

Editorial

Welcome to the Autumn issue of the Sydenham Newsletter. In the current climate we have stopped our usual regular issues as there has been little to report and these quarterly issue have seemed appropriate with up-to-date news. Thank you to all who have contributed!

All our lives have certainly been changed by Covid and Lockdown – not being able to gather together, but we did make an effort on Remembrance Day, Sunday 8th November, with around 90 villagers gathered with social distancing around 'The Queens Garden' to celebrate and remember the fallen.

The garden gives Gilly an opportunity to put something good back into the world, she loves the outdoor life whatever the weather and I'm delighted to see the end result! Gordon has purchased and kindly loaned us a Soldier silhouette to keep guard, something the Parish council might consider for each end of the village next year! This year there were many fallen leaves to bag and remove before new plants to keep the garden updated and Gilly has made an excellent job of it. She has also just finished a 21 day fundraising challenge in aid of The Thames Valley Air Ambulance 21st Anniversary. Many of you will remember her being hospitalised for five months six years ago, following a bad riding accident when her horse died and she suffered a major brain injury, and was flown to the JR by Air Ambulance – despite her injuries she has completed her 21 tasks 21 times in 21 days and raised nearly £1200 for the Air Ambulance team!

Rev'd Joan Deval our St Mary's Minister, led the excellent short Remembrance service and she has also written the November Pastoral letter which is especially lovely! The usual team of individual supporters, Fiona, Siobhan, Lloyd and Gilly with Joan's guidance all helped and ensured all was correct.

Rector Jacky has taken on a busy role and task as United Parish Rector in ensuring we all keep abreast of the latest Diocese rules during Lockdown and holds regular Zoom meetings with parish representatives, Wardens Fi Kermack and myself.

I would like to thank Mark Kermack for his leadership and involvement in the repairs to the Church Spire – what a lovely job his team have done. Mark has also taken on the updating of the Old School Room and made an excellent job of that as well, having it repainted inside and out, the signs repainted, new curtains purchased with the guidance of Siobhan and the whole job seen through a new pair of eyes which has given the Hall a new perspective! Once Lockdown has lifted we look forward to welcoming villagers back, using the facilities and bringing life back to the building. Steve the decorator has done a great job and deserves big thanks.

Whilst on that note can I ask the person who has removed the long Step ladder from the cupboard to return it? It was jolly useful and we are missing it!

It is also time to update the management of the OSR as I am stepping down after many happy years and Mark will make an excellent Chairman.

Rather surprisingly on Monday this week I received a call from elderly resident Pamela Mcbride asking if I could run her and her old dog to the Vet in Thame as the dog was bleeding severely, but she couldn't find anyone to take her! She actually contacted Chinnor Friends of the Village who mentioned my name. I took Pamela and the dog in, but sadly a Tumour on the leg had been bitten and chewed and Pam's lovely pet was put to sleep. The point being in these difficult times please look out for your neighbours and friends, particularly us wrinklies! Pam has been out of the house only four times this year!

Thanks to our village leaders we've put together a good issue: The Church articles read well, The Parish Council have updated us, thank you Cheryl, thanks to our MP John Howell, Sydenham WI Chairman Siobhan, despite not being able to meet each month, Cricket Club Captain Dan, Pub Landlords Dave and Sharon at The Inn at Emmington and Tina and Pete at The Crown, Both pubs are trying their best to serve our wonderful village – please continue to support them, by using their take-away weekend offers.

A big thank you also to my fellow Newsletter Team of Fiona and Paul – we are so pleased Paul has returned from isolating in Cornwall throughout the first lockdown. He makes a massive difference in ensuring we have the right balance, the spelling is correct and adds pictures generally sent in by Fiona and puts it all together.

November Pastoral letter – Rev'd Joan DeVal writes:

As I write this letter in the middle of October the country faces further lockdowns in an effort to curb the spread of Covid and the village of Chinnor mourns the tragic accident resulting in the cutting short of four young lives.

In the Gospels Jesus frequently tells his followers "Do not be afraid" - not because there is nothing to be afraid of – but because – he adds "I am with you". We wash our hands, wear our masks and keep a social distance from each other, not out of fear but because we care. We walk together. Shalom – the peace we are promised does not mean freedom from sickness, disability or tragedy. Moses



retained his possible stutter and Paul could not pray away his thorn in the flesh but both found their true health in the faithfulness of God's presence and love.

November is the month when we look back in remembrance. On November $1^{\rm st}$ – All Saints Day, we remember those who we miss at our tables but whose lives remain entwined with ours. We remember and thank God for their lives and for the fact that our lives are richer because their lives touched ours. We often light a candle in their memory which helps draw renewed comfort and strength for ourselves as we also look forward in hopefulness and trust.

The following Sunday is Remembrance Sunday when we visit memorials to those who gave their lives in war. Whatever our view of war, for every war has two losers; we bear testimony to peoples' resilience and courage in the face of evil. We remember not to apportion blame but with gratitude and the prayer that we will use the memory for good purpose as we challenge prejudice, learn to live with difference and seek ways of faith, hope, love and justice.

During these past months I have been re reading books on my bookshelf and this week I was struck by some words written by Henri Nouwen. He reminds us that "God is a God of the present who reveals to those who are willing to listen carefully to the moment in which they live, the steps they are to take towards the future". Jesus said, "Do not worry about tomorrow – tomorrow will take care of itself". Today will be shaped by the decisions we make today and those decisions will be based on yesterday's experiences.

God bless you as we walk together into the unknown, with the faithful love and presence of God.

An Ancient Sanskrit Poem:

"Look well to this day – for it is life – the very best of life in its brief course lie all the realities and truths of existence the joy of growth, the splendour of action, the glory of power. For yesterday is but a memory and tomorrow only a vision but today if well lived, makes every yesterday a memory of happiness and every tomorrow a vision of hope.

Remembrance Sunday Service

Rector Jacky is very keen to ensure as much as possible is done at these difficult times to keep to regular normal activities whenever possible. St Mary's Church were keen to hold an outside service to celebrate the 75th Remembrance Sunday and following tight planning and instructions on social distancing by Fiona, went ahead perfectly on a lovely morning led and organised by our minister Rev'd Joan Deval.



Gilly ensured that the Queen's Garden was dressed to perfection and Gordon supplied 'the soldier' representing the fallen from WW11. The parties involved worked hard before the event to ensure it worked to the usual standards expected in our village and was very successful. Lloyd in particular put in time with recording & ensuring the sound equipment worked well. The reduced Sydenham choir under Siobhan's leadership sang well and were supported by Lloyds recorded singing & music particularly, as the 'congregation' were unable to sing due to Covid instructions – which meant the singing was heard throughout. 'The Last Post' and bugle recordings were very special. I counted around ninety people and it was so lovely seeing everyone from all sides of the village gathered together, faces that have been shielded for many months with lockdown. Thank you to everyone who turned out!



The general feeling is that the outdoor Remembrance Service was so successful it should be repeated next year! *Roy*

David Munday

Val Munday writes:

David Munday died in June after a long illness. He lived almost all his life in Sydenham, firstly in Crossways Cottage with his parents, Eric and Joyce, his older brother Graham and his twin brother, Andrew. His family were among the first villagers to move into Sydenham Grove, and he lived there until we married and went to live in Box Cottages.



He was a member of the first intake of students at the Wenman School, Thame and went on to Littlemore Grammar School. He and his twin Andrew were apprenticed at Molins Ltd at Saunderton, where they qualified as Mechanical Engineers.

David left engineering for a while and worked at the National Film Archives, Rank Film Laboratories, and in the Dubbing Theatres at the BBC.

He returned to engineering after our children Tom and Peter were born. He worked on various contracts in engineering design for several companies including Instron, Chubb Fire Security and, most enjoyably, at RAF Brize Norton for JATE (the Joint Air Transport Executive). The boys remember Families Days and flights in a Hercules transport plane. Most recently David worked for Plating Equipment in Aylesbury.

David had many interests. He was a keen photographer and took the photos for the Sydenham millennium book, 'A Moment of Time'. He was interested in local history and the cycle of the farming year, and he felt it important to listen to and record for posterity the memories of the old people of the village.

He was very keen on folk music and made many recordings in folk clubs, some of which he used for a folk programme on Radio Oxford. He worked with a number of local bands, including SYD, helping with the sound production and recording. He followed F1 racing, enjoyed holidays in Aldeburgh, Suffolk, and was very kind to cats.

The boys and I would like to thank all our family, friends and neighbours for their care and concern over the last few years. Thanks to everyone who showed their kindness and respect when David made his last journey through the village, his home for 70 years.

St Mary's Spire

As you will no doubt have seen the repair works to the spire are now complete. Our picture (*right*) shows the scaffolding just before it was removed and our front cover shows the finished result.



We took the opportunity to replace broken tiles on the roof and mend any failed leadwork. Due to the generosity of some villagers (including the provision of a new window thanks to Maurice Horwood) and several grants, we have just managed to raise sufficient funds to cover the cost without having to use the limited emergency fund that St Mary's holds. This is particularly important at the moment as the small income from collections has effectively ceased due to the current restrictions on services. An old church like ours requires constant maintenance in order to maintain its fabric.

The spire now looks very smart and will darken down as the oak and cedar starts to weather.

What if I have a blocked or leaky drain at the weekend?



Parish Council News

Despite the nights drawing in and not so much positivity in the country right now, we have some good news from the Parish Council to share with you.

Undergrounding of Overhead Cables finally complete!

No more power cuts – cross fingers!

As villagers may be aware, Scottish and Southern Electricity Networks (SSEN) have completed their £316,000 project of undergrounding the overhead cables which supply power to the centre of the village.

The success of this project is down to the tireless work of Sydenham Parish Council's Michael May. The village west of Slade Farm has been blighted by power cuts for many years due to trees and branches falling on the overhead power cables. When Mike first wrote to SSEN back in 2013, it was after a 17-hour power cut and 16 power cuts over the previous two years.

Over the course of the next 7 years, Mike has undertaken regular meetings with SSEN to refine the scheme, facilitating communications between SSEN and landowners to put new cables under their land, remove the overhead cables



across the Mill House garden and Millpond as well as several vulnerable lengths near trees, agree a new crossing of the stream and a new ground based switchgear enclosure – all the time while minimising disruption for villagers. Despite major delays due to issues with Oxfordshire County Council, Mike has persevered!

The new underground cables had been installed over many months and during the last week of August SSEN installed 16 temporary mobile generators to power the village – in place of each existing transformer – while the overhead power lines were removed and the underground ones connected.

It's been a very long road, but we are delighted with the outcome. A huge thank you to Mike for managing this project, which is a major permanent improvement for the village.

With the electrical work complete, remedial work to the verges has been carried out. Temporary fencing has been placed around the rebuilt areas to try to ensure that they are not eroded during the winter months.

Our picture opposite shows the changed view at Kingston Stert, where the supply as it goes under the high voltage pylon lines, near the Folly, is now below ground all the way into the village.

The roadside hedges and those around the playing field have been cut, and the ditches will be cleared through the village before the winter months. The broken/missing manhole covers on the village green have also been repaired.

We would like to say a big thank you to Chris Morgan and Dave Wilkins for volunteering to cut the grass in the village. This has helped to reduce maintenance costs and is hugely appreciated.



Village Footpaths

More fantastic news! All six stiles across the Thame Park footpath have been replaced with gates, making the route accessible for all.

The route was identified in our village survey as one that villagers would like to be more accessible, so we are delighted that we have been able to get these updated through the assistance of a grant from TOE (Trust for Oxfordshire's Environment).

A small village working party are now working on rebuilding the bridge over the ditch out towards Thame Park to complete the accessibility of this route.

Work on Sewells Lane bridleway is also due to be undertaken imminently to improve access over the winter period. In addition, we are currently looking into the costs of undertaking remedial works on the bridleway in front of the Jays, which becomes impassable in wet weather. The hope is work can be undertaken in the Spring.

Speed Reduction Chicane Installation

In more good news, the speed reduction chicane near to Slade Farm along Sydenham Road, has been approved and will be installed from 23rd November. A road closure will be in force from 23rd November for 5 days with the road being closed at The Inn at Emmington and there will be no access through the village during this time.

Speeding on B4445

The September accident near the Inn at Emmington, where a car collided with a telegraph pole cutting off the telephone and broadband to the Inn and Thame Road properties, has further highlighted the problem with speeding at this location. Luckily no one was seriously injured, but we are pressing ahead to find a resolution. We have requested that our County Councillor helps to progress this with Highways.

Thank you to Heather, Alison and Cheryl who have been using the mobile SID to monitor speeds on the B4445 in



the mornings and evenings as part of this project. The police speed van is also now regularly taking up residence in the layby on the B4445 to further help deter speeding in the village.



Sydenham Playing Field

Government guidelines state that the playfields can remain open during the current lockdown, which is great news.

After a thorough inspection of the playing field, RoSPA have sent through their findings and we're pleased that there are only some very minor actions to be carried out. Big thanks to Dave Wilkins for all his hard work in the playing field.

Gilly's 21 challenges – A thank you for saving her life.

21st anniversary of the Thames Valley Air Ambulance.

We have an amazing lady in our midst (but we know that anyhow!) Gilly, as a thank you to the Thames Valley Air Ambulance for saving her life, set about raising money for



her 21/21/21 challenge – to do 21 things in 21 days to raise money for the Thames Valley Air Ambulance's 21st Anniversary. Gilly's idea. And a busy lady she has been too!

As many of you will remember in January 2015, Gilly was air lifted to hospital with a traumatic brain injury following a serious riding accident which dramatically changed her life.

Here are her 21 self-set 'to do' list which commenced on the 10th October and finished on the 31^{st} Oct. At the time of writing, Gilly has raised £1,112 of her £500 target which is at 222%. Gilly's 21 things and how she got on:

competition was always close, but Julia had managed to hold on to shape and form and the Pumpkin was finished well. She received her prize with good grace and congratulated Gordon for his help on getting to the top of the extreme vegetable world in South Oxfordshire.

The sunflower competition and the Best Pair were won by the Ashfield family. Two large multi headed plants the longest being 1.78 SKR or 102 II. This was the first time that the hosts had won and much celebration in a socially distanced manner broke out when the results were tabulated.

The Judges did award a special and new prize to Dan Bradley for his wonderful, yet unruly cluster of Pumpkins, also grown on the allotments and Dan has been awarded the inaugural Cluster Cup for best cluster in show.



Decorated Pumpkins were in abundance and the judges award several prizes for innovation and content. It is fair to say that the adaptation of the exhibits demonstrates a grasp of innovation that left the Judges feeling that competition was in safe hands going forward.

Scam Warning

Thames Valley Police are urging people in Oxford to remain cautious after an elaborate scam has resulted in victims losing a total of £15,000. A man, described as being of Mediterranean appearance, in a dark coloured car, has been approaching people asking for directions to Heathrow Airport. He claims to be a fashion designer with Giorgio Armani and that he has excess stock he is unable to take back to Dubai with him due to the high cost. He asks people to lend him money to cover the cost of his car hire on the promise that the money will be paid back. He encourages the individuals to provide their bank account details and will then drive them to the bank where the money is withdrawn and handed over. The contact details passed over to the individuals turn out to be false and no money is ever paid back.

This scam results in a significant financial loss and poses a risk to the victim's safety by agreeing to get in a car with a stranger. Where personal details including bank details have been handed over, this also leaves the victim open to identity fraud.

Thames Valley Police are also urging the following:

- Never agree to lend a stranger money, no matter how elaborate and believable their story may be.
- Never agree to purchase or accept items from a stranger These items may be stolen and you could be implicated as being involved in handling stolen goods.
- Never reveal personal details to a stranger, especially banking details.
- Never agree to get in a stranger's car, no matter how friendly and trustworthy they may seem.

Contact your bank immediately if you think you've fallen for a scam and report it to Action Fraud. Always call 999 in an emergency. Further information, visit the Take Five to Stop Fraud campaign (https://takefive-stopfraud.org.uk/).
