# A Musical Performance by Saiorse!

Saoirse ("freedom" in Irish) was founded in 2004 in Albuquerque, NM. From its inception, Saoirse has promoted and performed a wide range of Celtic music, including many contemporary works from a variety of Celtic cultures. Saoirse calls this cross-cultural and inclusive approach Celtic Eclectic, which is also the title of their first CD (2007). They recorded a second CD, Rigs, in 2012.

John Brinduse, the only original band member after all these years, plays guitar exclusively in Dropped D tuning. He is the Old Man of the group. The 2023 edition of Saiorse includes Percussionist Glenn Maxwell (bodhran, bones, djembe, and other traps) and Lisa Nichols (flute and saxophone). Lead vocalist Claire Brown is Lisa's daughter who sang the encore song with



Saoirse at the Celtic Eclectic CD release concert in 2007 when she was 14. She also sometimes plays clarinet and helps with percussion. Tessa Frias, Claire's wife, plays mostly cello and occasionally banjo ukulele. Saoirse's newest and youngest member is Lucy Wang, who plays (and teaches) a mighty fiddle, and is a full time student at UNM's Music Department.

We hope to see you there and we hope you will bring a sweet or salty snack to share!

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
# President's Message

# Member Spotlight: Jeanine Blair

I had the pleasure of interviewing long-time IAS member Jeanine Blair with the help of her daughter Diana Blair, by email.

- 1. How long have you been a member of the IAS and who or what inspired you to join? Have you served on the board?
- I I've been a member of the IAS for over 25 years. I developed a love for Celtic culture early in my marriage when my husband picked up the bagpipes and played in the Canadian Legion Berkley Post Bagpipe Band. That exposure to the glorious sound of the bagpipes and seeing the strength and talent of Celtic people at Scottish Games hooked me for life. That love was rekindled here in Albuquerque when I met Norita Callahan quite by accident. She came to a garage sale I was having and anybody who knows Norita knows she is passionate about Ceili dancing. She invited me to join her Wednesday dancing classes and after the first class I was

hooked! I have danced with the class for over 30 years—even enjoying a dance on my 90<sup>th</sup> birthday! My husband, Bob (deceased), and I joined the IAS because we wanted to learn more about Irish culture and music. We have enjoyed the newsletter and the guest speakers.

#### 2. Do you have Irish ancestry, travelled to Ireland and/or have relatives in Ireland?

I am of proud German heritage (born Jeanine Linnenkamp), but I enjoy the culture of the Celts in a way I have not embraced the Germans. Perhaps I should do a DNA test? I was fortunate to tour Ireland in 2000. The most memorable sites for me were the Trinity College Library, Phoenix Park (where Pope John Paul II celebrated mass), and, of course, the pubs.

#### 3. Are you originally from New Mexico or how long have you lived here?

I am Iowa born and Texas raised. My husband and I met in San Antonio but after moving across the country (a couple of times) we moved to Albuquerque in the tumultuous summer of 1968 and I have loved calling New Mexico home ever since.

4. Your daughter mentioned that you like Ceili dancing. Have you danced in competitions or just for fun and exercise?

I dance for fun, friendship, health, and staying intellectually sharp. When I was 84, my daughter and I were going through the Sunport when we heard the Celtic Coyotes playing live. We danced a jig and enjoyed the applause.

5. She also mentioned that you are 90 years old. Any secrets that you want to share with the readers for a happy, healthy life?

Believe in something bigger than yourself, trust in the Lord, be active and cheerful, stay as healthy as you can, and Do Not Fall.

6. What are some of your favorite Irish movies and/or actors, Irish musical groups and/or songs, or books?

I enjoy watching *The Quiet Man* and *How Green was my Valley*. (I know this is a Welsh story, but since Maureen O'Hara stars in it, I hope you grant me this indulgence.) My love of music is expansive and my favorite Irish bands include the Clancy Brothers, The Chieftains, the Irish Tenors, Irish Rovers, Celtic Tenors, Celtic Women, and Celtic Thunder. If the music tells me a story I want to hear it!



### Flowers of the Forest

We were saddened to learn of the passing of three wonderful, consummately Irishinspired folks: Doug Carter and John Conoboy, both long-time IAS members; and poet Kevin Higgins. May they rest in peace.

#### John Conoboy (1945-2023): IAS Member since 1999. This tribute written by Harlow Pinson.

The Albuquerque, New Mexico Irish music community is deeply saddened by the unexpected death of John Conoboy. His passing is a great loss and he will be missed.

John, who hailed from Cleveland Ohio, participated in Irish sessions and musical groups in Albuquerque, New Mexico for over 30 years. He loved playing traditional Irish music on banjo, bouzouki, and mandolin at sessions, and with various groups. His goodwill and willingness to share his deep knowledge of Irish traditional music, to both young upcoming musicians, and more seasoned

ones, was always educational, interesting, and appreciated. He and his wife Carol continually opened their home to traveling Irish musicians, making Corrales, New Mexico, their home away from home.

John was deeply involved as a board member of ZoukFest, an Irish music learning camp that was held in New Mexico for many years. John was always proud to wear the camp's wonderful t-shirt. He was one of the few to have attended all camp sessions over the 12 years that it ran.

He was a founding member of the Blue Dragon Irish music session in the 1990s, which persists to this day each Thursday night in Albuquerque at Hops Brewery. He performed regularly for brunch at O'Neills Pub and Two Fools Tavern. He was a session leader at the Saturday High and Dry Irish sessions. For the past several years, John played each Friday afternoon with Wandering the Burren, a small session group of musicians, who are dedicated to increasing their repertoire of Celtic traditional and original tunes. John was a long-time member of the Irish-American Society of New Mexico and the Sliabh Sandia Branch of Comhaltas.

John worked for the National Park Service on the National Scenic and Historic Trails Program for many years, and recently retired. He was responsible for much great work on the National Historic Trails system, and championed the Santa Fe Trail, the Route 66 National Historic Trail, and the Continental Divide National Scenic Trail. John is survived by his wife Carol, and their two children, Heather and Brendan. A session was held in his memory, at his wife Carol's request. It was fun and lively, with great craic, just as John would have wanted. A fitting sendoff for our good friend John Conoboy. Safe home John.

# Doug Carter (1950-2023), IAS member since 1988. Obit is from the Albuquerque Journal.

Douglas Brown Carter was born January 11, 1950, in Albuquerque, New Mexico. He passed away on Sunday, January 8, 2023, at the age of 72 years in his home in Albuquerque. His wife Betty, family, and friends are grateful to have shared wonderful memories with Doug in his final days. All who knew him loved his wit, personality, and desire that "everyone just have fun."

Doug was raised in Old Town Albuquerque where his family lived; his grandparents owned La Placita and La Hacienda restaurants. He graduated from Albuquerque High School in 1968, Covell College at the University of Pacific in 1977, and the School of Law at the University of New Mexico in 1985.

Doug had a gift for languages, and was fluent in Spanish, German, and French. He retired in 2015 after an outstanding career teaching at Rio Grande High School. Doug and his wife Betty were known throughout the national Western Swing community for their excellence in dance. Doug not only danced, but he also loved the costuming associated with it. He sported endless western, folkloric, Scottish, and German regalia. Doug also loved to read, travel, maintain freshwater fish tanks, and take part in trivia competitions. He was active in the following organizations: Irish-American Society of NM; Edelweiss Am Rio Grande, German American Club; St. Andrew Scottish Society of NM, Western Swing Music Society of the Southwest, and the International Western Music Association NM Chapter.

Doug is survived by his wife, Betty Jo Maes de Carter. # Kevin Higgins (1968-2023). Kevin Higgins read his poems for the IAS at our June 2018 meeting. This tribute to him was written by Bill Nevins and John Roche.

Kevin Higgins, from Galway, Ireland, took the airplane from Shannon, in 2018, landed at Albuquerque Sunport, and came straight up to 9000 feet elevation so he could perform poetry at Zeb's Cowboy Bar in Angel Fire, New Mexico. Ain't that a poet?

Higgins, perhaps Ireland's most read contemporary poet due to his frequent appearances in *The Irish Times, The Galway Advertiser*, and other newspapers, died on the 10<sup>th</sup> of January from leukemia complicated by chronic sarcoidosis. Kevin Higgins was 55. He and his wife, Susan Millar DuMars, also ran an important literary series in



Galway City called *Over the Edge*. As the President of Ireland (*Uachtarán na hÉireann*), Michael D. Higgins, said following Kevin's death: "Indeed, I cannot think of anyone who did more to bring the public to appreciation and joy of poetry, to make the case for performed poetry, and who encouraged others to read broadly and, most of all, to make poems and find their meaning in their lives."

Despite suffering from symptoms of his chronic health condition, likely aggravated by New Mexico's elevation above sea level, Kevin boldly went where few or no Irish poets had gone before! He cheerfully and vigorously read out his poems from the music stage of Zeb's restaurant and bar in Angel Fire, surrounded by mounted game animal heads, rifles, and other cowboy paraphernalia. Then he traveled through the winding Taos Canyon to read at Taos SOMOS, and on to readings at Teatro Paraguas in Santa Fe and at Jules Poetry Playhouse and Sunday Chatter in Albuquerque, winding up with a well-attended triumphant performance at a meeting of the New Mexico Irish-American Society. [Editor's Note: I was there. It was a brilliant performance in the back room at the German Club.] Along the way, Kevin met with many of New Mexico's poetry luminaries, including Rich Boucher, Don McIver, Jules Nyquist, Barbara Rockman, and many others. Before departing for his return journey back to Galway, Kevin happily remarked that he had sold out all copies of the books of his poetry which he had brought with him!

In the years since, Zoom has allowed many of Kevin's New Mexico fans to keep in touch with him, as *Over the Edge* and other reading series moved online.

Kevin Higgins was a masterful satirical poet in the long tradition of Irish wits. In Kevin's final poem, "I Always Thought I'd Live," written a few days before his death, he wrote, "I always thought I'd live to learn how to swim/do the backward butterfly to Olympic standard/and see trickle-down economics deliver/at least one albeit slightly polluted drop."

# **Brigid: Goddess and Saint**

The first day of February is celebrated as the Feast Day of St. Brigid. Now is a good time to explore who she was and why she is celebrated. She is variously called Brigid, Brigit, or Brig and was known as a goddess in ancient Ireland, the daughter of Dagda and a member of the legendary Tuatha De Danann. She was associated with poetry, healing, wisdom, and even blacksmiths. Much loved by the people of Ireland, she was transformed into a Christian saint in the Middle Ages, so her followers never had to give up their devotion to her.



As a goddess, she married Bres and bore a son known as Ruadan. She is celebrated on the pagan sabat of Imbolc on February 1. Upon the death of her son, she is credited with inventing the act of keening. Dedicatees honored her with an eternal flame that was maintained by priestesses, an act that was taken up by nuns in Kildare in later times. As a goddess, she is adored along with Celtic gods Lugh and Cernunnos.

A cross formed by hand of straw or rushes with a diamond shape center is known as St. Brigid's Cross and can still be found today especially around the feast day and near Kildare. It was used

as a house blessing and hung from the rafters or door frame in times past. (I have one in my bedroom.) It has been elevated to the status of a symbol of all Ireland.

Brigid is credited with teaching others about herbs and how to heal and care for their livestock. She is associated with spring and the revival of life after winter. It may seem kind of early for such a celebration, but according to a World Climate Guide I consulted, the nighttime temps in Ireland are generally above freezing (average 39) in February with 45-49 (degrees Fahrenheit) for daytime highs.



Saint Brigid of Kildare is the patroness saint of Ireland, on a footing with Saint Patrick. She is also called Mary of the Gaels. In her early life she was born into slavery, later freed, she helped tend an eternal flame honoring the goddess Brigid, which was later tended in her own honor. She is credited with having initiated monastic life for women in Ireland. Beginning in 2023, her feast day is a public holiday in the Republic, the first named for a woman!

## The Irish Book Club

We ran out of room for a full review of **Hilary Mantel's** *Giving up the Ghost*, but suffice it to say that if you've read her previous work, especially her Wolf Hall/Thomas Cromwell Trilogy (*Wolf Hall, Bring Up the Bodies, The Mirror & the Light*), you'll really enjoy this memoir. Mantel is a brilliant writer, and (surprise!) also a very funny one, as this memoir bears out. It also attests to her life-long battle with chronic pain and illness, which eventually led to her untimely death at 70 in 2022. From the *New York Times* review: "The matter is bitter, but North English tough-mindedness coexists with dreadful imaginings; Mantel's angular wit is as unquenchable as her anger; the reading experience is reliably exhilarating because of the sheer excellence of the writing."


