Based on history's famous "Petticoat Affair", this two-act dramedy by Anthony E. Gallo is all about morals, adultery, lies, women's roles in Washington society, the quasidownfall of the Jackson Administration and Margaret Eaton. To some she was the most beautiful woman in Washington history. To others the most immoral. But all agree that she and her husband, John Henry Eaton--at various times Secretary of War, attorney, ambassador to Spain, Governor of the Florida Territory, U.S. Senator from Tennessee (elected at age 28)--created more controversy than any other power couple in Washington's political history. How was the President to vanquish the rebellion by the Cabinet wives who objected to the Eaton woman--the de facto First Lady--and brought government to its knees?
