

3rd Sunday Ordinary Year C Lk 1:1-4; 4:14-21



"Since many have undertaken to compile a narrative of the events that have been fulfilled among us, just as those who were eyewitnesses from the beginning and ministers of the word have handed them down to us, I too have decided, after investigating everything accurately anew, to write it down in an orderly sequence for you, most excellent Theophilus, so that you may realize the certainty of the teachings you have received. Jesus returned to Galilee in the power of the Spirit, and news of him spread throughout the whole region. He taught in their synagogues and was praised by all. He came to Nazareth, where he had grown up, and went according to his custom into the synagogue on the sabbath day. He stood up to read and was handed a scroll of the prophet Isaiah. He unrolled the scroll and found the passage where it was written: 'The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring glad tidings to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim liberty to captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, and to proclaim a year acceptable to the Lord. Rolling up the scroll, he handed it back to the attendant and sat down, and the eyes of all in the synagogue looked intently at him. He said to them, "Today this Scripture passage is fulfilled in your hearing."

Dear St Pius And St Anthony Churches,

3rd Sunday Ordinary Year C Lk 1:1-4; 4:14-21

Back when I was a fourth-grader in elementary school, I had a teacher who would every Friday have a couple of students to stand in the front of class and offer a little presentation called 'Show and Tell'. She probably had many reasons for doing it: 1) lighten up the Friday schedule after a hard week of teaching/learning 2) personalize each student more by having us share our interests/ loves with classmates 3) build our confidence for public speaking by having us speak more comfortably about something we enjoy, and maybe to 4) learn more about us and our families by the added information about our home & family activities. Who knows what else she had in mind, but generally all the students loved 'Show & Tell' time (except for the nervousness when our own turn came at it)! I vaguely remember taking in a special Mica rock that was given to me from a museum from when we were on a family trip to St Louis once. It gave an opportunity to talk about the whole trip (yes, and tell about the CARDINALS baseball game and the Great ARCH!). This Mica rock was so unique because it was translucent, flat and flaky-like. You could actually peel back flake-layers from this rock! But all of our school 'show and tell' classes were interesting and they kept our attention: which brings up why I mention these 'live and personal' sessions from my elementary school days!

Jesus is conducting His first of many 'Show and Tell' episodes in today's gospel account His return to the home synagogue. In this episode, He dramatically reveals His Identity and Mission starting at home! The way the service ran, Jesus was given His first turn at lectoring and offering interpretive comments at the weekly synagogue service. But surprise, as He finishes the reading, He simply sits down and says 'I am it!' This man is the message! Jesus is theatrically announcing to everyone that if they want to see the scripture passage (Isaiah 61:1-2) he just read to be fulfilled, then watch Him closely! HE claims to be its 'enactment'. Jesus will become the fulfillment of Isaiah's prophecy by 'embodying' it! He will act out the words of prophecy. Isaiah had said the Messiah of God would heal the blind, set prisoners free, bring joy to the poor and announce God's favor to all people. A good bible study would be to catalogue the number of miracles Jesus performs that demonstrate each of these claims.

As a quick example of Jesus theatrically enacting this 'anointing' by the Father, we can refer to Luke 14:1-6 where Jesus conducts a 'performative' healing to make a point to the Pharisees. Jesus first asks the Pharisee audience, in the presence also of a crippled man, whether their law allows a healing on the Sabbath. Of course, they were silent, as they knew it was nonsense to forbid such a blessing work, and they wanted to accuse Him of disrespecting the Sabbath by such a work. Jesus first dramatically has the man stand in front of them to clearly show the man's crippling disease and distress, and then when they can't answer him (because their motive and attack on Jesus is so wrong-hearted), then Jesus proceeds to heal the man miraculously right in front of them. It is as if Jesus asks, "What are you Pharisees in your religious position and high standing in the community doing for this sick man?" (Answer: keeping him sick!) Yet, of course, they do not answer at all (Exactly!-They do nothing for him). Then Jesus performatively heals the man, making His point and setting the man free from his disabling paralysis. Watching it closely, we see it is a very dramatic show and tell, or public demonstration of Jesus 'enacting' or 'embodying' the kingdom of God come near to us! if we want a glimpse of the Kingdom of God, then stick around Jesus! He is the main performance! As He Himself says, if we want to see the Kingdom, "Come and you will see" (John 1:39) Or what Jesus tells John the Baptist's followers when they visit to ask if He is in fact the Messiah in Matthew 11:4-5 "Go and tell John what you hear and see: the blind receive their sight, the lame walk, lepers are cleansed, the deaf hear, the dead are raised up, and the poor have good news preached to them." Jesus fulfills the messianic prophecies. Firsthand, Jesus shows the 'tales' expected of the Messiah of God! Perhaps a good homework study for all of us is to read through any of the gospels and make notes of Jesus fulfilling the prophetic words of Isaiah 61:1-2 which confirm Jesus to be the Messiah, the 'Word made Flesh' (John 1:14). Isaiah lists these signs to watch for 1) Bring 'Good News' to the afflicted' 2) Proclaim liberty to captives 3)recovery of sight to the blind 4) set the oppressed free 4) proclaim a year of favor to all. Our home synagogue service project now is to 'Come and See' Jesus performing these prophecies in whichever gospel we choose to read. Seek and you will find! Prayers and Peace, Fr Brian
