magnificent. And we thought the Keys were laid back. But our Keys neighborhood is a booming metropolis compared to our present surroundings. Yet, this morning on the radio we heard of the voungest Klezmer band, with the youngest member barely in his teens. It is good to know the Jewish community is alive even at the far reaches of the frozen north. I am certain that is what the visitors to the KJCC say about us. What a wonderful feeling!

Unfortunately, our worldwide community is under attack, not only by the terrorists, but also by the Western world. It is disgraceful that the world leaders must still use us as a scapegoat. If Israel and the Jewish community at large do not survive, who will be next? What will it take for the Western world to realize that Israel is fighting their war?

When I first heard of the conflict, I told Patty that I had a calling. I had to go to Israel and fight in any capacity. The cease fire put an end to those plans. But I intend to carry on the fight. I will do what I can to help insure the survival of our people, and that includes the survival of Israel. I ask for your help. I know it is extremely important that the KJCC prosper and make its mark as a thriving Jewish institution serving our community. We must speak our minds and be heard. 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KIBBUTZ NIR AM: The Roots of Life-Sustaining Water in the Negev

A water museum. It sounds odd, until you consider how important water really is, particularly in the desert. Of course we know that humans cannot live even a few days without water. But the story of Nir Am, a kibbutz near Sderot on the Gaza border, reminds us that the power of water extends past human life and has the ability to transform a barren desert into a blooming oasis.

Kibbutz Nir Am was founded by Nissan Nir. one of the pioneering founders of the State of Israel. Nir was an authority on how best to bring water to arid land. In 1943, the early settlers of Israel found an aquifer lying beneath the desert ground. (When a layer of rock in the ground readily transmits water to wells and springs it is called an aquifer). They built a 1,000 cubic meter storage tank to hold the water they found and drilled.

Later, after WWII, they purchased 220 kilometers of pipe and in 1946. Nir helped lay these pipes and extended them outward from the storage tank. This created the infrastructure for 11 new kibbutzim to be born in the desert! In just one night in 1946, working under the British radar, Jews erected houses and proudly flew a Jewish flag at each kibbutz. This water storage tank became a symbol of the Negev. Though the Negev was not part of the original 1937 U.N. partition plan, because of this Jewish drive and ingenuity, the council saw fit to include the Negev as part of the state of Israel in 1948.

Jewish National Fund has always realized how important water is to Israel's future, and over the past century we have built more than 180 dams and reservoirs. Now, JNF is taking the knowledge we have gained and sharing it with others, allowing visitors throughout the world to learn about and pay tribute to water, the essence of life.

The museum at Kibbutz Nir Am is built on the remains of this historic water system, but because of the historic role this site played, the museum also serves as a museum of defense. But beyond the historical component, as water continues to be a struggle for Israel, JNF has undertaken an enormous project to add to the museum as well as create an International Program for Water Conservation together with its partners The Sapir College for Research Institute and The Society for Preservation of Israel Heritage Sites.

Plans are now in place for a \$2+ million project. Planned enhancements to the current museum include new facilities as well as the latest design, film and A/V equipment. An adjacent historical building will be erected for the Water Research Center, JNF will work in coniunction with experts in Sapir Academic College, located near the museum. The goal is to facilitate research, public and government policy and invention in the broad area of water solutions. This institute will also raise policy issues that are facing Israel and the Middle East, and may help present solutions and ideas that would benefit societies around the world.

Yom Kippur - Book of Life

In the first hour the idea of creating man entered God's mind, in the second God took counsel with the Ministering Angels, in the third God assembled Adam's dust, in the fourth God kneaded it, in the fifth God shaped him, in the sixth God made him into a lifeless body, in the seventh God breathed a soul into him, in the eighth God brought him into the Garden of Eden, in the ninth he was commanded [against eating the fruit of the tree of knowledge], in the tenth he transgressed, in the eleventh he was judged, in the twelfth he was pardoned. 'This,' said God to Adam, 'will be a sign to your children. As you stood in judgment before Me this day and came out with a free pardon, so will your children in the future stand in judgment before Me on this day and will come out from My presence with a free pardon.' (Vayikrah Rabbah 29:1)

In this telling, the primary source of awe is God's omnipotent power. This complements the biblical text, in which nature's wonders are extolled and prove so tremendous as to tempt Adam to disobey God almost immediately. This epitomizes the multi-layered content of the Mishnah, establishing a from-day-one tradition of Rosh Hashanah as the time of personal accounting, but building that lesson upon a firm foundation of the creation story.

By approaching the High Holidays not solely as a time of personal reevaluation, but as an opportunity to consider our places--individually and communally--in creation as a whole, we can give more depth to the holidays and provide more fertile ground for teshuvah. In this view, the holidays are a balance: we celebrate creation and then have ten days to consider how we treat others. We cannot be so concerned with our own results, our daily lives, that we diminish those of creation, either the initial creation (whatever you believe that may be) or the ongoing process in which we partner with the divine presence in making a better world. As partners in creation, we cannot demean or diminish, harm or harass, other people in the pursuit of our goals, however worthy. When we do, we tarnish creation. Yom Kippur, then, is an opportunity to repair the damage we have done to creation over the past year, and to re-consecrate ourselves as partners in the ongoing process of creation. The Book of Life is more than a register of who shall live and who shall die; it is a collection of contracts, with each of us signing on for another year of living fully by actively partnering with God.

From this perspective, despite the competing calendars, Rosh Hashanah comes at the perfect time. At the onset of fall, the weather is beginning to change; summer, the season of lushness and robust life, is fading into fall, the season of slow decay and packing up in preparation for winter. The metaphor of the Book of Life is all the more powerful in the fall, because only those who sign up for another year of helping advance creation can be assured of reaching the next spring, the season of life and birth and all the excitement and glory of creation.

None of this is to dismiss the importance of self-reflection around the holidays. One cannot fully make a commitment without taking inventory, in an honest assessment, of personal strengths and weaknesses. And a commitment to partner in creation is no light obligation. But by also looking beyond ourselves and focusing on creation, we can find another level of meaning, purpose and resonance in the holidays.

We wish you a healthy, happy and prosperous new year.

1 large onion, sliced		1 T oil
1 jar marinara sauce		1 can tomato soup (undiluted)
garlic	salt	oregano

2 eggs	1/2 t salt
pepper to taste	2 T butter

Cut a 1/2 inch slice from the stem end of each tomato, scoop out pulp and seeds. Sprinkle insides of tomatoes lightly with salt, stand upside down on paper towels and set aside for 30 minutes. Squeeze moisture from uncooked defrosted spinach and combine with the two cheeses and eggs in a mixing bowl and beat until well blended. Add seasonings and mix well. Stuff tomatoes with mixture and dot with butter. Place tomatoes in a buttered baking dish and bake at 350° for 30 minutes.

Cheese Puffs
6 TBS butter
1/8 tsp pepper
4 eggs

1 cup finely diced Gruyere cheese

1 cup water

1 cup flour

1 t salt

Preheat oven to 425°. Lightly grease cookie sheet. Place water, butter, salt and pepper in saucepan and heat until butter is melted and mixture is boiling rapidly. Add flour to mixture at once and continue to cook stirring until mixture forms a ball and leaves sides of pan clean. Remove from heat. Beat each egg into mixture separately until absorbed - add cheese. Drop by the teaspoon onto the cookie sheet. Bake approx 20 minutes until golden brown. (Makes about 60 puffs)

Cry to those Using Babies as Shields

My son is in the army. He is not the type at all, believe me. Quiet. studious. a writer. a lover of Jewish history, Talmud, ethics. He spent two years in a pre-army program in the Galilee called Karmei Chavil. He made many good friends there from all over the country, and now he and all his friends are in the army. One of them I know well. A bit chubby, with payot, and a great laugh. He and my son have become like brothers. While both of them tried out for the elite paratroopers unit, only he made it in. He and his unit are the ones in Lebanon. They were there over a week, fighting under horrific conditions, running out of food and water. Even though the Israeli air force dropped tons of leaflets warning civilians to flee because they were in terrorist territory and likely to be injured, they still encountered civilians. My son spoke to his friend vesterday and this is how he described it:

"The village looked empty, and then we heard noises coming from one of the houses, so we opened fire. But when we went inside, we found two women and a child huddled in the corner of the room. We were so relieved we hadn't hurt them. We took up base in one of the empty houses. And then all of a sudden, we came under intense fire. Three rockets were fired at the house we were in. Only one managed to destroy a wall, which fell on one of us, covering him in white dust, but otherwise not hurting him. I spent the whole time feeding bullets to my friend who was shooting non-stop. We managed to kill 26 terrorists. Not one of us was hurt. Our commanding officer kept walking around, touching everybody on the shoulder, smiling and encouraging us: "We're better than they are. Don't worry." It calmed us all down. And really, we were much better than them. They are a lousy army. They only win when they hide behind baby carriages.'

Please remember this when you hear about

the "atrocity" of the Israeli bomb dropped on Kfar Cana, killing many civilians, a place from which Hezbollah has fired hundreds of rockets at Israel. Unlike previous administrations, Mr. Olmert has my respect when he says: "They were warned to leave. It is the responsibility of Hezbollah for firing rockets amidst civilians."

Terrorists and their supporters have lost the right to complain about civilian casualties, since all they have done this entire war is target civilians. Every single one of the more than 2,500 rockets launched into Israel, is launched into populated towns filled with women and children. Just today, another suicide belt meant to kill civilians in Israel was detonated harmlessly by our forces in Nablus. So don't cry to me about civilian casualties. Cry to those using your babies and wives and mothers: crv to those who store weapons in mosques, ambulances, hospitals, and private homes. Cry to those launching deadly rockets from the backyards of your kindergartens and schools. Cry to the heartless men who love death, and however many of their troops or civilians die. consider themselves victorious as long as they can keep on firing rockets at our women and children.

Save your sympathy for the mothers and sisters and girlfriends of our young soldiers who would rather be sitting in study halls learning Torah, but have no choice but to risk their precious lives full of hope, goodness and endless potential, to wipe out the cancerous terrorist cells that threaten their people and all mankind. Make your choice, and save your tears.

That terrorists have been unsuccessful in killing more of our women and children is due to our army, God and prayers, not to any lack of motivation or intention on their part. If you hide behind your baby to shoot at my baby, you are responsible for getting children killed. You and you alone.

I Don't Like Kol Nidre

We hear about forgiveness every year at the High Holy Days. We seek God's forgiveness in shul from Selihot through the final prayers of Yom Kippur. But most years, I don't feel I've sinned much. I nod in recognition, and tap my chest when we chant the lists of sins we've spent generations constructing and (more recently) reconstructing. I've got plenty of guilt about all sorts of things, large and small, but I don't think there are many people I've really wronged, nor do I think of myself as a victim of unfairness or cruelty inflicted by others. Neither as a sinner nor as a victim do I embrace the concept of forgiveness as a big part of my life, once the High Holy Days have passed. This whole concept of 10 Days between Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur of asking forgiveness from your friends, family, or anyone you have wronged seems to apply to others and not to me. I go to synagogue, socialize, eat cake and do what I can to help but I am not religious. A good Jew is someone else that dhavens three times a day, fasts on all the holidays, honors the Shabbath, this is not me.

I will look around me, at the congregation on the first night of Yom Kippur and see a crowd. A crowd full of Jews. A full house all coming to pray, to stand together as one and listen to our Cantor chant that all familiar haunting melody of Kol Nidre. We stand together as one, a congregation for the right to pray, for the right to announce that we are Jews and all with one purpose.

Now, I remember from years past, the melody of Kol Nidre will awaken something within me. A remembrance from years of ago when I was a small child, my grandfather held my hand walking me to the Shul on Kol Nidre. My mother busy, hurriedly making the feast before the fast. The lighting of candles. A feeling of connection, a sense of being Jewish. By the third chanting of Kol Nidre - I remember - I am a Jew, a Jew in my own way.
