Gaming News

U.S.A. According to a new report, American Indian Tribes took in about \$31-billion at their facilities in the latest counting year. That is an uptick of nearly four percent. One economist noted that, "while we saw slightly slower growth year over year for Indian gaming on a nationwide basis, it outpaced other casino gaming segments as well as the economy. Both are good signs." To top it off, revenues from other areas of casino complexes—lodging, food, entertainment—saw very healthy gains.

New York. The Rivers Casino in Schenectady (about two-and-a-half hours north of New York City) has celebrated the \$50-million mark in jackpot payouts. The facility only opened its doors in February of last year. A press release notes that the \$50-million mark is a real milestone. The payout that pushed the total over that mark was a \$1,510 jackpot paid to a visitor from Vermont.

Macau. A large Asian development firm, listed with a Hong Kong address, has filed an agreement with Golden Sun Sky Entertainment in connection with a planned project in the coastal city of Sihanoukville. Media are reporting that the plans call for a nearly 6-million square foot gaming complex with a 1.3-million square foot casino. The complex could open in 16 months.

Tech News. One of the most popular video games produced in China has facial recognition software built in that some say may ease many of the concerns about young people having access to gambling. The so-called mobile app (application) is being introduced in gaming units for in-home situations. Many are watching the success of the experiment because of the expansion of off-casino gaming.

The U.K. A member of the British Royal Family who is famous for his ability to talk to young people has told a group of students that he is worried about possible addiction to video games. His statements came during a visit to a school in Sussex. At one point, the prince spoke to two young boys, telling them to be careful what videos they watched and to not get hooked on the ones that smacked of gambling.

Bingo on the Ballot

When polls opened November 6 for nationwide voting, it wasn't just political representatives that were being determined. Some regions also had amendments on their ballots to change a whole range of local laws. Among them was Calhoun County, Alabama, which included an amendment making it illegal for Bingo halls to operate within 1,000 feet of a residential area. At press time, voting results were still being determined.

Vote to Promote Bingo

Bingo was also on the ballot in Missouri, where a Constitutional Amendment was proposed to "remove language limiting Bingo game advertising that a court ruled unenforceable; and allow a member of a licensed organization conducting Bingo games to participate in the management of Bingo games after being a member of the organization for six months instead of the current two years." The goal of this pro-Bingo amendment was to give Bingo operations more freedom to advertise their games in more outlets and to make it easier for Bingo organizations to share management of operations with newer members.

Starbucks Bingo

The Starbucks coffee company and coffeehouse chain introduced a special game for its Starbucks Rewards members in the form of an online Bingo game competition called Bonus Star Bingo. Through the game, players earn stars whenever they fill in spaces on virtual Bingo boards. Players fill spaces by visiting Starbucks outlets and completing challenges. Winners earn free food and drinks after accumulating enough stars.

Holiday Train in Minnesota

All aboard! The Canadian Pacific Holiday Train will stop in more than two-dozen Minnesota towns on its annual ride through the northern U.S., bringing live entertainment and Christmas cheer in exchange for donations to local food banks. The train will be in Minnesota from Dec. 5-14.

Rules are rules. Either follow them or don't make announcements like that before the game. We all need to hear them yell it, not just the caller or the people sitting right next to her.

We continued to play on, then they stopped the game and paid the church mouse. We were not happy. It's plain and simple. Follow the rules that you say before the start of the game.

What do you think? — **Not a Church Mouse in Indianapolis**

Hi Not a Church Mouse,

I'm with you 100 percent on this one. Few things bug me more than being in a Bingo hall that claims to have rules and either doesn't enforce them or enforces them intermittently, making it seem like the rules only apply to some.

Your story is particularly interesting because you say the caller stated this rule at the start of the game. It's not like it was a policy printed on a sheet of paper and pasted to the wall in some obscure spot. If that was the case, the church mouse could have claimed that she was unaware of the rule. But as a public announcement made minutes before the infraction? I see no excuse.

I'm curious why players just went along with it. Didn't anyone object or call for the manager to voice a complaint? If not, then the caller may have assumed no one minded and did what he decided was the right thing to do.

To me it's like someone jaywalking and almost causing a car accident while a police officer looks on. If the officer does nothing, then there is no ticket issued and no crime. But if someone points it out to the officer and says it was illegal and dangerous, it's likely the officer will enforce the law and punish the jaywalker. — **Guy**

Hi Guy,

No joke...we had a woman show up to Bingo who brought a ferret with her. She was told that animals weren't permitted in the hall, and she said it was an emotional care pet and she had a letter from a doctor that said it was a requirement for her health.

Hi Mike,

The actual term is Emotional Support Animals (ESAs) which make the news mostly when a person shows up at an airport with an unusual animal like a bird, pig or some-such.

People who qualify for ESAs have verifiable psychological disabilities that substantially interfere with major life activities such as anxiety, depression or panic attacks. They are protected by U.S. disability law so long as they can provide documentation of the disability and need for the ESA.

My understanding, however, is that ESAs must be a "usual" animal type, like a dog or cat, at

least for exemptions like housing and transportation regulations, and would not include animals like reptiles and rodents.



Dear Aunt Bingo:



Gambling on Robbery

A suspect in an Illinois bank theft of more than \$8,000 was apprehended after an unusual clue was left at the scene. According to an FBI affidavit, the robber approached a teller and handed over a plastic bag and handwritten note demanding money. The teller emptied her drawer into the plastic bag and the robber fled. When an FBI agent later reviewed surveillance video of the holdup, he spotted a piece of paper falling from the robber's pocket during the heist, court documents state. The agent later recovered the paper, which turned out to be a scratch-off lottery ticket. With help from the Illinois Lottery, the FBI was able to identify where the ticket was purchased. Surveillance video showed a person matching the robber's description making the lottery ticket transaction and then driving away. The vehicle was identified and eventually stopped by police, who pulled it over and arrested the driver, who according to the FBI admitted to the bank robbery.

Daily Play Pays Off After 50 Years

Michael Marks, 66, has been playing the lottery at the same convenience store every day since the 1960s. That persistence finally paid off when he won a \$10 million prize on a \$10,000 a Week for Life scratch-off ticket he bought while buying coffee at the Hartsdale,

New York, store. "The machine lit up and said big winner, see lottery agent," Marks said. "I asked the retailer for a pen, locked myself in the bathroom and signed the ticket." Marks opted to receive his prize in annual installments of \$520,000 a year every year for the rest of his life. That comes to \$349,336 a year after withholdings. "This really is amazing," Marks said. "I haven't given much thought to how I'll spend the money yet. Right now, I just plan to enjoy life."

Mom/Son Duo Win Big

A mother and son from the Lake of the Ozarks, Missouri, have won \$250,000 playing the lottery. Michael Baldwin of Eldon and his mom, Michelle Adams of Lake Ozark, pooled their money to buy Powerball tickets with Power Play. "My mom and I agreed whatever the number was, whatever we won—\$10, \$100, the jackpot—we would split it down the middle and put it all toward debt," Baldwin said. The two began checking their tickets the night of the drawing after Adams downloaded the Missouri Lottery App and scanned the tickets on her phone. "I heard this loud gasp, and it scared me," Baldwin recalled. That was the moment he said his mom read the message on her phone: "Congratulations! \$250,000 Winner." Their prize money will pay off Adams' house, and Baldwin will be able to pay off debt.

Mediation Can Help Resolve Caregiving Conflicts

Dear Savvy Senior,

Are there any services that you know of that help families resolve caregiving conflicts? My mother, who just turned 82, recently had a stroke, and to make matters worse, my two siblings and I have been perpetually arguing about how to handle her caregiving needs and finances. — **Bickering Siblings**

Dear Bickering,

It's not unusual when adult children disagree with each other regarding the care of an elder parent. If your siblings are willing, a good possible solution is to hire an "elder care mediator" who can help you work through your disagreements peacefully. Here's what you should know.

Elder Mediation

While mediators have been used for years to help divorcing couples sort out legal and financial disagreements and avoid

court battles, elder care mediation is a relatively new and specialized service designed to help families resolve disputes that are related to aging parents or other elderly relatives.

Family disagreements over an ill or elderly parent's caregiving needs, living arrangements, financial decisions and medical care are some of the many issues that an elder care mediator can help with. But don't confuse this with family or group therapy. Mediation is only about decision-making, not feelings and emotions.

The job of an elder mediator is to step in as a neutral third party to help ease family tensions, listen to everyone's concerns, hash out disagreements and misunderstandings, and help your family make decisions that are acceptable to everyone.

Good mediators can also assist your family in identifying experts such as estate-planners, geriatric care managers, or health care or financial professionals who can supply important information for family decision making.

Your family also needs to know that the mediation process is completely confidential and voluntary, and can take anywhere from a few hours to several meetings depending on the complexity of your issues. And if some family members live far away, a conference or video call can be used to bring everyone together.

If you're interested in hiring

a private elder care mediator, you can expect to pay anywhere from \$100 to more than \$500 per hour depending on where you live and who you choose. Or, you may be able to get help through a nonprofit community mediation service which charges little to nothing.

Finding a Mediator

To locate an elder mediator, start by contacting your area aging agency (call 800-677-1116 to get your local number), which may be able to refer you to local resources, or search online at mediate.com. Another good option is the National Association for Community Mediation, which can help you search for free or low-cost community-based mediation programs in your area.

Unfortunately, there is currently no formal licensing or national credentialing required for elder mediators, so make sure the person you choose has extensive experience with elder issues that are similar to what your family is dealing with. Also, be sure you ask for references, and check them. Most elder mediators are attorneys, social workers, counselors or other professionals who are trained in mediation and conflict resolution.

What Do the 'Suits' Do?

I received an interesting question from a blackjack player who wanted to know "what do all those people in suits do that work in the pit?"

Most of the time a blackjack player interacts with only one casino employee, namely the dealer, whose job is to ensure that the game is run by established procedures, and to provide customers with a pleasant gaming experience. And for the most part, blackjack dealers work hard and do a good job. But what about those folks who are standing behind the dealer in an area known as the "pit." I'll explain what they do, and how they help make your playing experience a pleasant one.

Dealers report to floor persons,

who are supervisors responsible for the operation of a group of tables within the pit. The number of tables that they supervisor varies depending upon the policy of each casino (I've seen a floor person supervise up to eight blackjack tables in the main pit, and as few as only one table in a high roller pit). The main responsibilities of the floor person are to ensure that each dealer is in compliance with house rules, government regulations, and game protection (i.e., cheating); to intervene and be the final arbiter if a dealer makes a mistake in either dealing cards or paying a winning wager; to be sure a table doesn't run out of chips; to do the table accounting (count chips); and to rate players.

A floor person can be your ally when it comes to receiving comps. When you first sit down to play blackjack, you should place your Player's Card in front of you. The dealer will either input your information into the casino's player tracking system or set the card aside for the floor person to do so. The floor person will usually record the amount of your buy-in, and then periodically record how much they see you wager. When you are done playing, you should get the floor person's attention and ask politely if you can have a comp (for the buffet, or restaurant, or show theater, etc.). Nowadays most casinos have strict rules that determine how much a floor person can give a player in comps (usually the computer

will calculate the amount based on your average wager, and duration of play). However, in many casinos, floor persons can still give discretionary comps to players. Just remember that a floor person usually will not give you a comp unless you ask for one...and when you do so, ask nicely.

If you establish a good rapport with a floor person who treats you well (i.e., rates your play liberally), ask for their business card and then reward them with a token of appreciation on their birthday or at Christmas. It's the policy in most casinos that floor persons cannot accept cash from players, but they can accept gifts (as long as they are nominal, usually \$100 or less). Here are some suggestions on gifts: if your floor person is a golfer, a set of golf balls or gift certificate for a round of golf; a gift certificate to a local restaurant; or a gift certificate to a local spa. I think you get the picture.

Next up in the chain of command is the Pit Manager (sometimes called the Pit Boss). This manager is responsible for overseeing the operation of all the table games in a specific pit. He or she supervises the floor persons and the dealers in the pit. Their main responsibilities include supervising the floor persons and dealers to achieve an efficient operation. If a particular table hasn't won what it should, upper level managers expect an answer from the Pit Boss. Nowadays,

the responsibility of a Pit Boss has been expanded to include spending more time with players (customer relations) to ensure that they are having a good time (i.e., to be less of a policeman and more like a good-will ambassador).

Pit Bosses report to Shift Managers, who are responsible for the overall operation of all the table games and personnel during a particular shift. Pit Bosses also report to the Casino Manager or V.P. of Casino Operations (who has the all responsibility for the table games and slots).

Other employees who are indirectly involved in table game operations are the surveillance employees. These folks monitor and record the activity that goes on at each table to be sure that proper procedures are being followed, that all employees are in compliance with gaming regulations, and they watch for any suspicious activity (i.e. cheating by either a player or dealer or both).

I hope I've given you a clear overview of the hierarchy of the "suits" that manage the table games in casinos. If you ever have an issue with any casino employee, I suggest that you take your complaint directly to the Casino Manager or V.P. of Casino Operations (you can call the casino to get their name, phone number, and email address).

Poker Talk



Short-Stacked Play is a Key to Tournament Success

This hand from the final table of a live \$500-buy-in tournament illustrates some mistakes that many players make when playing short-stacked.

With blinds at 5,000-10,000 plus a 10,000 big blind ante (where a single player essentially antes for the entire table), everyone folded to the small blind. The small blind had 120,000 and was the shortest stack at the final table, but there were a few other players with between 15 and 20 big blinds. The big blind was a loose, aggressive player with 50 big blinds.


The small blind looked down at Jh 3d and decided to limp.

I strongly dislike this play. J-3 is a junky hand, and despite the excellent pot odds (5,000 to win 30,000), it is not strong enough to play. From out of position with a stack of 12 big blinds, you're likely to face aggression from the big blind, who is capable of forcing J-3 to immediately fold. Even if you get to see a cheap flop, you will usually flop nothing or a junky made hand that will have a difficult time confidently playing for all the money. There is merit in simply conserving your stack and waiting for a better spot to invest your chips.

The big blind checked his 10h

I am fine with this check, but if you think the small blind would probably raise with a strong hand, his limping range may be susceptible to being pushed around. If I had been the big blind, I would have made it 28,000 with the intention of folding if the small blind went all in.

The flop came Kh 6h 2s, giving the big blind bottom pair. The small blind bet 20,000 out of his 110,000 remaining stack.



Again, I strongly dislike this play. On a K-x-x flop in a limped pot, the big blind is likely to have either a pair or flush draw that is never folding, or queen high or a worse unpaired hand, which will almost surely fold to any bet. Most ace-high hands would have raised or gone all in preflop. For that reason, if you decide to bet the flop with J-3 as a low-equity bluff, you should make a small bet — say, for instance, 10,000. If you think your opponent will call a 10,000 bet every time, perhaps add a touch more, making it 13,000 or

The big blind pushed all in, forcing the small blind to fold his J-3.

I'm fine with the all-in move. There are plenty of hands you want to protect against (Jh 3d has 30 percent equity), and if you happen to be behind, you have five outs to improve.

This may seem like an innocuous hand, but the small blind lost 25,000 more than he should have in this pot. Even if he had limped and then bet 13,000, he would have lost 7,000 less.

It is important that you study and master short-stacked poker if you want to have any chance of success in tournaments. Sometimes you simply have to make a disciplined fold.



Sweet Potatoes or Yams?

Sweet potatoes mirror the colors of autumn leaves. They can be incorporated into every meal, from sweet potato biscuits for breakfast, a side of sweet potato fries at lunch, or a roasted sweet potato for dinner with a smooth sweet potato custard for dessert.

Some people refer to sweet potatoes as "yams," but this is a misnomer. A yam is a tuber cultivated in Africa that can grow up to seven feet long and weigh as much as 150 pounds.

African slaves were used to eating yams as a major staple of their diet. When they didn't find any yams in America, they used sweet potatoes as a substitute. Some Africans called sweet potatoes "nyamis," the Fulani word for yam, and that is how American sweet potatoes became known in many areas as yams.

Sweet potatoes are high in dietary fiber, vitamins A, C and B-6, and serve as a great lower-carb alternative to regular potatoes. Sweet potatoes contain a wealth of orange-hued carotenoid pigments. Their ability to provide us with a key antioxidant like beta-carotene makes them a standout antioxidant food.

This slow-cooker recipe for Chicken Stew deliciously combines sweet potatoes, chicken and wild rice in a flavorful, creamy sauce.

SLOW-COOKER CHICKEN STEW WITH SWEET POTATOES

6 boneless, skinless chicken thighs (about 1 3/4 pounds)

- 2 tablespoons poultry seasoning 1 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 2 teaspoons ground black pepper
- 1 tablespoon vegetable oil
- 2 tablespoons butter
- 1 cup chopped celery
- 1 cup chopped yellow onion
- 2 tablespoons chopped garlic
- (about 5 garlic cloves) 1/3 cup all-purpose flour
- 4 cups chicken broth
- 4 cups (3 medium) sweet potatoes cut into 1-inch cubes
- 1/2 cup uncooked wild rice
- 1 teaspoon lemon pepper
- 1 cup half-and-half
- 1/4 cup coarsely chopped fresh flat-leaf parsley
- 3 green onions, roots removed and discarded, white and green parts chopped



1. Season the chicken on both sides with 1 tablespoon poultry seasoning, 1 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon pepper. Heat oil and butter in a large skillet over medium-high. Add chicken and cook until well-browned, about 5 minutes. Turn chicken over and cook 2 minutes.

2. Transfer chicken to a 5- to 6-quart slow cooker. Add celery, onion and garlic to skillet. Cook, stirring often, until starting to soften, about 4 minutes. Add flour, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon black pepper to the skillet, and cook, stirring constantly, 1 minute. Add broth; bring to a boil, and cook, stirring constantly, until thickened, about 1 minute.

3. Transfer mixture to slow cooker. Add sweet potatoes, rice and the lemon pepper. Cover and cook on low until rice, chicken and vegetables are tender, about 3 hours. Stir in half-and-half. Turn heat to high and cook for 5 to 10 minutes. Place stew in individual serving bowls and sprinkle with the parsley and green onions, if desired. Serves 6.

Get Cookin' with Eggplant

Dear Annie,

I have a dear friend who is always sharing the produce from her farm. Can you give me a recipe using eggplants, peppers, etc. Thank you. — Holly from Nashville, Tennessee

Dear Holly,

Good timing! I made an eggplant dinner last night for my son and myself. It was very good. We both enjoyed it. This recipe is for four servings (double the recipe if necessary). — **Annie**

EGGPLANT STIR FRY

2-4 tablespoons sesame oil 4 sweet potatoes, scrubbed and cubed

4 red, yellow or orange peppers, diced

2 medium sized eggplants, peeled and cubed 2 tablespoons fresh ginger, peeled and chopped

3 cloves garlic, diced ½ cup soy sauce ½ cup water

1/4 cup cashews

Heat the sesame oil in a large wok or frying pan over a medium heat. Add the sweet potatoes and cook for at least 15 to 20 minutes. Cover with a lid, but stir frequently. When the sweet potatoes are almost done, add the peppers. Cook for at least 10 more minutes. Add the eggplant cubes, chopped ginger and diced garlic. Cook for 10 more minutes. Stir often. Add the soy sauce and water, stirring to incorporate. Garnish with the cashews. Top with more soy sauce, if desired.
