


Annual Elections


Book Reviews

Young Skins, by Colin Barret

Colin Barrett is on a roll. The thirty-something writer from Knockmore, Ireland, has reaped piles of praise for his debut book, *Young Skins*, garnering multiple literary awards from across the pond. *Young Skins* has now made its way stateside to win over more readers – welcomed by a favorable New York Times Book Review in March of 2015.

Young Skins is a collection of seven stories that are set in a fictional Irish town. All the stories are separate tales unto themselves, though similar themes abound throughout the book. The characters in Young Skins are in a struggle to overcome their stagnant lives. Among others, there's the shy sidekick, the binge-drinking alcoholic, and the ethnocentric, small-town bouncer. All the while, the specter of tough circumstances



looms as a would-be robber discovers his loot to consist of worthless Irish pounds, and a lonely, victimized gas station attendant finishes off a late night in the company of his aging mother.

Yet the players in *Young Skins* are not mere simplistic pawns; they are multifaceted and sometimes done in by squandered opportunities and misguided choices. The longest story of the book, "Calm with Horses," features a former boxer aptly named "Arm," who has an autistic son. Arm, who is the muscle for his drug-dealing partner, is interrogated about his retirement from boxing, "So that's that. You do a good thing and you're good at it, presumably, and then one day you . . . just . . . stop."

Barrett's prose is heavy with metaphors and apparent subtext. There's the use of the term "skin" in its various forms. And in the final story, "Kindly Forget My Existence" (a title stolen from a James Joyce character), a coat is left behind and uncollected in a pub after two patrons try to muster up the courage to attend a former bandmate's funeral.

Despite its tragedies, the stories in *Young Skins* also have a persistent clever wit. One protagonist declares, "I left the city with my connections scorched and my prospects blown, looking only for somewhere to batten down for the winter." In the story "Bait," an elderly pub's customers are depicted as "mostly fat men with dead wives hefting pints into their bloated, drink-cudgeled faces." Altogether, Barrett's writing is superb and is what ultimately makes his book such an enjoyable read. One will want to revisit *Young Skins* to pick up what was missed the previous times around.

Bring Us Back an Oul' Bucket of Ice, by Michael Collins



Sure, and isn't this a grand sweeping novel, a kind of a mash-up of George Lukas, Steven Spielberg, Roddy Doyle (for the Irishness of it), James Joyce (for the incomprehensibility of it), and Doug Adams (for the future shenanigans).

The list of characters in this howl of an Irish adventure by Michael Collins is quite extensive and mostly robotic. They include a megalomaniacal villain, William McCoy The Third (not so fondly referred to by the Irish heroes as "William McCoy Da Turd"), an iShillelagh (a robotocized walking stick) named Malachy

Malarkey, a dark-skinned man named Donn-Dubh whose hat contains everything including two kitchen sinks, Seamus the green penguin who speaks with an Irish accent, and Paddy San and Mai-Ly, both robots and both ninjas. Oh, and did I mention the iShillelagh Irish Wolfhounds?

If you think the inhabitants of this tale are astonishingly strange, so is the tale itself, which involves a nefarious plot set in motion by the aforesaid William McCoy Da Turd to promote his land acquisition company, GRABiT, by melting the Ross Ice Shelf (an actual thing, off the edge of Antarctica) and then, once the world was flooded (and Ireland itself disappeared into the sea), sell the available remaining high-ground land at exorbitant prices. A band of hardy (and hilariously inept) denizens of Eirestown (an unreal place in Ireland that, like Brigadoon in Scotland, can only be found by magic) sets out to stop Da Turd and save the world. Will they succeed? Perhaps only an old Irish granny knows for sure.



As for the meaning of the book's title, I'll leave that to you to discover for yourself.

What Will Happen to Ireland if the Polar Ice Caps Melt?

It seems that Michael Collins' premise in his book *Bring Us Back an Oul' Bucket of Ice* is not all that fantastical. An interactive map, produced by National Geographic, shows what the world would look like if all the ice melted and ran into the sea. Ireland, for a start, would be considerably more waterlogged.

Calculations indicating that the sea-level would rise by 66 meters mean that much of the west of Ireland would be lost to the Atlantic Ocean. Two-thirds of the region of Connacht would be submerged. National Geographic states "There are more than five million cubic miles of ice on Earth, and some scientists say it would take more than 5,000 years to melt it all. If we continue adding carbon to the atmosphere, we'll very likely create an ice-free planet, with an average temperature of perhaps 80 degrees Fahrenheit instead of the current 58."

Throughout the rest of Europe their maps show similar devastation. In the United Kingdom, London would be enveloped by the River Thames and the English Channel. Venice, Italy would disappear, while the Mediterranean and the Caspian Sea would swamp various nations' coastlines. As for North America, "The entire Atlantic seaboard would vanish, along with Florida and the Gulf Coast. In California, San Francisco's hills would become a cluster of islands and the Central Valley a giant bay. The Gulf of California would stretch north past the latitude of San Diego—not that there'd be a San Diego." The areas worst affected would be in Asia, where Bangladesh and a huge swathe of China would sink into the sea.

Just last week Evan Burgess, a PhD in geography and glacial expert living in Alaska, told KSL.com, "Each year Alaska is losing about 50 cubic kilometers of ice. That's (the equivalent of) about three full Great Salt Lakes draining out of these mountains every single year," he said. "So, that's a lot of ice going into the oceans."


