our ancestors from their earliest existence through the many hardships endured to reach our present day accomplishments. Of special note are the windows above the arc that house our sacred scrolls. One depicts the burning bush representing the birthplace of those sacred teachings and the other, very appropriately, features a dove of peace and life from the waters that

have drawn many of us to this wonderful place.

To the left and right are the memorial plaques that eternalize those who have come before us to establish this house of worship and to keep their memories alive each time we gather to pray. During our Friday services we turn and face the entrance to welcome the Sabbath bride and view the magnificent Trees of Life that commemorate special occasions and life cycle events in the lives of our fellow members. At that same moment it is also awe inspiring to see the beautiful blue and white

stained glass Mogan David that brilliantly shines upon those on both sides of our front entrance.

The Ruth Richardson Social Hall (the original KJCC building) holds many more memories of delicious onegs and special celebrations in addition to being the focal point for a variety of meetings and the reli-

gious education of our children. And as we enter and exit the east entrance, one is greeted aromatically and visually by the newly established Dr. Ben and Helen Sherman Patio Garden.

For all of the above accomplishments and "gifts" that we have and with the knowledge that all of our ancestors before us are uniquely responsible for us coming together as a family, we can fully realize that our KJCC itself is a "Mensch" for all of us to embrace.

As we enter this New Year together, please take a moment to walk the grounds, the halls, and the aisles of this magnificent gift to our Jewish community here in the Keys and expand your chest with pride that you are a part of our mischpuka.
