I am reminded of the trials and tribulations that our forefathers faced as they were engaged in the fight for independence. No one experience comes to mind more than the hardships faced by the Continental Army as it took up winter quarters in Valley Forge, Pennsylvania in the winter on 1777-1778.

Washington had ordered his men to build suitable housing for the men. Each 16×14 foot hut would house 12men each. Most huts had only a sheet for a door. Food was especially hard to come by. The Continental currency was worthless and local farmers were reluctant to sell their goods to the famished army. Poor conditions, lack Christmas, Christ in the manger

Typhus and dysentery were the cause of the loss of 2-3,000 men during that winter. To make matters worse. The Continental Congress failed to provide sufficient provisions and supplies to the suffering army despite numerous impassioned pleas by General Washington. Seeing little relief forthcoming, and facing the loss of his army from disease, desertion and expiration of their enlistments, General Washington turned to the Divine for salvation.

We have all seen the painting of the General kneeling in the snow in prayer. How do we know that this event took place? The account comes from Isaac Potts, A Loyalist Quaker who happened to be riding through the woods when he spied General Washington kneeling in prayer, his sword by his side and cocked hat by the other. This scene stunned Mr. Potts, for being a Quaker, he was a pacifist and the thought of someone being a Christian and a soldier was not compatible. He did not disturb General Washington, but rather returned home and explained to his wife "Such a prayer I have never heard from the lips of a man." His wife was also astonished. They both thought it was the cause of God and that America would prevail. Isaac was so moved by this sight that he renounced his pacifism and joined the Continental Army to fight for Independence.

Let us all keep up the good fight and we will all prevail over our trials during this difficult time. As a reminder, December 12th is our annual business meeting and elections of officers for 2021.




Martin Jack Bennett Inducted

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Distant Cousins, by Gene McCarthy

While attending a Prescott Chapter of the Sons of the American Revolution meeting, I shared a story about one of my patriotic ancestors with another member. I told him it was my plan to submit a supplemental for Col. Richard Callaway. Another member, Jack Berry overheard our conversation, and later told me that he too was related to Col. Richard Callaway. Our mutual ancestor Col. Richard Callaway was born June 14, 1717 in Essex County, a colony of Virginia and present-day Tappahannock County.

"Probably no single man accomplished more than did Colonel Richard Callaway in laying the foundation that culminated in the admission of Kentucky into the union." This is a quote by R. Alexander Bate in an article published in The Filson Club History Quarterly.

About 1745, Richard married Frances Walton, (my 6th GG) and to this union 13 children were born. Later in the year 1766, soon after the birth of their daughter, Theodosia, his wife Frances died, and within the next year Richard married his second wife, Elizbeth Jones Hoy. There were three children born to this marriage.

In 1755, the French and Indian Wars were being waged, lasting from 1745 to 1763. Richard Callaway served during this period with distinction, ultimately being promoted to the rank of Colonel of the militia. The protection of three hundred and fifty miles of frontier was the task of the Virginia militia with Col. Richard Callaway commanding Black Water Fort. Col. Callaway became acquainted with and gained experience in the construction and defense of outpost forts. This experience enabled him later to be of inestimable value establishing Boonesborough. After the French and Indian Wars, he moved from Virginia to the Yadkin region of North Carolina but returned to Virginia just before the American Revolution. While in the Yadkin region he became acquainted with the famous explorer, Daniel Boone. This relationship led to Richard's connection to the Transylvania Company and his participation in the founding of Boonesborough. It began when Daniel Boone, Colonel Callaway and about 28 other pioneers began to mark and cut out a road to the spot of their destination - Boonesborough. While enroute they were attacked by Indians twelve miles from Boonesborough and one man was killed and another wounded. None the less the men were successful and what was soon to become Kentucky, saw its beginning.

On the July 14, 1776, two of Col Callaway's daughters and one of Daniel Boone's, were taken captive near the fort by a band of Indians. The two fathers struck out with separate search parties, and within two days the girls were rescued and returned home. This adventure is said to have been the inspiration for "The Last of the Mohicans", by James Fenimore Cooper, 1826 and a numerous television and movie scripts mostly focusing on Daniel Boone.

The Prescott Chapter President, Jack Berry and I now affectionately address each other as "cousins".

I was raised on a small 70 acre farm just north of Ada, Michigan (Home of AMWAY) and graduated from Forest Hills High School, Grand Rapids, Michigan in 1965. I lettered in football, wrestling, and baseball. I dodged the draft in October 1966 by enlisting in the in the United States

Air Force. On 19 January 1967, I went on active duty as an Airman Basic. After Basic Training at Lackland AFB, Texas, and Technical school at Amarillo AFB, Texas, the Air Force ordered me to Clark AB, the Republic of the Philippines for 18 months with temporary duty in The Republic of Vietnam, and Okinawa.

The NRO reported mission status to the Central Intelligence Agency, and the CIA presented mission status to President Ronald Reagan. My next assignment as a Major was to the Air Force Satellite Control Network (AFSCN) at the Space and Missiles Center, Los Angles AFB, Los Angeles, California. I was then assigned to the Joint Chiefs of Staff, J-33,

My boss said, "Major Bigelow is my spy spying on the spy's at NSA." As a major, I ". . .performed [my] duties at the direction of the Chairman." I traveled to 25 worldwide locations in 33 months supporting the Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, General Colin Powell. My trips included Korea, Europe, Bahrain. Panama. and numerous overt and covert locations within the continental US.

The Air Force promoted me to Lieutenant Colonel and ordered me back to the AFSCN, Space and Missiles Center in Los Angles. On 01 Jul 2000, after 32 years 9 months and 21 days, I retired from the United States Air Force as a Lieutenant Colonel.





Melissa Ruffner to be Special Speaker



The Prescott Chapter is pleased to announce that Melissa Ruffner will be the quest speaker for the 24th anniversary of the charter to be held at the Hassayampa Inn on February 13, 2021. Melissa was born into an Arizona family that has roots in Prescott which date back to 1867. She has been an historical story teller for

the Arizona Jamboree and as the owner/operator of Prescott Historical Tours since 1981, Melissa has provided walking tours in authentic Victorian Costume of downtown Prescott. She is the founding president and member of the Prescott Victorian society and member of the Arizona Pioneers' Home Foundation Board. In addition, she serves on the Prescott Western Heritage Foundation Board, the Elk's Opera House Guild, and as a member of the Prescott Regulators and their Shady Ladies. Since Melissa has spent her life absorbing the history of the Prescott region and Arizona in general, local and national media frequently interview her about Prescott history. It is also in this capacity that she frequently travels the southwest speaking about the history of Yavapai County.

Melissa is the author of the 1981 book, "Prescott: A Pictorial History"; "Arizona Territorial Sampler"; "Food and Lifestyles of a Frontier," and other publications. In 2003, Melissa was the recipient of the Sharlot Hall Award for her teaching the "lore of her land," storytelling, and tour guiding which contributed to the understanding and awareness of Arizona History. Her mother, Elizabeth Ruffner, received the Sharlot Hall Award from the Arizona Historical Society in Tucson, and was honored as one of only 100 Arizona Culture Keepers for the states Centennial.

Terrie Frankel is a New York Times Best Selling Author, Producer and Songwriter. Terrie and her identical twin sister Jennie were Doublemint Twins in the late '60s, and Performed with the United Serviceman's Organization (USO) in Vietnam. She has served as an Honorary Commander of both the 944th Aero Medical Staging Squadron with the U.S. Air Force at Luke Air Force Base in Arizona.
