A Musical Performance by the Gaelic Golondrinas!

This four-person group has played music since they were young. Many are classically trained and can play multiple instruments. Over the past five years, they were introduced



to Celtic music through various jam sessions, Apple Mountain Music gatherings, folk festivals and English contra-dances. The members include Vicky Estrada-Bustillo on silver flute and keyboard; Martha Cook on penny whistle, concertina, and keyboard; Marilyn Hutton on violin/fiddle; and Tom Tunney on guitar and mandolin

As their name implies, they play predominantly Irish, Scottish, and English contra-dance tunes ranging from reels and jigs to hornpipes and waltzes. Since this group is from New Mexico, the second part of their name, Golondrinas (the Spanish word for swallows), was selected to highlight the group's pride in its southwestern roots.

Dear IAS Members:

Well, it's certainly been one of those long, hot summers, but now I think it's cooling down a bit, just in time for our annual FAMILY PICNIC with the Scots on August 28th. Hope to see many of you there!

As you can see from the Treasurer's Report below, our monthly printing bill is a whopping \$311.36! (This also includes the processing and mailing, but still, it's quite a large expense.) Multiply that number by 10 and we're spending over \$3,000 a year on the printed newsletter. With more and more of our members opting to receive the electronic version of the newsletter each month, it has become clear to us that technology is giving us a way to save a lot of money; thus, we have decided to go to an all-electronic newsletter, starting in January of 2017.

Besides the cost savings to the Society as a whole, there are several significant benefits to receiving the e-newsletter: 1. No more wondering why you didn't receive your hard copy because the post office is not that careful with bulk mailings. 2. You can share the newsletter with all your friends, no matter where they live in the world. 3. YOU WILL GET THE NEWSLETTER IN COLOR! So often photos in the black and white printed copy are faded and/or hard to read. In the e-version, the colors are sharp and brilliant.

We are, of course, well aware that not all of our members have access to the internet via computer. We promise that we have no plans to leave you newsletter-less! © We are working on ways to be sure that everyone can get the newsletter one way or another; thus, we need you to call Norita if you do not have a computer so that we can add your name to the list. For those of you who do have computers and internet access, but prefer to read the hard-copy version, we ask that you help us out by simply printing out your own copy of the newsletter.





Review: Solace, by Belinda McKeon

The second book chosen and read for our fledgling IAS Book Club was the Irish Book of the Year and Faber Prize winner, *Solace*. It is a beautifully written and rather melancholy tale of a conflict of values between a father and son, and their inability to find a connection despite a mutually shared tragedy.

That there is a tragedy looming in the future of these characters is something we are told at the beginning of the book, which starts out with a 13-page "Prologue" that has been plucked

from the chronological timeline of the novel, and it doesn't reveal itself until page 215 – almost two thirds of the way through the book. I puzzled over why the author chose to unfold the story in that way, rather than start in an orderly fashion with the events in the first chapter, but perhaps she wanted the tragedy – which only is hinted at as a mysterious absence – to hover over her readers' heads like an electrical storm, keeping us from getting complacent.

The author Ursula K. Le Guin puts it best in her review of *Solace*, which appeared in The Guardian (https://www.theguardian.com/books/2011/aug/12/solace-belinda-mckeon-review?CMP=share_btn_link): "To describe the story's central event would be to betray the author's care in foreshadowing and withholding information till past the middle of the book." Le Guin goes on to emphasize the three main characters that form the heart of the story: Tom, a farmer; his son Mark, a doctoral student writing his thesis on the nineteenth-century novelist Maria Edgeworth; and the woman Mark falls in love with – Joanne – who is the daughter of a cutthroat lawyer who wronged Tom many years before.

Solace is Belinda McKeon's debut novel, although she is not a novice writer. She is described as an award-winning playwright, and her powerful descriptions and tenderly constructed characters inspire me to explore the plays she's also written.

Review: Of Irish Blood, by Mary Pat Kelly

Mary Pat Kelly is the author of numerous books including the best-selling *Galway Bay*, which tells the story of six generations of the Chicago-Irish Kelly clan. In *Of Irish Blood*, it's 1903. Nora Kelly, 24, is a beloved daughter of the Kelly clan. Talented and progressive but poor, Nora climbs the ladder of Chicago's fashion industry until a relationship with a dangerous, violent man sends her running back to the Old World her family fled. She then takes shelter in Paris determined to start fresh as a fashion designer. There she meets a group of Ireland's revolutionary women in the centuries-old Collège des Irlandais. They challenge Nora to honor her Irish blood and join the movement to free Ireland. Along the way, she mixes with such luminaries as William Butler Yeats, James Joyce, Gertrude Stein and many more.

This book satisfies as an historical novel of the early 1900s in America and Europe and as a closer look at Irish revolutionaries at the time leading up to the 1916 Irish Uprising and its aftermath.

Family of Tom Crean Plans to Recreate Section of Heroic Journey



Following in the footsteps of Irish Antarctic hero Tom Crean in this centenary year, his descendants will be undertaking the South Georgia Traverse in September/October 2016. The exciting South Georgia Centenary Traverse will be led by Aileen Crean O'Brien, Tom Crean's granddaughter, together with her two sons Cian and Morgan and her partner Bill Sheppard.

In 1916 Ernest Shackleton, Tom Crean, and four other crew members left the surviving members of the Endurance crew on desolate Elephant Island. The six ship mates crossed the Southern Ocean in an open life boat to reach South Georgia. Upon reaching the island, they had to traverse across an unchartered landscape to reach the whaling station at Stromness. With their clothes in rags, hardly any equipment, and little food,

the intrepid explorers set off to reach help to aid their desperate comrades.

The 2016 South Georgia Traverse will begin on September 21, 2016, when Aileen will leave the comparative safety of her restaurant "Tom Crean Fish & Wine" in Kenmare, Co. Kerry with the intrepid Team Tom Crean and fly to the Falkland Islands. At Port Stanley, they will rendezvous with the skipper of the 50' boat Pelagic, and as part of the crew sail down across the Southern Ocean to South Georgia, approximately 800 miles (similar to Tom's journey). After several days of acclimatizing to the weather conditions on South Georgia, the team will meet their mountain leaders Stephen Venables and Crag Jones. Team Tom Crean will then begin the Shackleton Traverse, ski touring across the island, over a mountainous 4,000 feet pass, across Crean Glacier, around Crean Lake, down the waterfall to Stromness to meet up with the Pelargic at the old whaling station at Grytiken. They will then sail back up to the Falkland Islands to catch flights home to Ireland on October 29th.

McCann, Milo O'Shea, Sorcha Cusack, Marianne Faithfull, Val Kilmer, Mary Black, and John Dankworth. I think the book will be of interest as it gives an unusual perspective to dramatic times, being one Englishman's unique Irish journey. I do hope it interests you. Best, Roland


