We learned a lot about RV travel and have had many adventures in Jumbo.

First of all, a few words about RV travel. Sitting up high with a very large glass windshield gives you a superb view of the area you are traveling through. We have all the comforts of home; a queen size bed, toilet and shower, large TV, VCR and CD player. There is also a large refrigerator and freezer. stove, microwave and comfortable dining area. Most of the modern RV parks offer internet access and cable TV along with laundromats, pools, playgrounds and basic groceries. The state and national parks offer beautiful campgrounds, but you must rely on your antenna for TV reception. You realize that you can get by on much less than you are use to at home. RISING COSTS FORCE CHANGE

It is no secret that we are in the midst of a global recession and families, small businesses and corporations are making hard choices to survive in this challenging economy. Unfortunately, The PEP Pioneers are no exception.

Since 2006, we have had three price increases in our luncheon that has brought the cost of each meal to \$11.00 each, but the board of directors voted to use our treasury funds to absorb those increases rather than pass that charge on to you. We have also continued to host the Annual Summer Picnic free of charge as our way of thanking you for supporting the PEP Pioneers. But, like so many other organizations around the world, our donations have decreased and our treasury reserves are dwindling. To allow the mission of the PEP Pioneers to continue we have reluctantly voted to make the following changes to our program costs:

Beginning in August, the cost of the luncheons will increase by \$1.00. That will bring <u>your cost</u> of our monthly luncheon to \$9.00 per person. The PEP treasury will continue to absorb the difference. The raffle tickets will remain \$1.00 each. The Board has also voted to charge \$5.00 per person for the up-coming summer picnic at Victor Park. Please be aware that these events are not fund raisers and these changes reflect our increasing cost of providing meals for you.

We want to thank you for all of the support, commitment and hard work that you give the PEP Pioneers. We are committed to meeting your needs and growing as a group for many years to come.

TOM'S ARGENTINA

At our third stop we had the opportunity to board a Catamaran for a "up close" view

of the Perito Moreno Glacier from the sea. It was spectacular

to see the glacier from the boat. The



PeritoMoreno Glacier is about 100 square miles in size and is growing at the same rate that it is melting (they say "advances at the same rate it retreats). The ice field feeding it from the Andes is said to be the third largest reserve of fresh water in the world.

The sounds of moans, groans, squeaks, and large splashes that emanate from the glacier as it very slowly, but constantly, moves are somewhat spooky, especially when you first hear them, and the sounds are truly extraordinary.

After we returned to the dock, we reentered our bus and were driven several miles further to an area on a cliff across from the glacier's front that had ramps providing many vantage points. There was also a restaurant and souvenir shop where we were able to have lunch. We remained at this



location for several hours taking in the magnificent views of the Perito Moreno and the surrounding landscape, all a part of the Los Glaciares National Park. We also took many pictures while there, including this one just as a large piece of ice collapsed into the sea. It was a wonderful day and the beauty that we saw that day was totally awesome!
