

Members of both chapters visited St. William the Abbot elementary school in Seaford, NY and presented to children in grades 1-3. The children were very receptive to the emergency preparedness games and lessons presented. Each member of $O\Sigma\Sigma$ left the session with a complete sense of satisfaction and pride after spending time with the children.

Our goal is to bring Safety and Emergency Management lesson plans to many more elementary schools and to introduce these important topics to our younger generation. In September (FEMA's National Preparedness Month), the $O\Sigma\Sigma$ Chapter at Adelphi University hosted its annual "Preparedness Day" event in its University Center on campus, in collaboration with the Center for Health Innovation. While the preparedness program targeted mainly students, faculty, and staff, it also benefited the community as a whole. The Chapter offered a plethora of emergency management training tips such as advice on how to make a "go-bag," how to prepare families from a medical standpoint, and even how to prepare pets for disaster. They held several raffles, prizes of which included a solarpowered crank radio that can charge a USB for a cell phone, a two person "go-bag," and a AAA vehicle Ms. Meghan emergency bag. McPherson, Advisor of the $O\Sigma\Sigma$ Chapter and Coordinator of the graduate program in emergency management at Adelphi, explained how the honor society has impacted the students at her University. "For

us, being affiliated with $O\Sigma\Sigma$ has been really beneficial for students. It has become something they strive for."
