In August, Harry Kramer and I traveled to Beckley in order to deliver 12 flood buckets and two boxes of additional supplies to our United Methodist Emergency Depot. We met with the Field Director of 6666660disaster relief, Rev. Dan Lowther (to the right of Harry Kramer below), who graciously received our supplies and gave us a generous tour of the facilities. We can be proud of our United Methodist heritage to help in time of need, and we can be proud of our United Methodist Conference who continues to make disaster relief a priority. Disaster relief is a tremendous Christian ministry!





I would be remiss if I did not remind us how we came to collect supplies. Kary Kramer, our Christian Education Director, planned and led our Vacation Bible School to include a mission emphasis and chose disaster relief. Leaders and participants brought in products to fill flood buckets. Flood buckets include various cleaning supplies that are stored in our depot and immediately shipped to areas within our conference when a flood ravishes an area or community. In our state, we know it is a matter of time until we are affected by flood waters.

I wish to share my deep pleasure to all who helped to fill flood buckets, and those who pray for those in need when flood waters rise. Our prayers combined with action touches the heart of God! Thanks for responding, and thanks for your continued prayers, not only for those in need, but also for our disaster relief co-directors, The Revs. Dan and Sue Lowther.

I might also mention that Disaster Relief, like all United Methodist Missions in our Conference, is going to have to do more on their own to underwrite their budget. The Conference is no longer in a position to fully underwrite each project. Disaster Relief is asking churches to be partners at \$1,000 a year.
