

A Message From Fr. Brian Johnson

January 10, 2020

John 1:35-42

Dear St Pius And St Anthony Churches,

Happy Feast of the Baptism of the Lord! Today normally signifies the end of the Christmas season. But, I suggest that with this Sunday's title feast celebrating Jesus' Baptism, it's the Church's way of saying, "Christmas is not ending; Christ is just being born-Life with Him is only just getting started!" Sometimes we view sacraments as end points or graduations. Maybe some of our preparation programs predispose us to see them that way: like a one and done—that 'one-ce' we receive the sacrament we are done! But having received God's grace, really, that is when the good in and through us is just beginning. A sacrament is not a retirement; it is a commissioning! If we don't always see the dynamism of a sacrament's fruitfulness, we would be in good company, because even after that First Mass (Last Supper) of Jesus and the apostles, they thought they could 'sleep on it'! In the garden of Gethsemane, they actually snoozed through precious opportunities to give witness to faith in Christ three times (Matthew 26:40. 43. & 45). I like to note the connection between the end of the Last Supper and the end of every celebration of mass as being 'inaugurations' or 'commissionings'. Traditionally at the end of the Passover Meal, the Hallel Psalms (Psalms 114-118) are sung as praise and thanksgiving offerings. Those psalms were always recited on pilgrimage holy days in the Jewish calendar. They are psalms recounting and celebrating God's redemptive actions (examples of proclaiming good news-gospel). I see these psalms as 'processional hymns' that were festive recountings of God's work. The Last Supper in all four gospels has a sense of this sacred meal ending with 'marching orders' issued to them. Matthew 26:30 and Mark 14:26 say Jesus and the apostles rose, sang hymns and went out to the Mount of Olives. John 14:31 has Jesus say, "Get up & let us go." And Luke's Last Supper version in 22:35 tells of Jesus reminding the apostles of His providence during their previous missions. "Jesus said to them, "When I sent you forth without a money bag or a sack or sandals, were you in need of anything?"(Lk 22:35) Would Jesus bring up those earlier missions if he wasn't about to send them out once again? To help us see the connection between Jesus' 'marching orders' at the end of the Last Supper with how we also end every mass, let's consider the different proclamations prescribed for the priest or deacon to announce at the end of every mass. The priest/deacon issues a call to action either saying, 1) 'Go and announce the Gospel of the Lord', or 2) 'Go in peace, glorifying the Lord by your life', or 3) 'Go, in peace' or 4) 'Go forth, the Mass is ended'. They all send us out with a mission. Since Mass (and Penance?) is the repeatable and personally most frequented sacrament, it makes sense that it is the model of Christ's missionary command to us in every meeting. All the sacraments are missionary by design, to show that we are 'fed for a purpose' or blessed for the growth of blessing to be given others through us. Jesus said as much throughout the gospels when he said in Matthew 10:8 "Without cost you have received; without cost you are to give." Also, in his miraculous multiplication of loaves and feeding of the 5,000, Matthew 14:19 says He offered the blessing, broke the loaves, and gave them to the disciples, who in turn gave them to the crowds." Of course, Jesus could be no clearer than in Matthew 28:19, when He said, "Go, therefore, and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit..." which brings us back to Baptism! So the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord does not end the Christmas season. No, it is just its beginning! Like baptism itself, it opens the door to (births) life in Christ every-moment, every-where! I compare it to how we keep our baptismal fonts or pools at the doors of our sanctuaries. As we enter the church each time to celebrate sacraments, notice that we dip our fingers into the blessed Holy Water to bless ourselves (and wait, we do this when we leave too!), refreshing our identity as Christians entering and our commissioning as His disciples going out! Each visit to His sanctuary, we are 'Christen-ing' our lives and mission work in His Name. The Christian Life: Baptism runs through it! It is how grace flows! And every day, we are just getting started. Peace, Fr Brian

Another Saint in Time of Plague: Mother Pauline of the Agonizing Heart of Jesus (Born 12-16-1865 Died 7-9-1942)

Amabile Lucia Visintainer was born on December 16, 1865 in Vigolo Vattaro (a very impoverished community) in the Province of Trent in Italy, to hardworking but poor parents. The family was devout Catholics and the local parish was the center of their lives. After ten years, her family and several others from the same town sought to emigrate to South America to find better employment and livelihood. They moved to the State of Saint Catherine in Brazil, which later became named the town of Vigolo (the area now called Nova Trento). The immigrant families built a Catholic Chapel soon after settling in. Amabile's family practiced their Catholic devotions and demonstrated strong piety. After she received her first Communion at about the age of twelve, Amabile participated actively in parish life. She taught catechism to the younger kids, and helpfully volunteered to keep the Chapel clean and tidy. She also began going to pray with sick parishioners and neighbors. She wanted to serve the sick any way she could. In July of 1890, Amabile and a friend Virginia Rosa Nicolodi started to care for a neighbor woman who was suffering from cancer. This first corporal work of mercy that Amabile took on with Virginia, was the start of what became her religious order of sisters, the Congregation of the Little Sisters of the Immaculate Conception. She appealed to and received approval from the Bishop of Curitiba, José de Camargo Barros, to conduct her apostolic work for the sick and poor. By December of that year, 1890, Amabile, and her first two companions, Virginia and Teresa Anna Maule, professed their religious vows together. Amabile took the name of Sister Pauline of the Agonizing Heart of Jesus. Surprisingly by grace, the holy example of the young religious women drew many new vocations to their order, despite the hardship of the health care service, the abundant number of sick townspeople and their many demands, and the poverty of the order. The women's group steadily grew in size. In 1903 Mother Pauline was elected Superior General, which was assumed to be a position for life, and left Nova Trento in order to begin a mission of care for orphans, the children of former slaves in the district of Ipiranga of Saõ Paulo. Due to some unknown administrative reasons, Mother Pauline was removed as Superior General by the Most Reverend Duarte Leopoldo e Silva, Archbishop of Sao Paulo in 1909. He sent her to work for the sick at "Santa Casa" and to build a Hospice for the Elderly at of Saint Vincent de Paul-Bragança Paulista. She would not play an active role in high leadership ever again for her Order. Initially difficult to accept, under obedience and with longsuffering patience she continued to apply herself to her apostolic work of mercy for the sake of her Congregation of the Little Sisters' success. She wanted her Order to succeed with or without her leading, so that it might continue its mission that "our Lord be known, loved and adored by all souls, in the whole world". In 1918, with the permission of Archbishop Duarte, she was recalled by the Superior General Mother Vicência Teodora to the Mother House of Ipiranga, where she remained until her death. She lived a 'hidden life with Christ' and dedicated herself to solitude and prayer, offering assistance to the sick any time she was allowed to by her superiors. She was still acknowledged as the "Venerable Mother Foundress of the Order". Not deterred by petty bureaucratic obstacles, Pauline wrote in her Spiritual Testament: "Trust always in divine Providence; never, never must you let yourselves be discouraged, despite contrary winds. I say it again: trust in God and Mary Immaculate; be faithful and forge ahead always!" The year 1938 brought Mother Pauline serious diabetic complications of worsening pain and ulcers. She underwent two operations, amputating a finger and then her right arm. Her last months of life brought total blindness. She died with the last words on 9 July 1942, saying "God's will be done".

Mother Pauline exhibited heroic charity, surrender and humble sacrifice of her own ambitions for her Order when she was abruptly removed from leadership by Archbishop Duarte. Her motto was always, "all for God and for her brethren". Deep humility led her to deny herself so that her group could continue its missionary activity. When Archbishop Duarte abruptly demoted her from the Superior Position, she was most ready to hand over the Congregation, offering herself generously and spontaneously to serve the Congregation as an underling". She felt no bitterness toward him, though she suffered fear about what might be next (or who) for the Congregation of Sisters. She lived humbly out of public view, right up until her death. She shared once with her spiritual director, Father Luigi Maria Rossi, SJ, that "The presence of God is so intimate to me that it seems impossible for me to lose it; and such presence gives my soul a joy which I cannot describe and cannot be taken from me!" She was the first Brazilian citizen to be canonized. She is a patron saint of health care workers and especially known as a patron of suffering diabetics. Since diabetes is a serious complicating factor of COVID, she is a timely saint to seek prayer and intercession from for us.
