**Anthony F. Comunale** passed away Monday, September 16, 2019 at home surrounded by family. Tony was born in Bangor, PA, the son of the late Frank and the late Mary Patti Comunale. We honor our deceased member who was always willing to serve with a smile, enthusiasm, energy and intelligence.

It is with great sadness, sincere respect and a tear in our eye that we must report the death of Tony Comunale. Although Tony was 90, his passing was mostly unexpected. Indeed, he just celebrated at his beloved Italian Center his 90<sup>th</sup>. Active, helpful, chipper - we thought he'd live forever. Hoped he would.

Tony loved to golf, loved to dance every Friday night at the Italian Center and enjoyed building furniture as a hobby.

Tony is survived by his daughters Dawn Cox and her husband Nicholas of Poughkeepsie, NY. Deborah J. Comunale and her wife Bonnie of Heartland, Texas, grandchildren Brian P. # The Riverbank Banjo Band

For 15 years, the Riverbank Banjo Band was a Monday Night staple at Umberto's Mamma Marissa in Poughkeepsie. That ended in late June, when Umberto's became a catering only business, closing down its restaurant on Route 9.

As the Band explores options for its new "residency", it has performed at the Italian Center on Monday nights from 7-9 PM with its last performance on Monday September  $30^{th}$ . Doors open at 6:00 pm with cover of \$10 for music only or \$20 for buffet dinner and music (plus tax and gratuity). Doors open at 6:00 pm. Of course, "Happy Hour" for members will already be in process.

Not familiar with the Riverbank Banjo Band? They play "mostly old-time favorites from the early-20<sup>th</sup> century, and mix in polka, jazz standards, sing-a-longs and a little bit of country and blues on occasion. The Band is truly

like a family with teen age children playing alon with their parents who have been members for years. Riverbank Banjo Band is celebrating its  $40^{th}$  year of music-making with members ranging in age from 10-85.


Established as a nonprofit organization, Riverbank Banjo Band has donated more than \$260,000 to local charities over the course of four decades. Nobody in the band is paid; all proceeds are returned to the community. As Standfordville resident Danielle Sundburg said, "Band members research charities in their local communities and they make donations to as many charities as they are able each November. "It's a real joy to be able to share our music with audiences, which is a thrill on its own, and then to be able to spread more joy



donating to organizations in need. We couldn't do it without audience support and we are thrilled about appearing at the Italian Center in Poughkeepsie on Monday September 30<sup>th</sup>."

# 85<sup>th</sup> Annual Progressive Ball – Saturday, October 26th

The late 1800's and early 1900's saw the growth of the Italian population in the Poughkeepsie/Dutchess County area. People left the confines of New York City for the openness of the country, where work was plentiful in the



construction trades, railroads and bridge building. Seeking a means of association with their fellow countrymen, and preservation of their culture, two organizations were formed in 1889, The "Star of Italy", and the "Prince of Piedmont" societies.

Through the years several of these Italian social organizations coexisted in the Poughkeepsie area, each with its own agenda. Under the leadership of Vincent DiGennaro, the two organizations were combined into one group with the all-inclusive name "La Casa Italiana", ie. The Italian Center. They incorporated in 1934 with the aim of promoting fraternity, equality, justice and to improve the moral, physical, and cultural well-being of its members. The former home of the Progressive Society Lodge #1130, located at 227 Mill Street, a property purchased from Anna Valentine in 1928, became the "Italian Center". Hence, our recognition of the founders' Progressive Society Lodge has endured as the Annual Progressive Ball.

Consistent with the purpose of our organization, a scholarship fund was started in 1960 by member Dr. Vincent A. Bacile. Each year, members and their children can qualify for a financial award. A committee reviews the academic and service qualifications of candidates and selects the individuals to whom scholarships are awarded. Awards have been made annually since 1971 and this year we are offering three scholarships of \$3,000 to qualified individuals. The continued support of the Bacile Scholarship fund is a testament to the value placed on education by the Italian Center.

Over the years we have expanded our community involvement, sponsoring Little League and Senior League teams, golf tournaments, and community events. Some of our members are or have been involved in local government. We are proud to have Marc Molinaro, Dutchess County Executive, as a current member of our organization; as we have constantly sought to be an important asset to our community and country.

This year **we honor two of our outstanding members: Vincent Corona and Giuseppe Giangrasso** – both of which are well known and appreciated members of the Club and the community. We are honored to have them as longtime members and humbly give them honor they richly deserve.

#### VINCENT CORONA

Vincent was born in Wappingers Falls to John and Emma Renzi Corona, who immigrated from a small city, Cave, in the province of Rome, Lazio. Vin visited Italy when he was sixteen and met for the first time his grandparents, many aunts, uncles and cousins. Through the years he has developed a great love for Italy, the language and things Italian.

Vin grew up in Wappingers Falls. His father died when he was three, leaving his mother with five children. From the age of twelve, Vin and his siblings helped their mother run a grocery store and bakery that was started by his father. The store was located on Fulton Street in Wappingers Falls.

After finishing high school, Vin was employed by IBM and attended Dutchess Community College at night. He worked for IBM for over 38 years and became a senior manager in accounting and finance.

He has been married to his wife, Barbara, for over 53 years. They have three children and three grandchildren and have been delighted in participating and watching the grandchildren grow up.

Since retirement, he and Barbara have taken many trips. Some of their favorite adventures have been rafting through the Grand Canyon, sailing around the Galapagos Islands and touring Machu Pichu in Peru. Vin has also taken each of his grandchildren on separate trips to Italy to tour the country and visit their ancestral hometown. Vin is an enthusiastic senior member of the Italian Center and has been a member for over 35 years. In Keeping with the Theme of October... Our Quest to Make it in America (Submitted by Tony Daniele)

Years ago – before the internet – when you had to actually go to a store – perhaps a specialty store - to get literature that would inform/delight you, I would take the train to NYC to shop at S. F. Vanni, a bookstore in Manhattan's "Little Italy". There you could buy real Italian books (about 16,000 old to new titles were available) with advice from a real expert on the subject!

Sure, the local Marlboro Library had many books in Italian and even later VHS films, but if you wanted to own something special/newer in Italian with advice Vanni's was the place to get it.

Today the internet makes it easy to get whatever and Vanni's per se closed in 2004. In 2015 it was reincarnated within the modern umbrella of Centro Primo Levi in NYC (http://primolevicenter.org/).



But I bring up Vanni's not to discuss Italian literature sources or wax nostalgic about past shopping trips. Rather because the Vanni story is a story about how our immigrant families helped each other to become great

in a strange and sometimes bigoted Country. This October perhaps we should reflect on our past hope, dreams, and struggles so we can appreciate the similar ones of others today.

Mr. Vanni was from a small town in Sicily. He had the ambition to sell Italian books in America, and in 1884 he opened S.F. Vanni on West Broadway. About two hundred thousand peasants were arriving from southern Italy, by and large illiterate, and having to convert from agricultural workers to factory and construction workers.

They were not the sort of people who wanted to buy books being mostly illiterate. But Vanni recognized a need – "his paesani" needed his help. Vanni created a book – a sort of Sicilian-Italian-English dictionary – a masterpiece! Not as a work of literature but rather a construction manual for mostly illiterate Southern Italian peasants!

It taught them to recognize/understand key words etc. while illustrating how to build a straight wall, lay a roof, or hang a gutter. This printed work helped these immigrants to gain employment, assimilate, and grow. He also sold postcards, calendars, almanacs they could understand. He became their scrivener, writing/reading their letters, insurance claims, legal agreements. People trusted him – he was understanding, fair and honest; he was a godsent.

Our paesani needed help from more fortunate people; they in turned helped others. This motivated the founding of The Italian Center! Something to reflect on; something to continue in our lives.


