Witnesses In A World of Confusion

What is a Christian to do in these days of confusion, excitement, doubt, hope, anger, and a host of other emotional potpourri? How are we to respond or act? We look to the readings of this Sunday for an answer from the Prophet Malachi (Chapter 3:19-20), the Apostle Paul (2 Thessalonians 3:7-12), and from Jesus Himself (Luke 21:5-19).

As usual, we are neither alone in this nor are we the first to go through such a period. The earlier Christians had problems interpreting Jesus' response to Peter in John 21:22. After asking Peter three times if he loved Him, Jesus asked him to follow Him. Well, for whatever reason, John, the disciple Jesus loved, followed both, obviously without invitation. To Peter's complaint about the uninvited guest, Jesus responds: "If I want him to remain until I return, what is that to you?.." This response prompted them to believe that John would not die until Jesus returned, which meant that Jesus was returning real soon.

The Jewish stock market must have crashed the next day! More than that, years later, the Christians believed that since the world was coming to an end, there was no need to work or to do anything at all. Thessalonians seemed to be the worst hit. Paul was alarmed and wrote to warn them and direct them on what to do in such a time of doubt, confusion, etc. In the gospel Luke confronted his community's fears and worries in the midst of persecution for being Christians. He reminded them of what Jesus once told His worried audience: "By your perseverance you will secure your lives."

So, where do all these leave us, 2000 years later and thousands of miles away from these biblical places?

The election has come and gone. The beautiful process of electing our president turned very ugly. Coming from a country with a poor democratic process, I do admire what we have here. Yes, it could become ugly but it does bring or crystalize the issues dear to the heart of every citizen and non-citizens alike. These are issues that cannot just be dismissed, from political to immigration, religious to cultural/social, from moral to social life, from economy to security, from jobs to health, from freedom to opportunities, etc.

These are tough issues, made tougher be the fact that we do disagree on the best ways to approach and resolve them. We also have candidates, both imperfect (and who is not?), who have different personalities which will affect how they approach the issues. So, at the end of the day, the entire country was/ is worried. The climax was the Election Day results that not only showed this reality but showed how divided we have become. The issues and the tone of the campaigns divided us. So, we now have a host of tangled up emotions waiting to be sorted out.

This is also a global phenomenon. Britain had BREXIT recently. Nigeria had hers already. The aftermath is a different story. Canada had hers recently. France had some too.

So, what are we to do as good citizens? What are we to do as Christians? What are we to do as members of St. Bart's whose members are both Democrats and Republicans? I know (spoke with many of us) that we all share the same concerns mentioned above but differ on how and who would do a better job. And as excited or worried or indifferent as we may be, we must ask 'what next?' How can I help?

Jesus would respond: "Persevere in your good works and you will not only save yourself but others". Each of us must begin the healing process by remaining concerned for the other and for one another, no matter the party. We must extend this to the society. And our good deeds will definitely help another hurting child of God. We must pray for President elect, Donald Trump and his team. We must pray for the outgoing President. We must pray for those that will need to work together to move us forward. Above all, we must pray that we, as a nation will return to God who made us who we are today.



The word "stewardship" is often invoked in religious circles to encourage members to be supportive of their congregation. That



usually includes the contribution of financial support along with a commitment of time to assist in the work or ministry of the community. At its root, stewardship implies the responsible overseeing and protection of something worth caring for. In a congregation, true stewardship

is a reciprocal relationship. It is very much like the covenantal relationship between God and His people as described in the Bible. A faithful steward recognizes that what one has is not one's own possession. It is a gift, meant to be treasured, preserved, and used for the benefit of others. In turn, the community responds with care and support in time of need, because it too is a steward of the resources it has been given.
