### MEMORIAL DAY CEREMONY ON 27 MAY

Virginia's Annual Memorial Day Ceremony will be held at the Virginia War Memorial on May 27 to honor all veterans who gave their lives to preserve American freedoms, from the Revolutionary War through today. ### **US NAVY FIGHTS RICHMOND FIRE**

Remember this? The Little Oil Company Tank Farm fire of 1975. Giant 500-foot flames and smoke were visible for miles around. I-95 was closed. Over 100 area firefighters fought the blaze, but were driven away. Military trucks from Fort Lee and Byrd Field brought chemical foam used to smother fires, but still the fire raged. The U.S. Navy sent trucks from Norfolk loaded with a mix of water and fire-retardant chemicals. The Navv also brought an experimental foamspraying tractor. The Little Oil Fire was a memorable event in Richmond history. to

### FIRST SHIPBOARD AIRCRAFT TAKE-OFF --- HAMPTON ROADS 1910

Have you ever heard of Chambers Field at Naval Station Norfolk? In 1910, Navy Captain Washington Irving Chambers and aviation pioneer Eugene Ely investigated the new phenomenon of aviation. Ely took off in a Glenn Curtiss plane from a temporary platform erected over the bow of the light cruiser USS BIRMINGHAM in Hampton Roads, then promptly landed on a beach rather than the Nor-

folk Navy Yard as planned.

Two months later, Ely flew from land to a platform on the armored cruiser USS PENNSYLVANIA in San Francisco Bay. This first shipboard landing was also the first ever using a tailhook system, designed and built by circus performer and aviator Hugh Robinson. An exhibit of retired naval aircraft at Naval Air Station Norfolk bears Ely's name, and a granite historical marker in Newport News overlooks the waters where Ely made his historic naval aviation first.

### USS ABRAHAM LINCOLN LEFT NORFOLK APRIL 1

ABE Anchors Aweigh. The USS ABRAHAM LINCOLN (CVN 72) bid farewell to Hampton Roads on 1 April to home port in San Diego. There are some recent interesting facts about Abe's "hard" and "soft" power. The carrier was the first in the Nimitz-class to become capable of accommodating the F-35C Lightning II. The ABRA-HAM LINCOLN hosted a film production crew in 2018 that was shooting footage for the sequel to the Hollywood blockbuster "Top Gun". The ABRAHAM LINCOLN was dispatched to the coast of Florida in 2017 to provide humanitarian relief in the wake of Hurricane Irma. Back home, over 700 sailors participated in the Read Across America Program for kids in grades K through 3. The original Abe read by candlelight in a log cabin. Times have changed. Z

rier Strike Group (HSTCSG). We are building and maintaining proficiency in operating together for the first time since we returned from deployment four months ago, participating in an integrated, comprehensive sustainment exercise designed to ensure HTCSG is ready to meet all mission requirements and carry out sustained combat operations from the sea, if required. We've pulled out all the stops and are conducting every exercise we could schedule in our limited time; from flight operations, maneuvering at speed in close proximity to the aircraft carrier, to precision gunnery exercises, we're doing it all.

Of note, NORMANDY has been away from homeport 239 of the last 365 days, returned from deployment right before Christmas, reset then immediately pivoted to be ready to excel at INSURV, despite limited maintenance opportunities. Bottom line: I am proud to call this TEAM of young men and women My Navy Family and would head arm-in-arm with them into the fight anywhere, any day, against any adversary.
