Having a Great Summer?

I hope that you have all having a great time, so far this Summer.

It's been hot, but not too bad, if you put into perspective where we live [the desert]. Since our monsoon season has arrived, it's hoped that we will soon see some really good rains be produced, that will help things" green out", aid in replenishing some of our wetland areas, and provide some relief to the local wildlife and us.

But, all-in-all, there are plenty of fun things to do in El Paso at this time of year, and it's very easy to keep busy with all the hustle and bustle of the season. But, if you actually need any ideas of "fun stuff to do", you might want to

-view the construction that has begun at Keystone Heritage Park's Botanical Garden & then go birding; recent sightings include a Swainson's hawk eating "someone" & later being chased by a Mississippi Kite, a sora rail, and young American avocets and blacknecked stilts, "striking out" on their own.

-enjoy the sights and smells at the Centennial Museum's Chihuahuan Desert Gardens, it's great.

- look at the fledged scarlet ibis or nesting cedar waxwings in the Zoo's Americas Aviary, "just born" Panamint rattlesnakes in the Reptile House, a soon to be forthcoming Patagonian cavy birth in South American Lands, and if you're lucky, a new lesser anteater in the South American Pavilion [that has come to hopefully breed with our male]. The new sea lion exhibit is also always fun to visit; it also feels great to escape the heat and the brightness of the outdoors for a while, in the air-conditioned, underwater viewing gallery.

Many black-chinned hummingbird nestlings have fledged and are now on their own and visiting YOUR feeders. The southward migration of hummingbirds has also "kicked-in" during the past few weeks, and calliope, rufous and broad-tailed hummers have been showing-up at local feeders that usually have more black-chins about then any other species. Shorebirds have begun to return, with recent sightings of least sand-pipers and greater yellowlegs. It won't be long before other migrant birds begin to show up "en masse", so keep your eyes open for warblers, grosbeaks, flycatchers and more. We may once again install "No Hunting" signs at the Fred Hervey water treatment plant. We hope that these signs will help to remind hunters of their ethical and legal responsibilities as true sportsmen, as to where and what to hunt/not hunt; this didn't prevent almost all of last year's signs from disappearing, though. Please offer to help us with this project.

The board should be meeting soon to discuss an action plan for the coming year; please contact me if you have any items that you want broached, or want to participate in this important annual project. I also want to once again encourage you to become more actively involved with YOUR chapter. We need help with various projects, we need help to a new vice-president, etc. WE NEED YOU, SO PLEASE HELP! A diverse, active membership is critical to the future of this organization and we would greatly appreciate it if you (or another excellent individual that you could recruit) can help us to do more for our community and our wildlife and wild places.

Speaker for the General Meeting

Jerry Garncarz of the Wilderness Society's BLM Action Center will conduct a presentation regarding a pending revision of the BLM's land use plan for a number of New Mexico's counties. The BLM's Las Cruces Field Office is revising the land use plan for Sierra, Otero, and Dona Ana counties. The Resource Management Plan will guide how the public lands in the area will be managed for the next 15-20 years. The plan will address such issues as wildlife, habitat protection, off-road vehicle route designations, land disposals, and protection of cultural resources. This is a public process which will take about 2-3 years to complete. This discussion will provide a brief overview of the planning process and how the public can participate.

Land Trust Update By, Ursula Sherrill

Since mid-April a steering committee has been meeting to establish a land trust to preserve open space in the Chihuahuan Desert region. The group mission is to preserve significant lands that enhance the natural environment and cultural heritage of the region. For the last three months, the steering committee has been engaged in studying other successful conservancy organizations, drafting by-laws, and preparing for incorporation as a non-profit group. Titles are being considered that will encompass a regional focus, as well.

In May, the meeting at La Hacienda Restaurant welcomed Nancy Stotz of the Dona Ana County Citizens Task Force for Open Space Preservation. Ms. Stotz described her group's journey and progress in protecting key natural areas around Las Cruces.

The El Paso Regional Group of the Sierra Club has earmarked \$1000 to support the formation of the land trust. At the July steering committee meeting at Chamizal National Memorial, Steve Bonner and Paul Cusumano of the National Park Service spoke on aspects of the incorporation process. Mr. Bonner will be a support and resource for the group, as he has helped a number of other land trusts to get established in the state. Mr. Cusumano has indicated his interest in helping create community projects that the land trust might initiate to foster community support for preservation of natural lands. If you are interested in getting involved in this exciting land stewardship project, please consider attending the next meeting on Thursday, August 19, at the Chamizal National Memorial, at 6PM.

AT FEATHER LAKE

Feather Lake received some storm runoff in late May and late June, but each time only part of the basin held water and it lasted less than a week. For most of the summer, the lake has been completely dry.

With the lake dry and groundwater levels dropping steadily, many of our cottonwoods, willows and tornillos are showing signs of stress. The area most affected is on the east side of the basin, where an irrigation well was installed this spring just outside the sanctuary property and has been pumping groundwater much of the summer.

On a more positive note, a pair of Mississippi Kites soaring over the lake July 6 brought the bird-species total for our sanctuary to an even 200.

Our traditional mid-summer workday at Feather

Lake takes place Sat., August 7. Come any time after 8 a.m. to help with habitat-management activities. On Sat., September 25, we'll have an afternoon work session, starting at 2 p.m. Will Feather Lake re-open to the public the following weekend? Only if we get some good rains in the interim. Feather Lake is located at 9500 North Loop at Bordeaux, 0.3 miles west of Americas Ave.




