PASTOR LEANNE'S MESSAGE: "Mud"

The end of February, into March, has to be the most unattractive season on earth. Thankfully, all the snow is melting; the few existing places where snow was piled by winter plows have lost their sparkling, fluffy white goodness. They are now mounts of dirty ice, gray and black containing whatever the street plows dug up with them. The trees are barren, black against a gray sky to which I look for some sign of sun. And, the world around me is decidedly lacking the color green – anywhere. I have yet to spot a tiny sprout of anything working its way up from the wintered earth. What I see, everywhere, is mud – lots and lots of mud.

One would be forgiven for thinking that this is a time of year in which nothing happens; hope stalls as a beautiful day of inviting temperatures is followed by a dismal day of wind, gray and, yes, mud. 

I just wanted everyone to know I have two gait belts in the cupboard where the first aid kits and usher supplies are. If someone falls or needs assistance to get up after a fall please use them. When used properly, the belt protects the care recipient from falling and also protects the caregiver from injuring his or her back as they lift or move the care recipient. A gait belt is usually 1-1/2 to 4 inches wide, and 54-60 inches long. The belt is made out of canvas, nylon, or leather with a buckle at one end. Gait belts help prevent injury to the helper and the victim.

attended Good News, Vacation Bible School and participated in the children's church programs. She still has the Bible she received when she was teenager. Thank you Carol for sharing your life journey.



Pastor Leanne thanked the Re-opening Committee, office staff and musicians for their work the past months. Monitoring COVID numbers continues. Committees were reminded to advertise their activities.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Administrative and Personnel—Membership rolls are being reviewed.

Hospitality—There will be a church family fun night on April 22, 7-9pm.

Proclamation—Christian Education—Rusty Bender will direct the youth choir. Triennium will not be held this year.

Worship and Music—Anniversary Committee will be meeting soon. Jamestown Choir offering was over \$1,400. Thursday Tenebrae Service is being planned for April 14.

Property and Equipment—By next month, lighting in the Narthex will be uniform with the same LED lights. It was noted that one CCC room was too warm and needs adjustment.

Resource Management—Committee will work with Hospitality regarding updated Time and Talent survey, which could coincide with an updated photo directory possibly this fall.




Adult Sunday School <u>Opportunity</u>


