Much of election security happens at the intersection of voter identification and ballot control. With a more legislative thinking like he suggests, bipartisan agreement would be closer to reality.

That's the type of thinking that, although the writer approached it from a condescending "throw them a bone" perspective, could lead to progress. Let's agree that human nature, combined with opportunity and a righteous desire to win, makes election mischief inevitable. Let's also agree that reasonable and effective controls, such as he suggests, don't equate to voter suppression.
