Residents Overwhelmingly Approve Public Works for the City of Tucker

In 2016, the City of Tucker was established by its residents to provide local oversight of key day-to-day operations and public services. The residents of Tucker have spoken and have overwhelmingly acknowledged the need for change to its roadway maintenance and stormwater services delivery. Since the passage of the public works referendum on November 8, the City has already begun to execute on plans for implementation of improvements to the overall public works service delivery model, addressing the existing backlog and enhancing the customer experience, all in collaboration with DeKalb County to transition these important services by July 2023.

Mayor Frank Auman stated, "We are grateful to the Tucker community for affirming their confidence in us and overwhelmingly approving this referendum. The Council, staff and I are excited and ready to get to work providing our residents with safe roads, working infrastructure and the levels of responsiveness and service they deserve. We intend to deliver on our commitment and promise to be more responsive, more reliable, and more locally accountable."

Combined public works services will transition to the City July 1, 2023. "Within the first 365 days, our goal is to prioritize and work through deferred public works maintenance and address key repairs," said City Manager Tami Hanlin. "Now that the community has spoken, we can move forward and develop a service delivery model that will eliminate long-deferred needs, get us to a more normal level of meeting current maintenance needs, and ultimately take us on to focusing on preventive maintenance. We will reduce current repair and maintenance times by 50% by our second year of operations, while saving significant costs of operation."

Public Works services rendered under roads and maintenance will include asphalt patching, pothole repairs, right-of-way maintenance, sidewalk and curb repairs, traffic sign/signal maintenance, bridge maintenance, pavement marking maintenance and transportation engineering services. Stormwater services include stormwater infrastructure and catch basin repairs.


A Whole Lot of Christmas




Testimonials were heard from two ladies who had escaped domestic violence situations, one teenager who had experienced domestic violence and one lady whose sister was killed by her husband.

The vigil is sponsored by the Women's Resource Center to End Domestic Violence which is located in Decatur. The center offers a safe house program, legal advocacy, support groups, Camp Peace for children, supervised visitation and safe exchange of children, community education and a 24-hour hotline. Domestic violence crosses all boundaries of age, race, ethnicity, religion, economic background, physical ability and sexual orientation. Domestic violence is the establishment of control and fear in a relationship through physical, sexual, emotional, and/or financial abuse. 12 years of walking, 12 years of honoring a "triangle of trees"

On Saturday, January 21, 2023, at 9:30 AM, neighbors will gather once again to take an easy 3-mile stroll from Smoke Rise Baptist parking lot and back. We will be exploring the beautiful greenspaces of our neighborhoods, while dropping daffodils along our merry way. What fun for a great cause especially if the weather is favorable!

A quick history for our new neighbors - the Memorial Triangle was created and planted on January 20, 2007, by the Mountain Mums Garden Club. In 2005, the garden club adopted the Hugh Howell Rd./ Hwy. 78 Triangle from the Georgia Department of Transportation (GDOT) - hoping to do our best to beautify it.



We had several great ideas, but the area was quite a challenge logistically. One night before our monthly meeting, I dreamt of us planting some beautiful flowering trees at the site. However, these would not be just any trees. They would be trees planted to honor young neighborhood drivers who had been killed in auto accidents, most of them on or near Exit 7. This would be a big project since sadly, there were six young neighbors who had been affected. Fortunately, our project had a lot of support! The families, Boy and Girl Scout troops, Smoke Rise Civic Association (SRCA), and many neighbors gathered their shovels, helped with cost and transport of the trees, and the project was completed. We added a seventh tree for hope- a hope that drivers would be careful and safe. What a day that was. There was not one dry eye!

Unfortunately, the Triangle was almost immediately a victim of theft. Four of the trees were stolen right out of the ground. It was heartbreaking! To deeply sadden the story further, when the Mountain Mums Garden Club purchased replacement trees and were in the pro-



cess of getting them replanted, another young boy was killed on Hugh Howell Road riding his motorcycle. We planted a tree in his honor and there are now a total of eight trees. We still have the tree of hope. We have always kept the Carter, Hubbard, Lolies, Smith, Stovall, Taylor, and Wellman families close to our hearts while maintaining their memorial trees and the gardens surrounding them. Thankfully, SRCA keeps the grass cut

and helps with maintenance. We have also placed signage for friendly reminders to not text while driving!

Cheers to 12 years of Taggert's Scholarships being awarded to many students who wanted to improve their driving skills! This year Jackson Lee and Nicholas Hicks were awarded with 30 hours of class time and 6 hours of driving instruction. Mayor Frank Auman will be introducing them at the beginning of our next TWTR (Tucker Walk to Remember).



We are nothing without our benefactors. Please consider supporting us now and in response to our 2023 membership campaign.







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

Gardening Opportunities for December

We've worked on having a garden with year-round interest. Last month I talked about what was blooming in our garden. Since then, we've had our first freezing weather and I've been surprised how much is still green after the frost. Here's what's 'blooming' for us right now: abelia, coreopsis, butterfly bush, grasses, salvia, passion vine, Turk's cap, hydrangea, clematis, flame acanthus, pineapple sage, orange zest, aster, echinacea, chrysanthemum, rosemary, penstemon, veronica, camelia, roses, catmint, Russian sage, Carolina jasmine, pieris, anemone, Lenten rose, fatsia, tea olive, lantana, million bells, amsonia, and lavender!

It's that time of year when many of us put up a Christmas tree. To check for freshness if you're buying a live tree this year, gently grasp a branch and tug along its length. If the tree is fresh, very few needles will come off in your hand. You don't have to feel guilty about ruining forests when you buy a fresh tree. About 98% of all Christmas trees are grown on farms as sustainable crops. 80% of artificial trees worldwide are manufactured in China, according to the U.S. Commerce Department. (https://realchristmastrees.org/)

Opportunities in the garden for December:

- Remove faded Amaryllis blooms and stalks and water only when dry. Poinsettias need more water check them daily. Keep all your holiday plants in a cool spot in your house to keep the flowers and leaves from dropping prematurely. Also, if you have potted plants with a foil wrapping around them, poke holes in the foil to allow them to drain so they don't get root rot.
- Fertilize your pansies and snapdragons with a 'nitrate nitrogen' (i.e., 15-2-20) every two weeks.
- If you have a fireplace instead of tossing the ashes, you can spread them over your lawn to provide potassium and phosphorous.
- Use cuttings from your evergreens, hollies, and magnolias for your decorations.
- When we have frost predicted, protect your plants by watering them thoroughly. You can also use sheets to cover plants but need to cover them all the way to the ground to trap in the heat. Insulate your outdoor faucets to keep them from freezing.
- Make sure piles of leaves are cleared off your lawn to prevent dead spots in your lawn next spring.
- Plant bare root trees and woody vines now.
- Browse the seed and plant catalogues that are arriving in your mailbox to help you plan your garden for 2023.

Be a Friend...to our Parks!

As 2022 nears an end, you may be thinking about the new year ahead. Consider becoming a "friend" to one of our public parks here in Smoke Rise and/or the Tucker area. Well-managed parks enhance our property values, offer opportunities to experience nature and recreation, and attract new residents and workers to our area.

In Smoke Rise, through the City of Tucker, we have "Friends of Tucker Parks" (FOTP) to help guide, build, and maintain our local park system. FOTP is an affiliate of Park Pride, which was founded in 1989. Park Pride is the only nonprofit organization that works with more than 60 Friends of the Parks groups to improve our parks in metro Atlanta. 

HEALTH NOTES:

Surge in Respiratory Viruses

You may have already read about a recent increase in the number of cases of respiratory virus infections, causing an increase in the number of patients showing up in emergency rooms and urgent care facilities. These infections have continued to intensify, especially among children, who are more at risk from respiratory viruses because of their more easily obstructed small airways. Adults may also be at risk for



serious illness from respiratory viruses; especially the elderly, people with chronic heart and lung diseases, and immunocompromised patients.

This year's flu season has ramped up early. Hopefully you have also received your flu shot for this year. The most common complication of the flu is pneumonia, but it can also cause

serious muscle and central nervous system complications.

Yet another respiratory virus out there is the respiratory syncytial virus, RSV. Although the mechanism of RSV airway disease is not completely understood, lung inflammation is thought to play a central role, with some people having an excessive inflammatory response. RSV is picked up from the infectious secretions in the environment, and then the virus spreads from cell to cell in the respiratory tract lining. The initial viral infection of the cells of the respiratory tract causes inflammation in the airways, and the initial respiratory symptoms. Once inside the airways, the virus is spread through a process that actually causes death of the airway lining cells. This causes a secondary illness, as these dead cells slough off into the airways and cause a significant secondary inflammation. This inflammation can cause spasm and closure of the airway. It can cause damage to the lung that may not be reversible. RSV can be somewhat scary if you think about it. We are getting close to a vaccine for RSV, one or more RSV vaccine may be available before next fall's season.


Suddenly a break in the gloomy heavens exposed a patch of cheery, blue sky that brightly lit up the sullen

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Staying Safe in A Connected World (Part 3)

Two-factor authentication (2FA) is a security technique requiring users to provide two different factors to verify themselves. It provides a higher level of security and more protection for the user's credentials than simply having a password, which is known as single-factor authentication (SFA). Two-factor authentication requires a password and a second factor, usually a security code that is texted or emailed to you or a biometric factor like facial, voice identification or a fingerprint.

It's a good idea to enable 2FA when it is presented to you to get the additional layer of security. Say your passwords get hacked, you will be relieved to know that attackers can't access your online accounts with the password alone. Many financial institutions and retailers require 2FA, and while it is an extra step, taking it increases the security of your accounts. You have probably heard the term phishing. Sounds like fishing, but is far more treacherous. Phishing is when an attacker masquarades as a trusted party, tricking victims into opening an

email, text, or instant message containing a link or attachment. When clicked or opened, malicious software known as malware is downloaded to your computer or phone allowing the attacker to watch your every online move.



Never click on an unsolicited or suspicious link. If you think your computer or phone might have been infected, take it to a professional to have it fixed. Signs of a malware attack include the computer or phone not seeming to run as normal, running sluggishly, or bombarding you with pop-up ads.

Here are some simple tips to avoid having your digital device infected by malware.

- 1. Look at the sender's email address. If it is someone you recognize, fine, but check carefully. Sometimes just a number or letter is changed, but more often, the entire address is something with a non-US ending, like this one I received from Japan isk_kanribu@iskinc.co.jp. Others impersonate companies you are doing business with, like your bank or Microsoft by using their real email address and changing it just slightly like this one: update@onmicrosoft.com. Others are just odd, like this one Xq3CGWIcIBsFXo8Vj@sarratorilaw.com that came to me with Subject: Invoice Attached. Yeah, right!
- 2. Attackers know what people are most likely to open, like this one saying my invoice is attached. Others use tricks like, "Click here to view your statement" or "See attached pictures from the event." Another common technique is appearing to be from Microsoft saying "Password expiring in 2 days, click here to reset." Phishing relies on people's human vulnerabilities, their hopes, dreams, and fears, and the criminals are skilled at finding those. They are also constantly refining their game as they learn what works best. So it's best to slow down, use 2FA and look suspiciously and carefully at every email you receive, and look even more carefully before opening an attachment or clicking on a link.



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
'Tis the Season for Holiday Hostess Gifts and Wrapping Tips!

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

A Christmas Cake "Yule" Love!

The tradition of the Yule Log was celebrated in England and France before it was imported to America in the late 1600's. Taken from a pagan tradition, the biggest log that could be cut was brought to the hearth and lit on Christmas Eve, then allowed to burn for twelve days, originally to commemorate the winter solstice. It was later adopted by Christians to hold a vigil for the coming of the Christ Child. It is a diminishing tradition that has lost some of its traditional meaning in modern homes.

The Yule Log cake, however, can still be a delicious way to commemorate that tradition and add a lovely centerpiece to your dessert table. This recipe is from "The Pioneer Woman".

Cake ingredients:

4 Tbsp melted salted butter

6 large eggs, separated

1/4 tsp cream of tartar

¼ tsp salt

¾ cup granulated sugar

¾ cup all – purpose flour

¼ cup unsweetened cocoa powder

½ tsp baking powder

1 tsp vanilla extract

1/4 cup strong brewed coffee – room temperature

¼ cup powdered sugar

Filling ingredients:

4 oz cream cheese at room temp.

½ cup sifted powdered sugar

1 cup heavy cream

1 tsp vanilla

<u>Frosting Ingredients:</u>

12 oz semisweet chocolate, chopped

34 cup heavy cream

1 Tablespoon light corn syrup

Preheat oven to 350°. Butter a 12x17 inch rimmed cookie sheet. Line with parchment paper or wax paper, leaving an overhang on all sides. With a pastry brush, paint melted butter on parchment paper.

Beat egg whites, cream of tartar, and salt in a large bowl with a mixer on medium to high speed until frothy. Add ¼ cup granulated sugar and beat on high for 2 minutes until stiff, glossy peaks form.

Sift together flour, cocoa powder, and baking powder in a medium bowl. In a separate bowl, combine the egg yolks, remaining ½ cup sugar, and vanilla. Beat on high speed for 3-4 minutes until thick and creamy. Beat in the melted butter and coffee until combined. Add flour mixture to the egg yolk mixture and beat on low speed until well combined. Gently fold in the beaten egg whites a little at a time until combined. Transfer batter to the prepared pan, gently nudging the batter to fill to the corners. Shake lightly to even out batter. Bake for 10-12 minutes until the top just starts to spring back when gently pressed. Do not overbake, which will cause the cake to crack.

Place a large clean dish towel on a wire rack. Dust cloth with 2 tablespoons of powdered sugar. While the cake is still hot, loosen the edges from the pan, then flip the cake onto the towel. Carefully remove the parchment. Dust the top with the remaining 2 tablespoons of powdered sugar. While the cake is warm, start at one of the long sides, use the towel to tightly roll up the cake with the towel inside. Position the cake seam-side down and let it cool for about one hour.

For filling, beat the cream cheese in a large bowl with a mixer on low speed until just smooth. Add powdered sugar and beat for about 1 minute. Gradually beat in the heavy cream - 1/4 cup at a time until mixture is smooth. Increase speed to medium high and beat until stiff peaks form 2-4 minutes. Add the vanilla and beat for a few more seconds to combine.

Carefully unroll the cooled cake and spread filling evenly, leaving 1/4 to ½ border on all sides. Re-roll the cake, using the towel to help hold in place. Cover cake roll with parchment paper and tightly wrap in plastic wrap. Chill for at least 2 hours.

For frosting, put the chocolate in a medium bowl, bring heavy cream and corn syrup to a simmer in a saucepan, then pour over the chocolate. Let sit for 5 minutes, then whisk until smooth. Let thicken at room temp about 2 hours until spreadable. Unwrap the cake on a cutting board. Cut off ¼ of the cake on a sharp diagonal for the branch. Position the branch against the remaining cake roll on a platter. Cover the cake with frosting using a thin spatula. Drag fork through the frosting to create a bark-like texture. Garnish with rosemary sprig and pomegranate seeds or cranberries.
