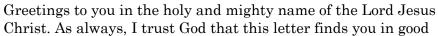

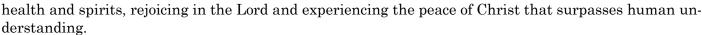

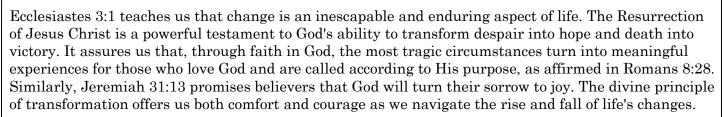
Pastor's Message

Two new elders and four new deacons were elected to facilitate the idea further, expanding the UPC Session to seven members from the previous five and increasing the UPC Board of Deacons from three to seven.

As we witness the transformative power of God through the Resurrection of Christ in the natural world, our own lives, and the lives of our congregation, we are called to embrace change. United has taken steps to reflect this growth by restructuring our committees and expanding our leadership, ensuring we continue serving effectively and faithfully. May we move forward with renewed vigor, inspired by the Holy Spirit, to fulfill God's purpose in every aspect of our lives. Let us hold fast to the promise of transformation, for it is through change that we find new opportunities to glorify God and serve one another in love.

National Arbor Day - April 26, 2024

Arbor Day is a secular day of observance in which individuals and groups are encouraged to plant trees.

Trees help to mitigate global warming and also promote health and well-being in urban areas





A FOCUS ON — THE FUTURE

While most holidays celebrate something that has already happened and is worth remembering, Arbor Day represents a hope for the future. The simple act of planting a tree represents a belief that the tree will grow to provide us with clean air and water, cooling shade, habitat for wildlife, healthier communities, and endless natural beauty — all for a better tomorrow.

Trees play a vital role in regulating climate and weather patterns by absorbing vast amounts of carbon dioxide (CO2). The United Nations (UN) estimates that forests contain around 50% more carbon than is present in the atmosphere.

When trees are cut down and forests are destroyed, the carbon they contain is released. This is a major contributor to global warming and the climate crisis. Deforestation accounts for more than 20% of global CO2 emissions, according to the UN.

What is Arbor Day? Around the world observances of the importance of growing trees have been taking place for centuries, with the first documented celebration taking place in Spain way back in 1594.

A tree planting celebration known as 'Arbor Day' first took place in the United States almost 300 years later. In 1872, an estimated one million trees were planted in Nebraska on its first Arbor Day. More than 45 states and territories were celebrating Arbor Day each year by 1920.

Today Arbor Day is a national holiday in all US states. It usually takes place on the last Friday in April but can vary to coincide with the best planting weather in different areas of the country.

The US-based Arbor Day Foundation has helped grow 500 million trees in the past 50 years.

April is recognized as National Stress Awareness Month....To bring attention to the negative impact of stress. Managing stress is an essential component of a healthy lifestyle. Stress can be debilitating, and it can cause and/or aggravate health problems.

Since stress is a normal part of human existence nobody is immune to it — it's important to arm ourselves with knowledge so that we recognize when stress rears its ugly head. (Amazingly, we don't always notice it's happening to us.)

It's important to learn some strategies for coping with this particular silent scourge.

- 1. Recognize and counter signs of stress. Signs include difficulty concentrating, headaches, cold hands, tight muscles, a nervous stomach, clenched teeth, feeling on edge, fidgety, irritable
- or withdrawn. Knowing how your body communicates can help you deal with stressful moments. Learn to not only recognize but also to name these feelings. Then, take action to counter their effects. For example, deep breathing, stretching, going for a walk, writing down your thoughts and taking quiet time to focus can help induce relaxation and reduce tension.
- 2. Take time for yourself. Make taking care of yourself a daily routine. It's not selfish or self-indulgent - and it might require saying "no" to requests or prioritizing yourself along with your responsibilities.
- 3. Try new routines. From scheduling bath and bedtimes to blocking off time to plan and prioritize tasks, additional structure can provide a daily framework that allows you to attune to your body's signals. Then, you can take steps to potentially manage stress earlier than you once did.
- 4. Stay connected and make new friends. Stay in touch with family, friends and groups in your life. Having or being a person to talk with can be reassuring and calming.

- 5. See problems through a different lens. View sitting in traffic or around the house as an opportunity to enjoy music, podcasts or pleasant views. Reduce anger in response to rude or aggressive behavior by imagining what might be happening in that person's life. Keeping situations in perspective is an important way to boost stress resilience.
- **6. Seek help with problems.** Many people experience the same day-to-day strains related to caregiving, relationships, health, work and money. Look to friends and family, as appropriate, or other trusted individuals or resources for tips and information.
- 7. Talk to a health professional if stress is affecting your

well-being, you feel you cannot manage the stress you're experiencing, or stress has caused you to engage in or ate care if stress is harming your relationships or ability to work.

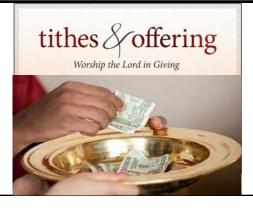

CHILDREN'S CORNER

Parents, please read this to your younger child(ren)

Seeing Is Believing

Theme: We believe in Jesus.

Object: A dollar bill, two paper clips, "Linking Paper Clips" How-to Video

Scripture: John 20:19-31

Today I am going to show you something that I'm not sure you'll believe. First I am going to take this dollar bill and fold it into thirds. Next, I will take one paper clip and clip the top section of the dollar to the middle sec-



tion. Now I will take the other paper clip and clip the bottom section to the middle section. Before I put the paper clips onto the bill, they were separate. But when I pull on the two ends of the dollar bill, they're going to jump off the bill and connect themselves. Do you believe me? (Pause.) Let's try it! (Pull the ends of the bills to make the paper clips jump off, then show kids that the paper clips became connected.)

I need you to help me tell what happened in the Bible. Whenever you hear the word "believe," please make this motion. (Mouth wide open and hands beside sides of face.)

That's cool, isn't it? Now that you have seen it, do you believe (Pause.) it? Sometimes we must see something before we believe (Pause.) it, don't we?

It was like that for some people in the Bible, too. On the evening of the first Sunday after Jesus had been crucified, His disciples were together in a locked room. They were afraid of those who had crucified Jesus. Suddenly, Jesus appeared there in the locked room with the disciples. It was hard to believe (Pause.), but they saw Him, and Jesus showed them His wounds in His hands and His side, so they knew it was Him.

One of the disciples, Thomas, was not with the others when Jesus appeared to them. When they told Thomas, he didn't believe (Pause.) them. He had seen Jesus crucified and buried. How could He be alive? Thomas said, "Unless I see the wound in His side and put my finger in the holes where the nails were in His hands, I will not believe (Pause.) it!"

A week later, the disciples were in the locked room again, and this time, Thomas was with them. Again, Jesus came and stood among the disciples. Jesus said to Thomas, "Put your finger here; see my hands. Reach out your hand and put it into my side. Stop doubting and believe (Pause.)."

Thomas fell on his knees and answered Jesus, "My Lord and my God!"

Jesus said to him, "Because you have seen me, you have believed (Pause.); blessed are those who have not seen and yet have believed (Pause.)."

You and I have never seen Jesus with our own eyes. The question is, will we be one of those who is blessed because we believe (Pause.), even though we have not seen?

Kids can stop making the believe motion now.

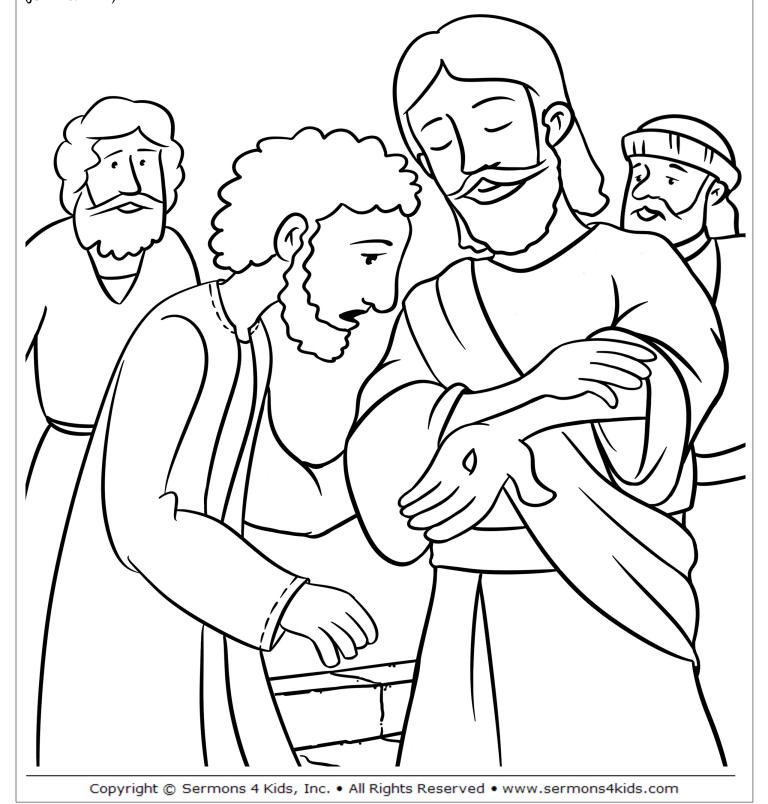

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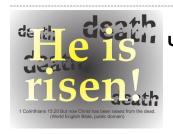
