Spartan Government

- Sparta was an Oligarchy
- Council of Elders
 - Made up of two kings and 28 other men
- To be elected to the council you had to be a man, at least 60 years old and be from a noble family.
- Members were elected by who received the loudest shout.



Council of Elders

- Held the real power in Sparta
 - Prepared laws to be voted on
 - Had the power to stop any laws passed by the Assembly if they didn't like them





Assembly

- Made up of male citizens
- Because of its size
 the meetings would
 take place in a large
 outdoor area away
 from the center of the
 city





Spartan Economy

- Based on farming and conquering other people
- Used slaves and noncitizens to produce needed goods
 - Turned conquered people into slaves called helots.
 - Also used noncitizens called *perioikoi* to serve in the army when needed.
- Discouraged trade with its neighbors



Spartan Education

- Purpose of education is to produce men and women to protect the citystate.
- Valued discipline and strength
- From age 7 all children were trained to fight.
- Trained in wrestling, boxing, foot racing, and gymnastics.
- Also taught to read and write





Spartan Education

- Valued bravery
 - Boys were taught to suffer any amount of physical pain without complaining
 - Marched without shoes
 - Were not fed well and were encouraged to steal food as long as they didn't get caught
- At age 20 were tested to become soldiers
- Could not leave the barracks until age 30





Women in Sparta

- Women lived the same simple life as men
 - Wore simple clothing
 - No jewelry, cosmetics or perfume
 - Expected to be strong and ready to fight
 - Guarded husbands belongings while he was away
- Free to speak with husbands friends
- Could own and control property



Slaves in Sparta

- More of them than citizens
- Sometimes the government would declare war on the helots so that it could legally kill any slaves it thought might rebel.
- Helots did have some rights
 - Could marry whomever they wanted
 - Could pass their names on to their children
 - Could sell leftover crops once they gave their master his share
