### St. Paul's Preschool & PMO is Celebrating 10 Years!



St. Paul's Preschool & PMO is a half-day early childhood program for children 10 months through 4 years old. After the church finished the expansion and renovation in 2009, the preschool began a small, parent co-op program with 14 children ages 1-2 years old. The preschool expanded to two classes the next school year and added 3 year olds. The program continued to expand over the years, eventually offering classes to children 10 months through 4 years old. We currently have

about 55 children enrolled in seven classes, using four classrooms. Children attend two to five mornings a week and the program runs September through May. In addition to the school year, the preschool also offers several weeks of summer camp.

As we are beginning the 10th year of our Preschool, we have determined that some items can greatly add up over the years!

### From the Vicar...

Dear St. Paul's Lutheran Church,

My name is Anna Carter (pronounced ah-nah) and I am incredibly excited to be your upcoming Vicar! I am looking forward to learning from you and with you throughout the coming year. One of the things you will soon learn about me is that I love to tell the story of God's redemptive and healing love in my life. My life, my call into pastoral ministry, and my adult adoption are one story interwoven with beautiful details of God's mercy and grace. I did not grow up in the church, but began attending an Evangelical Covenant Church (ECC) in 1999 while in high school. In 2003 I said yes to God's persistent nudging to become a pastor. I attended North Park Theological Seminary in Chicago, Illinois from the intention of becoming an ECC pastor. In 2007 while at North Park, I was

adopted. Instead of pursuing a call in the ECC after I graduated in 2009, I relocated to Winston Salem, North Carolina to live closer to my new family. My time at North Park was deeply formative for me in many ways. During my final year of seminary, I was able to bring together my love of theology and passion for care as I wrote my thesis, "A Trinitarian Theology of Care."

For several years, I lived in Winston Salem enjoying the experience of ordinary family life. These years in NC were a time of deep growth and healing for me. Additionally, I was a nanny for two children for nearly six years who are now ages 12 and 10. Loving and caring for these two children has been one of the greatest gifts of my life. Before I left North Park, one of my seminary professors encouraged me to find a Lutheran congregation, knowing it would be a good fit for me theologically. I found a home at Augsburg Lutheran Church in Winston Salem. As God began drawing me back toward a path to pastoral ministry, I knew it would be within the ELCA. I graduated with my MDIV in May and will begin my capstone internship with you on August 12.

I have been thinking and dreaming about being a pastor for nearly 20 years ... I am grateful, honored, and excited that I will be learning how to be a pastor among you. I am looking forward to getting practical, hands on experience in all things ministry related. I hope to grow in my teaching and preaching abilities as well as strengthening my skills for pastoral leadership. I am most excited about getting to know you and hearing about God's faithfulness and love in your lives.

For fun, I love to clean and organize, read, decorate, and bake. I am a gluten-free vegetarian and am always up for trying new recipes. I find it hard to say no to ice cream and any kind of cheese. I get energized when I talk about the Trinity, the sacraments, and creation care.

### The Best of Enemies

You may have read the book or seen the new movie, "The Best of Enemies," featuring Taraji P. Henson and Sam Rockwell. It's based on a true story that took place in Durham in the summer of 1971, when Ann Atwater, a single mother and civil rights activist, was asked to co-chair a committee to oversee the desegregation of Durham's schools. But her fellow co-chair, C. P. Ellis, was not only on the opposite side of the integration debate – he was the leader of the local Ku Klux Klan, who was determined to prevent integration by any means necessary. "The Best of Enemies" tells the story not only of formal school desegregation in Durham, but of the unfathomable friendship that Atwater forged with Ellis in the process.

With this remarkable story as our guide, Duke Lutherans, members of St. Paul's, and members of Grace gathered throughout June and July to wrestle with race, scripture, and what the faith of Ann Atwater means for us as Christians and as Durhamites today. The CCG looks forward to continuing conversations and discerning how we are called into the hard work of challenging racism together at St. Paul's this fall.

# **Sharing Life Together Across Campus and Congregation**

As part of living into our "call to life together" this past year, Duke Lutherans revived "Adopt-a-Duke-Lutheran," a program that connects Duke Lutherans with members of our two supporting congregations. This year we matched twenty students and local Lutheran families who spent the year getting to know one another, sharing meals, and participating in church and community events.

"I joined Adopt-a-Duke-Lutheran because I wanted to find a home away from home, to give myself a chance to love and be loved by others," says Jovita Byemerwa, a rising third year PhD student. Jovita's adopted family was eager to provide that home. "We were inspired to participate in the program because of

my own experiences as a college student when families welcomed me into their homes," says Marilyn Bell.

Adopted families provide a way for Duke Lutherans to engage more deeply in their wider community. "My adopted family invited me to Thanksgiving dinner with all of their family members in Greensboro and that was such a great moment," Jovita says. "I've loved talking to my adopted family about their childhood, looking at their family photos, and learning from them about the history of Durham and North Carolina."

This year, adopted families also provided rides to the airport, a quiet home to study in, and a louder cheering section at Duke sporting events. Ellen and Kevin Lavery supported rising junior Alex Miley at his meets with Duke's Cross Country and Track teams. "Our favorite memory was watching [Alex] win the Steeplechase at Duke last spring, knowing it was his first time competing in the event," says Ellen.

But perhaps the most important part of the program are the relationships. "We've enjoyed spending quality time with our adoptee and learning about his work at Duke and plans for the future," says Phil and Sally Hart. "Adopt-a-Duke-Lutheran has brought us closer to the Duke Lutherans community. We've appreciated the shared gift of relationships."

As we begin to welcome new members into Duke Lutherans in just a few weeks, we will have more opportunities for church members to get involved. # Stephen Ministers: The After People

People often ask, "What exactly is a Stephen Minister?" One way to put it is that Stephen Ministers are the *After People*.

#### Stephen Ministers are there:

- ...after the phone call you hoped you'd never get. ...after the divorce papers are served and the bottom falls out of your life.
- ...after the funeral, when everyone has left and the emotions you've held at bay come crashing in on you. ...after the doctor says, "I'm sorry, but there's nothing more we can do."
- ... after the nursing home director shakes your hand and says, "Welcome to your new home."
- ...after the last child honks the horn, waves, and drives away and the house suddenly seems empty.
- ... after the gavel goes down, the handcuffs go on, and your loved one is led away.
- ... after the baby arrives, demanding more of you than you ever dreamed possible.
- ...after you find a pink slip with your final paycheck. ...after your family and friends have heard your story one too many times, but you still need to talk it out.

Stephen Ministers are the "After People." We are men and women, ready to come alongside you – or your friends, neighbors, co-workers, or relatives – and provide comfort and support for as long *after* as needed.

### Planned Giving: Charitable Trusts

This month we feature Charitable Trusts.

#### **Article #5: Charitable Trusts**

For some people, establishing an irrevocable Charitable Trust can provide great benefits for themselves, their heirs, and for our church. Charitable Trusts work two ways.

Remainder Trusts: With a remainder trust, the donor gifts assets to the trust (often to avoid capital gains taxes or for other tax benefits), then the donor receives an income stream for life, or for a prescribed period of time from the trust. It is also possible to grant children, grandchildren, or other beneficiary a period of time to receive that trust income. Following the prescribed time period, the trust assets are then transferred to the church.

People who don't want their children or grandchildren to inherit a lump sum of money will appreciate this option so that the income is provided to heirs over a period of time.

<u>Lead Trusts</u>: These work the opposite of remainder trusts. In a lead trust, the church received an income stream from the donated assets for a prescribed period. Following the term of the agreement, the assets transfer back to the original donor or to whoever the donor designates.

Both remainder trusts and lead trusts require professionals to set up and manage. St. Paul's will utilize the ELCA Foundation that has small fees, but a long history of servicing these charitable vehicles.
