Willistown Troop 78 needs to register all scouts and adults **each year** with the Boy Scouts of America. To ensure continuity with the scouting program we need your registration form and check by September 30, 2019.

Annual Youth Protection Training (YPT)

Youth protection training is required for all registered adults and volunteers by September 30th, 2019. The training includes three modules and a test that takes about 90 minutes to complete. Once completed, this training will cover Chester County Council volunteers through the end of 2020. To get started, it is highly recommended you use Google Chrome browser. Go to http://my.scouting.org and sign in using your Username and Password. Click on the 'Begins with Youth Protection' symbol or click on 'Menu' in upper left corner and select 'My Dashboard'.

It is recommended you read the 'How to Guide for Taking Youth Protection Training' PDF for detailed instructions. There seems to be a delay between 'Add Plan' and the 'Launch Course' button appearing. Based on my experience with the new training you should plan on at least 90 minutes to complete the training. Don't delay, take it today!

Adult Leader Training

There are several opportunities for adult leader training to consider.

1) Youth Protection Training (YPT)

Adult leaders who wish to be registered with the BSA and all adults who have any youth contact must take the BSA Youth Protection Training.

2) CPR certification

Adults should be CPR certified. The Troop offers CPR training one time a year generally on the evening of the first Tuesday in February.

3) Position specific training

Adults should take position specific training offered on the BSA website.

Training is offered for Committee members and Troop Leaders.

4) Activity specific training

There are numerous online courses for safety training in specific activities such as swimming, boating and many others.

5) Introduction to Outdoor Leadership Skills (IOLS)

Adults should consider taking the training referred to as Introduction to Outdoor Leadership Skills (IOLS). This is a two day, one night course offered several times a year. If you wish to be registered as an Assistant Scoutmaster, you must complete the online training mentioned above in #3 and the IOLS.

6) Wood Badge

Adults should consider taking Wood Badge. This is a training course originally designed by Lord Baden Powell himself. This course gives instruction in outdoor skills, teamwork, and leadership necessary to be a successful Scout leader. This course takes place over two weekends and is offered once a year.
